Suspect apprehended in Georgia for 13-year-old's Jan. 29 murder in Bedford

On Sunday, Jan. 29, two teenage boys, ages 13 and 15, were shot in the area of Corkhill and Lee Rd. South in Bedford. The 13-year-old boy, a resident of Maple Heights, later was pronounced dead as a result of his injuries.

Bedford PD Deputy Chief Rick Suts reports that the suspect, David Harden III, was identified, and through the cooperative efforts of the Bedford Police Department, the U.S. Marshals Northern Ohio Violent Fugitive Task Force, the U.S. Marshals Southeast Regional Fugitive Task Force and the Columbia County Sheriff's Department, he was located and taken into custody in Martinez, Georgia, on Feb. 9, and is being extradited back to Bedford.

Maple Hts. Police seek help in identifying female driver

On Sunday, Feb. 12, the Maple Heights Fire Department responded to a smell of smoke in the apartment complex of 16202 Maple Heights Blvd., about 4:25 a.m. The Bedford Heights Fire Department also responded to assist.

While the fire departments were investigating, a female in a gray, four-door vehicle dropped off an unresponsive female passenger and then left the area quickly. BHFD personnel attempted lifesaving measures and transported the passenger to the hospital, but she was not able to be saved. The cause of death is still under investigation.

The deceased was identified and notification is being made to next of kin. She was 26-years-old.

Garfield Hts. police officers honored for saving woman from burning home

Garfield Heights Patrolmen Mike Malak and Youssef Ihiri received a special resolution at the Monday night meeting of Garfield Heights Council for their heroic rescue of a woman from a burning house on E. 84 St., near Garfield Blvd., on Tuesday, Feb. 7.

During the resolution presentation at the meeting, Garfield Heights Fire Chief Kenneth R. Strope, Jr. commented that "the person in that house would have perished if not for these two officers."

Officer Malak was patrolling the area about 2:30 a.m., when he spotted a lot of heavy smoke rising from Garfield Blvd./Warner Rd. area and immediately called dispatch, as stated in the resolution.

Officer Youssef was patrolling nearby and immediately responded and found the location of the burning house on E. 84 St. Malak opened the common door to the double home to alert both up and down units of the danger and both officers called out to whoever might be inside as the house was engulfed in flames.

Awoman then emerged from the front door of the lower unit, waking up after hearing the voices of the officers and they escorted her to safety. She was the lone occupant of the building.

Other units arrived on scene and neighboring homes were successfully evacuated. The fire was eventually extinguished thanks to the efforts of Garfield Heights firefighters.

The resolution from council the officers received at the meeting, sponsored by Ward 3 Councilman Jason Seither, noted that "the city of Garfield Heights would like to commend their heroism as they have proven to be exemplary members of the law enforcement profession."

Cleveland Police distributing vehicle anti-theft devices

The Cleveland Division of Police secured a limited number of club-like, anti-theft devices for use on 2015 -2021 Kia and Hyundai vehicles. The devices were donated to the Division of Police courtesy of KIA through the efforts of First District Commander Jarod Schlacht.

These steering wheel locks will be made available on a first come - first served basis to city of Cleveland residents and to citizens who work full-time in the city of Cleveland. Those eligible may request a device, free-of-charge, by bringing their vehicle to one of the five neighborhood police districts.

Salary raise for Garfield Hts. Council members passes after three readings

After its scheduled three readings, an ordinance to raise the salary of council members to \$18,000 a year effective Nov. 13, 2023, the first day of the next council term, was approved by Garfield Heights Council at its regular Monday night meeting.

An ordinance to raise the salary of the mayor to \$100,000 per year, effective Dec. 1, 2025, after the Nov. 2025, mayoral election, was passed to a second reading. The salary of the mayor was cut to \$85,000 per year in 2009, during the city's fiscal emergency and hasn't been raised since, it was stated at the meeting.

Fatal shooting of teen, ongoing UH talks updated at Bedford Council meeting

The recent fatal shooting of a 13-year-old boy in the city and the ongoing talks between Bedford and University Hospitals on last year's closing of UH Bedford Hospital's emergency room and other facilities were among the topics of discussion between residents and city officials at the council meeting Monday night, Feb. 6.

One resident expressed concerns about the Sunday, Jan. 29, shooting incident at Corkhill Rd. and Lee Rd. South, very close to the Bedford-Maple Heights border, that resulted in the death of Hysheen Thomas, 13, of Maple Heights. Another boy, 15, was injured in the shooting, according to Bedford police reports.

Both boys were taken to MetroHealth Medical Center, where Thomas died of his injuries, the Cuyahoga County Medical Examiner's Office stated. The other boy was hospitalized. Bedford police continue to investigate the incident.

City Manager Mike Mallis said what happened in the incident was a tragedy and he has full faith in the Bedford PD and their ongoing investigation of the case. "I'm pretty confident we're going to have a resolution to that very quickly," Mallis said.

The 280 staffers from Bedford have been transferred to other UH facilities in the system, hospital officials have stated.

In response, Bedford officials filed a restraining order in Cuyahoga County Common Pleas Court following the closure, seeking to retain emergency services at the Blaine Ave. hospital. Judge Steven Gall subsequently rejected the restraining order. However, the case has been continued, Koci said, after Gall encouraged ongoing discussion between the city and UH officials.

Mayor Stan Koci explained, "The whole reason we are in court with UH, and we are still fighting and working with them to get some resolution, is we have plenty of ideas. But because we are in litigation, there's a lot I can't say."

"We want emergency care here," he continued. "We've been for fighting this, and we will continue to fight for it ... but our hands are tied because of the courts.'

Chickens in city?

Also, many residents at the meeting requested that Mayor Koci, Mallis and council members consider allow-

dences to supply eggs and to be used as food.

One resident stated, "We are here to ask our city council to reevaluate the current restrictions that we have regarding backyard chickens. Most of our neighboring communities have already amended their ordinances to allow for backyard chickens. We are simply asking for the same opportunity to reap the benefits that our neighbors are already sowing.

Another resident said that having chickens would contribute to the "hometown feeling" of Bedford, while another resident expressed that raising chickens in the city could end up being a needed food source in an uncertain economy.

No statement was given at the meeting on whether the city would consider permitting chickens to be kept in the future.

Incidents reported at G.H. Middle School

Garfield Heights Police reports were filed last week on three separate incidents at Garfield Heights Middle School, one involving a student and the other two involving teachers who all said they were victims of crime at the school.

The first report was taken on Feb. 9, when a woman told police her daughter, who is autistic, has recently been the victim of bullying and physical assaults at the middle school by other students. She said on Feb. 7, her daughter was assaulted by an older female student and she had viewed a video of the altercation and wishes to pursue charges. The video showed the female student punching the woman's daughter and throwing her to the ground. The video was forwarded to the Youth Bureau for charges and identification.

In a Feb. 10 report, an officer spoke with a male teacher at the middle school, who stated on his online submission that he was assaulted by a male eighth grade student. He said the student was going back and forth to the classroom door trying to wave and entertain someone in the hallway. The teacher told him to stop and get back to his desk. The student started swearing and screaming at the teacher and then was asked to leave the classroom by the teacher, who walked to his desk to call and have him removed. The student threw a Chromebook at the teacher, hitting him in the chest and arm before security arrived. The teacher told police he has pain in his chest and arm due to the assault.

A report was also made on Feb. 10, by a female teacher at the middle school who told police that about 2 p.m. that day, she believes someone stole her vehicle keys off her desk at the school. Her car was parked in the middle school lot and she was concerned someone would try to steal it. She said she was going to get a ride home and get her spare keys and return for her car. She said there is a school camera right outside her door and assumes there will be video footage around the time of the incident. School security will review the video.
