M.H. Council honors Dr. King; other meetings held recently

Maple Heights Council honored the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. at its last regular meeting, and also held committee meetings recently to discuss legislation which may be considered at future council meetings, Council Clerk Leonette

At its January 4th meeting, the only piece of legislation on the Addiction' series agenda was a resolution in honor of Dr. King, whose birthday was officially observed as a national holiday earlier this week.

Citizens were encouraged to remember the civil rights leader "by living out his teachings as we continue to work for the day when the dignity and humanity of every person is respected."

Committee meetings

Council held a Housing and Economic Development Committee meeting last week to discuss a nuisance abatement ordinance presently in committee, and also to review a waiver of the 100 percent escrow requirement that was passed in July 2016, which expired on January 1, 2017.

The escrow legislation, which waived the 100 percent escrow requirement to correct violations resulting from point of sale inspections, was intended "to offer an incentive to owneroccupied homeowners to purchase properties in the city... for the enumerated six month period of time... participants in the program will be required to sign an affidavit attesting to the fact that the purchaser will reside in the property as their primary residence for two years, commencing upon the issuance of an occupancy permit by the Chief Building Official."

Also discussed at last week's meeting was the city's rental registration process, Cicirella stated.

Another meeting, this one of the Public Works and Safety Committee, was also held last week on the topic of security and surveillance in the city.

City officials stated that applicants must have a bachelor's degree in accounting or an equivalent of five years experience in municipal or corporate finance. 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

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
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Seventh grade basketball team donates winter-wear to MHPD
