GE Foundation awards grant to **Boys & Girls Clubs of Cleveland**

The GE Foundation has awarded a \$15,000 grant to Boys & Girls Clubs of Cleveland (BGCC) in support of BGCC programs that help youth get ready for college, build character and become better citizens.

The grant will help fund BGCC's Diplomas to Degrees, a college-readiness program that engages teenage Club members in a series of workshops focused on planning for their postsecondary education, and two signature character and citizenship programs, Torch Club and Keystone Club.

The Torch and Keystone clubs provide middle and high school-aged youth with opportunities designed to cultivate character and leadership skills in a supportive, small-group

Boys & Girls Clubs of Cleveland provides safe, fun places for kids after school. BGCC serves more than 8,600 youths annually at 15 sites in Cleveland, East Cleveland, Cleveland Heights and Garfield Heights.

"We are grateful for the GE Foundation's commitment to our kids," said Ron Soeder, BGCC's president and CEO.

"This grant supports important programs that help youth prepare for college and become better citizens. We serve the kids who need us most – those who live at or below the poverty line - and we could not do our work without the support of partners like the GE Foundation," Soeder continued.

In the 2014-15 school year, 92 percent of local high school seniors who regularly participated in BGCC activities graduated from high school, and 64 percent of teens aspired to complete post-secondary education.

Diplomas to Degrees workshop topics include career and higher education options, understanding the college application and financial aid processes and staying on course during the transition from high school to college. Throughout their participation in Diplomas to Degrees, youth are engaged in discussions and activities that help them to better understand what it means to be "college ready," what steps make up the college application and acceptance process, and how to develop a college plan that synthesizes their academic interests, personal strengths and career goals.

Such transitional support is crucial for the youth population served by BGCC, many of whom are the first in their family to attend college.

In addition to guiding Club youth through important academic milestones, BGCC is committed to preparing youth to be leaders in their communities. Two signature character and citizenship programs, Torch Club and Keystone Club, provide middle- and high school-aged youth with opportunities designed to cultivate character and leadership skills in a supportive, small-group context.

Four arrested in M.H. carjacking

Bedford Heights police arrested four individuals believed to be involved in a carjacking and shooting in Maple Heights last

On Friday, Feb. 17, Maple Heights police officers were called to the 19300 block of Raymond Street for a report of a carjacking and a male shot. According to a press release, officers found one male had been shot in the thigh and a female had been pistol whipped. The suspects were two black males who were both armed with handguns and the vehicle taken was a 2001 Nissan

The male victim was taken to Metro Hospital and was released Sunday night. Maple Heights Police Chief John Popielarczyk said he is recuperating from his injuries. "The female, who sustained minor injuries, was treated at the scene," Popielarczyk

On Sunday, Feb. 19, after Bedford Heights police officers observed the vehicle in their city, a pursuit occurred and four people were taken into custody; two female juveniles, one male juvenile and an adult male.

Huntington Bank on Turney robbed again

Huntington Bank at 4932 Turney Rd., Garfield Heights, was robbed last Thursday afternoon and the suspect is still at large. The bank was also robbed on January 30th.

A Garfield Heights police report said the man came into the bank just before 12:40 p.m. February 16th and gave a note to a teller that said, "I need \$20,000 I do not want to hurt u, give me the money." The teller gave him an unknown amount of money, including a dye pack, and the suspect fled on foot.



A customer said she was making a deposit when the suspect nudged her out of the way to rob the teller helping her. She said the suspect also stole the cash she was depositing, according to the report.

A witness said he saw the suspect run towards David and Alexander rds. after the robbery and saw a cloud of red dust around him, indicating the dye pack had exploded, but police were unable to find the suspect, according to the report.


G.H. man shot by possible pellet rifle

An 18-year-old Garfield Heights resident was shot by what he said was a pellet rifle while walking northbound on East 93rd Street in Garfield Heights on February 9th, according to a Garfield Heights police report.

In the report, he stated he was walking on East 93rd around 11:30 p.m. and saw a black Jeep station wagon with four men inside driving northbound along side him. He stated he approached the car, assuming it was someone he knew, and a backseat passenger lowered the window. The 18-year-old then heard a "pop," felt numbness in his left arm, and the car sped off towards Grand Division, according to the report.

The teen said he ran to a friend's house on East 93rd and discovered he had been shot in the upper left shoulder. He was taken to Marymount Hospital where medical personnel could not determine if he was struck by a pellet rifle or a small caliber handgun, according to the report. He was later transferred to Cleveland Metro Hospital for further treatment.



Witnesses described the shooter as a light-skinned black male with short dreadlocks and a small beard. Officers were able to watch security camera footage from inside the bar and saw a man fitting that description escorted by two other men believed to be involved in the incident. Police noted the suspect also had a small tattoo under his right eye and a star-shaped tattoo on his right hand.

Officers found a single spent casing in the parking lot adjacent to where the 26-year-old was shot. The Detective Bureau continues to investigate the incident.
