Winningest Ohio wrestling coach retiring from MHHS

Jamie Milkovich has announced his retirement after 43 years as head coach of the Maple Heights High School wrestling team. According to the Ohio High School Athletic Association website (ohsaa.org), Milkovich stands as the winningest coach in the history of Ohio wrestling with 594 dual meet victories.

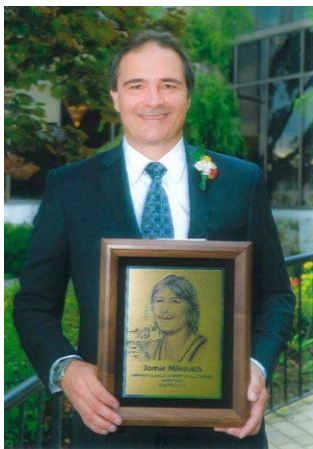
He is a member of the Ohio Wrestling Hall of Fame, the Greater Cleveland Sports Hall of Fame, and the Ohio Chapter of the National Wrestling Hall of Fame located in Stillwater, Oklahoma.

Milkovich won the 145-lb. state championship for Maple Heights High School in 1977, while wrestling for his legendary uncle, Mike Milkovich, Sr. After graduation, Milkovich attended Auburn University where he was a two-time N.C.A.A. Division I All-American in 1980 and 1981, set the Auburn University record for career wins with 98, and was named Auburn's "All-Time Best Wrestler" by USA Wrestling Magazine in 2018.

In the Fall of 1981, at just 22 years of age, Milkovich returned to Maple Heights as Head Wrestling Coach. Since then his teams have captured 26 Greater Cleveland Conference and Lake Erie League titles and have placed among the top eight teams in the state 11 times. His 1999-2000 squad finished as runners-up in the Ohio State Duals Tournament and was ranked as high as 9th in the nation by Amateur Wrestling News magazine and the USA Today newspaper.

Milkovich has coached 105 individual state tournament qualifiers, 52 state place winners, 21 state finalists and 9 state champions.

He was presented a plaque honoring his years of service by the Maple Heights City Schools. It reads in part: "Thank you for your dedication, personal commitment and for your inspirational leadership in leading our wrestling program to excellence throughout the years. Your effort, energy and passion will be with our district and community for years to come. You leave behind a legacy of success." -July 2024

Cuyahoga County, Cleveland, Painesville receive \$129 million from EPA to reduce climate pollution

Should lead to lower emissions and lower energy bills for residents

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has announced the selected recipients of over \$4.3 billion in Climate Pollution Reduction Grants (CPRG) to implement community-driven solutions that tackle the climate crisis, reduce air pollution, advance environmental justice and accelerate America's clean energy transition.

As a part of the Climate Pollution Reduction Grants, Cuyahoga County will receive \$30 million, the city of Cleveland will receive \$20 million, and the city of Painesville will receive \$80 million in grant funding.

Applications were submitted by entities in all states and Puerto Rico plus the District of Columbia, requesting a total of nearly \$33 billion in funding. The EPA selected a total of 25 applications to fund a diverse range of projects in 30 states. When estimates provided by all selected applicants are combined, the proposed projects would reduce greenhouse gas pollution by as much as 971 million metric tons of carbon dioxide equivalent by 2050, roughly the emissions from 5 million average homes' energy use each year for over 25 years.

The EPA CPRG funding will enable an unprecedented amount of brownfield and landfill solar to be developed in Northeast Ohio within a timeframe that will put the region on a pathway toward achieving its 2030 and 2050 emissions reduction goals. Cleveland, Cuyahoga County and Painesville are uniquely positioned to implement utility-scale solar projects as each local government operates its own municipal utility.

Cuyahoga County and Cleveland will collaborate to deploy 28 megawatts of renewable energy through five brownfield and landfill solar projects. Three of these projects will directly supply the customers of Cleveland Public Power (CPP) and Cuyahoga Green Energy, including on portions of the land at the former Harvard Refuse Landfill. Cleveland also plans to utilize funding to support a community park and public art project.

"This is a huge win for the Broadway/Slavic Village community to help reclaim and reuse a portion of a closed landfill and put it back to productive use," said former Ward 12 Cleveland Councilman Tony Brancatelli. "A portion of the Harvard Landfill that includes land in both Cleveland and Garfield Heights will be topped with solar panels to generate about 9 megawatts with a proposed goal to sell their power to CPP," he continued. "Slavic Village Development and local officials have been planning on reuse strategies for the past decade, and this federal grant will help realize this creative land use and create a more

sustainable environment and help reduce global warming."

Chris Alvarado, Cuyahoga County's Director of Regional Collaboration, also weighed in on the reclamation of part of Harvard Landfill. "Having a clean and green reuse of the property that will also result in cleaning up the site and addressing the methane issue is a formidable win for our neighborhood," Alvarado said.

Grant program in Newburgh Hts. to help residents make home improvements easier

The Village of Newburgh Heights Council met on Tuesday, July 16, and passed an ordinance to create the ARPA Enhanced Home Renovation Grant Program for qualified homeowners in the village who wish to make improvements to the interior/exterior of their homes.

The total project improvement cost must be at least \$7,000 for interior and exterior improvements as stipulated in the legislation to be eligible for a \$6,000 grant. The grant will be funded with \$5,000 provided by Cuyahoga County Council as an American Rescue Plan Act grant to the Village of Newburgh Heights, and \$1,000 provided by the village itself.

No grant will be awarded for a project with a cost of less than \$7,000 paid out in total expense. No more than 20 grants will be awarded in 2024, and no more than 40 grants for the life of the grant cycle, which is in two-year increments, if renewed by the village council after the initial grant cycle ends on Dec. 31, 2025.

"We're so appreciative of County Councilman Pernel Jones and his colleagues for assisting us with the funding for this important program," said Mayor Trevor Elkins.

"Newburgh Heights has led the way for some time as it pertains to property maintenance," he continued. "Our Village Council and I thought it was important to provide our homeowners with the resources and tools they need to continue investing in their homes. These grants will allow 40 homeowners to make significant upgrades."

Other legislation passed

- Empty waste containers will not be permitted to remain in front of any house or other building by those responsible any later than 10 a.m. on the day following collection by the city with the passage of an ordinance to that effect.

- An ordinance prohibiting the cultivation, processing and dispensing of recreational and/or medical marijuana in the village.

- Ordinances were passed updating the Automated Speed and Traffic Enforcement Program as well as the Officer-Operated Handheld Traffic Law Enforcement Devices and Speed Enforcement Program. In a related resolution, the mayor was authorized to enter into an amendment to the agreement between the village and Gatso USA, Inc. for providing an automated speed enforcement system in the village.

- A resolution authorizing the mayor to enter into an agreement between the village and Angelo Benedetti, LLC for the Bridgeview Avenue Resurfacing Project, accepting the company's bid of \$146,351.00 as the total cost of the project.

- A resolution entering into a Letter Agreement with OHM Advisors for engineering services in connection with the Gamma Avenue Watermain Replacement Project

not to exceed \$70,400.

- A resolution entering into a Letter Agreement with OHM Advisors for engineering services in connection with the Harvard Avenue Temporary Traffic Control Project not to exceed \$49,800, which would extend from the Harvard Avenue Corridor from Washington Park Boulevard to E. 49 St.

Two other projects will provide clean, behind-the-meter electricity to two critical city and county facilities, Cleveland Hopkins International Airport and the future Cuyahoga County Central Services complex, to be located in Garfield Heights.

"This \$130 million Climate Pollution Reduction Grant from the EPA will be transformative for Cuyahoga County and Northeast Ohio," said Cuyahoga County Executive Chris Ronayne. "With these resources, we will be able to expand our solar infrastructure, reduce our reliance on fossil fuels, and decrease greenhouse gas emissions. Thank you to the Biden-Harris administration for delivering this investment in Cuyahoga County's future. This award underscores our commitment to climate leadership and to policies and programs that pave the way for a cleaner, greener and more sustainable future for all."

"This historic investment in Cleveland and our municipal electric utility, Cleveland Public Power, will reduce the cost of electricity for our residents, help power our airport operations, and benefit community members by transforming landfills and brownfields into "brightfields" that generate power from the sun," said Cleveland Mayor Justin M. Bibb. "It is true climate justice to bring the financial and health benefits of a clean and green economy into the homes of communities like Cleveland that have

seen decades of economic disinvestment."

Legal Aid helps those struggling with legal issues regarding money

Money issues can cause an enormous amount of stress and fear. Concerns about money can determine where you live, if you will be able to have basic needs met, the quality of life you will have and more.

Money stressors not only include size of your paycheck and debt, but also include employment and unemployment issues, foreclosures, estate planning, taxes and bankruptcy. The Economic Justice Group at The Legal Aid Society of Cleveland helps clients navigate these difficult legal matters surrounding money.

"The Economic Justice Group provides direct representation for clients needing legal assistance related to money and advocates for systemic change that will result in greater economic stability for our client community," said Barbara Barreno-Paschall, senior attorney in the Economic Justice Group. "The five legal areas that the Economic Justice Group focuses on are employment, consumer, tax, bankruptcy and estate planning."

When assisting with employment issues, Economic Justice attorneys help clients remove barriers to employment such as sealing criminal records or applying for a Certification of Qualification for Employment, sealing and expunging juvenile records and employment discrimination.

Clients experiencing consumer legal issues are assisted with mortgage and property tax foreclosure, debt collection lawsuits, car repossessions, student loans, payday loans, auto title loans and medical or nursing home collection.

Economic Justice attorneys also help clients settle disputes with the Internal Revenue Service about personal federal income taxes and file for Chapter 7 bankruptcy protection. They also help with estate planning, including helping clients with wills and clearing tangled property titles.

There is one area of law where the Economic Justice Group receives the most requests for assistance: bankruptcy.

Shoplifting

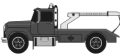

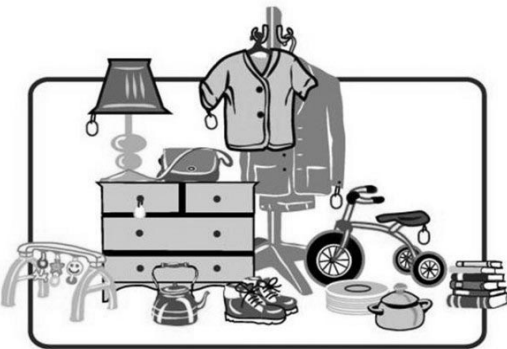
