Indicators reflect real progress made with Garfield Hts. finances

The financial health of Garfield Heights has improved dramatically since we were in fiscal emergency several years ago. Last week the Ohio state auditor issued a new "Fiscal Physical" tool to help cities and counties stay fit.

The auditor's office reports that local leaders throughout Ohio have performed well in navigating the financial storms they've faced. As mayor, I am pleased that the state auditor's office is proactive in its efforts to provide tools to local governments to

in hospital assist us in evaluating our financial condition. But I also feel it should be more vigilant as to presenting the financial health indicators within the proper framework and context of the city's historic and current financial performance.

Basically what the state auditor's office reported we already know. The analysis provided by the state auditor's office is nothing new to the city administration. We continue to budget and forecast in an extremely conservative manner. Garfield Heights scored in the "positive outlook" category for half of the auditor's financial health indicators. And we are diligently working to improve what the auditor's office considers less than positive indicators. The state auditor's office reports that 82 percent of Ohio counties and 92 percent of Ohio cities have at least one "cautionary" or "critical" indicator.

Here in Garfield Heights our bills are paid on time. Our loan payments are made on time and our debt has been cut in half since 2009. We are in much better shape financially than we were when I became mayor. I can assure everyone living and working in Garfield Heights that my administration is committed to our city being a financially stable and healthy community.

He is described as a white male in his late 30s or early 40s, wearing gloves, a black winter hat at G.H. library and gray Cleveland Cavaliers sweatshirt.

Nurse robbed parking lot; teen arrested

A nurse at Marymount Hospital in Garfield Heights told police she was robbed at gunpoint while in the hospital parking lot on January 23rd. The suspect, a teenager, has since been arrested, according to Garfield Heights Police Chief Robert Byrne.

In a police report, the nurse told police she was parking her car around 6:30 p.m. when there was a tap at her window. She looked over and saw a male had a gun pointed at her and demanded her belongings. She gave the teen her wallet and cell phone and he fled towards E. 126th St.

Cleveland Clinic PD told police they'd continue the investigation and were able to track the woman's cell phone to a home on McCracken Rd. The resident gave police permission to search the home but the cell phone was not found.

Around 10:30 p.m. that night, the victim and her husband checked on the status of her cell phone and discovered that a male had taken a photo of himself with the cell phone's camera which he uploaded to the internet about an hour after the robbery.

A 17-year-old McCracken Rd. resident was later arrested for the crime but details on the arrest were not available as of press time. The police report said the teen admitted to using a gray revolver to rob the nurse and the weapon was later found in the teen's bedroom.

On January 27th, a man walking his dog on Oak St. found a wallet on the ground and brought it to the police station. Officers said the wallet belonged to the nurse.

Byrne said the 17-year-old was charged with aggravated robbery in Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court.

City of Bedford pulling out of regional dispatch center

After what was termed "an exhaustive analysis," Bedford City Manager Mike Mallis announced this week that the city will be leaving the Southeast Emergency Communications Center, a regional dispatch center based in Bedford Heights that has been in operation since 2015.

After several years of planning and construction of a new facility, the cities of Bedford, Bedford Heights, Maple Heights and Garfield Heights consolidated their 911 dispatch services into the SECC, built next door to the Bedford Heights police

Issues with the level of services provided by the dispatch center were discussed at recent Bedford council meeting, at which residents voiced their concerns about calling 911.

In a statement released on Monday, Jan. 30, Mallis stated: "The city of Bedford, after an exhaustive analysis, has decided to step away from the Southeast Emergency Communications Center (SECC).

"While it has been a pleasure to work with the other three communities and the administrator, it is in the best interest of the city, both from a financial and operational standpoint, to move in another direction," Mallis stated, adding, "The city of Bedford constantly reevaluates operations and programs to determine what is best for the future of the city.'

He continued, "We thank the administrator and the other three communities for their partnership, wish them continued success, and hope to work together in future endeavors."

How Bedford will handle its future dispatch services, and when the formal parting from the SECC will take place, was not immediately disclosed. More information will be released as it becomes available, officials stated.








form of a vote in front of this council, and/or in front of an ordinance or rather as a referendum to the voters. So with that said, I will vote no for the ordinance as it stands, and I am sure my colleagues will pass it in its form because it's fair, it's needed, but I think we can do better."

Koci responds

Koci said that administration and council had been discussing the city's financial situation for years, especially after Ben Venue Laboratories closed in 2013, taking with it 1100 jobs and a huge chunk, estimated at almost half, of the city's annual

UK-based Hikma Pharmaceuticals, which includes its U.S.based subsidiary, West-Ward Pharmaceuticals, bought the Northfield Road plant in 2014, and later sold it to Danish pharmaceutical company Xellia. In the ensuing years, Xellia has taken over portions of the facility, but at a fraction of Ben Venue's staffing levels. Packaging and distribution have recently been given the green light by the FDA, with manufacturing possibly on the horizon for 2018. However, the city has to address its financial issues now, Koci said.

"We have talked for years about this," Koci said, "when the pharmaceutical company closed their doors, that this day would come. It's here. And we have to pay the tax, too. So we're in the same boat. None of us want to do that, but it's the only method we've seen to get the most, to keep our city running, to keep it a good city, and keep us moving forward."





Markiewicz inducted into NEO The Maple Heights Branch of Baseball Coaches Hall of Fame

Dennis Markiewicz, retired baseball coach for Garfield Heights and Holy Name high schools, was recently inducted into the Northeast Ohio Baseball Coaches Association (NEOBCA) Hall of

Markiewicz started his coaching career 23 years ago at South High School. He then became the head coach at Garfield Heights High School for 15 years (winning 201 games), and always dreamed of coaching at his alma mater, Holy Name. Six years ago, Jack Richardson, athletic director at Holy Name High School, hired him. He guided Holy Name's baseball team to the Final Four his first year at the helm.

"I told everyone it was my destiny to guide Holy Name to the Final Four, and it was up to the guys to win it," Markiewicz said. We came short and lost to Arch Bishop Akron Hoban 3 to 2."

Markiewicz went on to win 94 games in six years at Holy Name, and reached the Regionals three times. His totals were 295 wins and 215 loses in 21 years.

'My goal in my baseball career was to get as many players scholarships in college. I believe it was at least 80 players in the past 21 years," he said.

"Many people have asked me who the most talented players I ever coached were. There were several of them, but the most talented was Dan Ward. He was drafted in the 48th round to Texas, threw 92 miles per hour and had a great glove at third base, and he had power.

"Other players were Bret Sullivan, Tyler Sullivan and Anthony Smith (Holy Name), Brad Copen, Justin Dobies and Clint Mahoney (Louisville All-American 2006) (Garfield Heights) just to name a few."

The NEOBCA represents over 170 schools in Northern Ohio. "I am honored to be picked," Markiewicz said. "I had great coaches, players, administrators, and I want to thank all of them for making baseball a great memory for me."

The ceremony for the NEOBCA Hall Of Fame will be at Canal Park Rubber Ducks Stadium on June 20.




