Vietnam Veterans Day marked tonight in G.H.

Veterans, military, respective families, fellow citizens and those who served alongside our troops throughout the world are invited to attend a Vietnam Veterans Day celebration tonight, March 29th, at the Garfield Heights Civic Center, 5407 Turney Rd.

Equal Honor For All, in partnership with Greater Cleveland Veterans Memorial Inc., Joint Veterans Council of Cuyahoga County, will sponsor the event hosted by the city of Garfield Heights and Mayor Vic Collova.

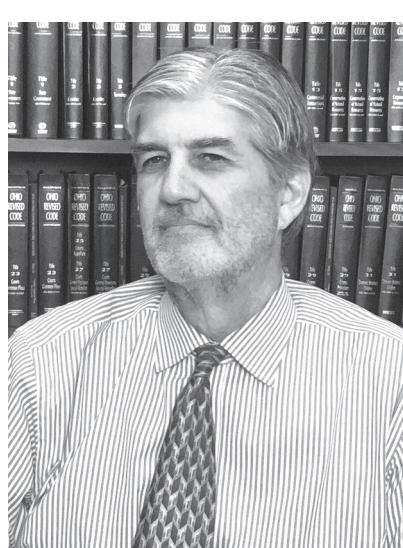
A social with refreshments will begin at 6 p.m. and the program, with Master of Ceremonies Edward Pfahl and guest speaker Gary Singletary, will begin at 7 p.m. RSVP for refreshments count to info@equalhonor.org or 216-456-2220 with name, telephone and number attending.

Singletary, born in 1950, was raised an "Army Brat," the son of a career U.S. Army officer. Though he never served in Vietnam, he has lived and experienced the consequences of war through his father's duty assignments.

He will present the Vietnam War from his first recognition of Vietnam in the 1962-63 timeframe (seventh grade at General George S. Patton Junior High School, Ft. Leavenworth Kansas) through the final phase of the Vietnam War in 1975.

Singletary brings a perspective of that period through the eyes of a child, a teenager graduating from high school in South Korea, and young adult full of personal peripheral experiences as one growing up in that period's military environment. Singletary, whose father and relatives served in Vietnam, and himself a Vietnam Era Army veteran having served in the immediate aftermath of the American involvement in the war, will present a dimension not readily found in the literature about this challenging time in our nation.

After graduating from Texas A&M University in 1972, he was commissioned and attended flight school. Singletary feels privileged to have flown helicopters in the Army for a brief period (1973-1974) along

the DMZ in Korea with some of the best aviators in the world — those who had flown in Vietnam. Now a lawyer, he serves as Chief Counsel for the City of Cleveland.

March 29th is a special date for Vietnam veterans and the nation. In 1973 the last American combat troops were withdrawn from Vietnam and the last POWs returned home. In 1974 it was first proclaimed Vietnam Veterans Day by Presidential order and again in 2012.

Fugitive of the Week

The Northern Ohio Violent Fugitive Task Force is offering a reward for information which would lead to the capture of fugitive John Eskridge.

Earlier this year, Eskridge allegedly violently assaulted his girlfriend and two of her teenage children. Eskridge has also failed to report his change of address with the Cuyahoga County Sheriff's Department for his requirements to register as a sex offender, according to information provided by the Northern Ohio Violent Fugitive Task Force.

Eskridge is a 37-year-old black male standing approximately 5'03" and weighing 155 pounds. He has brown hair and brown eyes. Eskridge has ties to the Garfield Heights area, Twinsburg and Euclid. Eskridge should be considered dangerous and violent, said the Task Force.

Vote by mail, early voting to open for May 2nd special primary election; issues on ballot in Bedford, Maple Hts.

Residents of 19 municipalities in Cuyahoga County are eligible to vote in the Special Primary Election being held May 2. Voters may Vote by Mail or vote early at the Board of Elections starting next Tuesday, April 4.

A proposed municipal income tax increase is on the ballot in the city of Bedford. Voters will decide if they want to raise the levy on income from 2.25 percent to 3 percent per annum to pay for current expenses, infrastructure needs and general operation of the city, including police personnel, effective January 1, 2018.

A city school district renewal levy is on the primary ballot in Maple Heights. The renewal levy would provide for the emergency requirements of the district in the sum of \$6,708,732 and a levy of taxes to be made outside of the ten-mill limitation estimated by the county fiscal officer to average 25.96 mills for each one dollar of valuation, which amounts to \$2.60 for each one hundred dollars of valuation, for a period of ten years, beginning in 2018, first due in calendar year 2019.

People who wish to cast ballots by mail need to obtain, complete and return their Vote by Mail applications as soon as possible. To request an application visit: www.443vote.com or call 216-443-VOTE (8683). Vote by Mail ballot applications are also available at all public libraries. The Board of Elections will begin mailing ballots to voters April 4.

Early voting is available from April 4 through May 1. The Board of Elections is open for early voting on the following dates:

Polish Constitution Day returning to Fleet

When an especially colorful Cleveland Polish Constitution Day Parade steps off in Slavic Village on April 30th, the occasion will be especially joyful. The festivities will help inaugurate the new Fleet Avenue, once the main street of Northeast Ohio's largest Polish community, and now transformed by a multi-year construction project into the First Complete and Green Street in Cleveland.

Polish Constitution Day is pageantry, music, poetry, colorful flags and costumes, delicious food and neighborly fun. The holiday is as old as history and as current as today. Drafted four years after the United States Constitution and heavily influenced by it, the document was the most advanced political statement of its kind in Europe. For over two centuries, in good times and bad, it endured as a symbol of personal liberty and national pride. Its revolutionary nature is captured in Article 5: "All authority in human society takes its origin in the will of the people."

Clevelanders will honor it in much the same way as their ancestors honored it upon their arrival as immigrants to America in the late 19th century: with music, religious liturgies, cultural programs, street performances and sociability.

To prepare, the East 63rd Street Block Club will lead scores of volunteers in cleaning

the public spaces of the old neighborhood on Saturday morning, April 29th. Flowers will be planted and brilliant red-white bunting will be hung along the parade route. And then the following festivities will begin, spanning several days and filling some of the most cherished cultural sites of the Warszawa Historic District:

Saturday, April 29th: The Polish Constitution Day Concert at the Shrine Church of St. Stanislaus, featuring classical and contemporary music performed on the church's Steinway by pianist Konrad Binienda, along with colleagues from the Cleveland Institute of Music, at 7 p.m. Freewill offering.

Sunday, April 30th: The Polish Constitution Day Mass at St. Stanislaus, accompanied by brass and percussion, 10 a.m.; the Polish American Cultural Center's Sunday Brunch, 6501 Lansing Ave., food for purchase, 11 a.m. to 1 p.m.; the Polish Constitution Day Parade, stepping off at 1:30 p.m. from the west end of Fleet Avenue at Washington Park and proceeding eastward to East 65th St., then turning south for closing ceremonies at the Cultural Center on Lansing Avenue. 4806 to participate as an individual, family or group; Parade after-party at 3 p.m., featuring performances by parade artists, music by DJs John and Mark Sleszynski and food for purchase.

Wednesday, May 3rd: Polish Constitution Day Reception at the Polish American Cultural Center, with cultural readings, music and food, beginning at 7 p.m. Free.

Friday, May 5th: Four Eagles Award Banquet of St. Stanislaus Church, beginning at 6 p.m., to be held at the Tremont Cityside Ballroom. Honoree is the late Cleveland Housing Court Judge Raymond Pianka. For tickets call 216-341-9091.

Later in May: Polish Constitution Ceremony in University Circle, which this year will be temporarily relocated from its normal location at the Kosciuszko Monument due to construction of the Nord Family Greenway.

M.H. Council passes 2017 budget

Maple Heights Council passed its 2017 budget in the amount of approximately \$19 million at a meeting earlier this month.

The General Fund takes up about \$11.2 million of that total. Within the parameters of the General Fund, which covers expenditures for salaries, operations and other expenses in the city and its departments, this includes the police department (about \$2.8 million); fire department (about \$2.8 million); mayor's office (about \$210,000); finance department (about \$271,000); lands and building department (about \$893,000); legal department (about \$203,000); building commissioner (about \$586,000); and council (about \$131,000).

Other appropriations outside of the general fund include the street lighting fund (about \$497,000); water/sewer fund (about \$850,000); police levy

fund (about \$528,000); fire services levy fund (about \$495,000); senior services fund (about \$440,000); and solid waste collection fund (about \$1.5 million).

Approximately \$662,000 was appropriated for the ambulance billing fund; about \$677,000 for the street construction, maintenance and repair fund; and about \$1.2 million for the bond retirement fund.

Resolutions approved

Council approved three resolutions authorizing Mayor Annette Blackwell and Fire Chief Vito Kavaliunas to apply for, accept and expend non-matching grant funds for the fire department.

The first resolution is to apply for gift cards, not to exceed \$5,000, from the Home Depot Foundation, for a Community

Bedford official says Meals program will continue

Addressing recently announced possible federal budget cuts to the Meals on Wheels program, Councilman Greg Pozar, at the Bedford Council meeting last week, expressed his concerns and reassured local residents who benefit from the home delivered meals that the service would continue.

"Let's keep Washington out of here," Pozar said, in letting residents know that he and other city officials, as well as the many workers and volunteers who made Meals on Wheels possible, would do everything they could to ensure that the program would remain in effect for senior citizens and disabled, chronically ill or otherwise homebound residents, who might be unable to leave their homes for a hot noontime meal.

The Southeast Clergy Meals on Wheels "is NOT funded by any government agency," according to information provided by the city of Bedford, which also states, "Our program is dependent upon donations from individuals and groups to help subsidize the cost for each client. Clients are requested to make a monthly donation to help cover costs if they are able."

Pozar said the Meals on Wheels program received a small amount of funding in the form of Community Development Block Grants, but stated, "I don't think Meals on Wheels is dependent on that either. But what they are dependent on are donations and civic involvement by you," referring to residents.

"I encourage the people in this room to continue volunteering, to continue donating to Meals on Wheels and let's keep Washington out of here," Pozar said.

Garden Club honored

Mayor Stan Koci gave a presentation honoring the Bedford

Garden Club on the occasion of its 90th anniversary.

The Garden Club was founded in 1927 and has been consistent in its purpose "to promote improvement of streets and public parks" by planting flowers and trees to beautify the city. The organization has also supported city efforts and projects; holds plant sales, including an upcoming sale on May 12 and 13; and encourages and educates residents in their own home gardening.

Garden Club members presented the city with a \$500 donation for flowers for the Union Street Bridge, and praised ser-

vice department workers for their continued assistance in the club's activities. "This is a great collaboration," Koci said.

City officials also welcomed members of the Hawthorne Valley Youth Council in attendance, made up of students in the Bedford City School District. They were at council to inform city officials of a bill they have prepared proposing seat belts be mandatory on school buses in Ohio.

The Youth Council members, some of whom are sponsored by the city, will be traveling to Columbus to present their pro-

Garfield Hts. Council notes

Garfield Heights Council met in regular session Monday night and passed an emergency ordinance granting a one percent increase in pay for all city employees who are members of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees union Local 2729, AFL-CIO, and Ohio Council 8.

Full-time city employees who are AFSCME Local 2729 members, AFL-CIO and Ohio Council 8 were also granted a one-time lump sum payment of \$300, effective June 2, 2017.

Also passed by council were the following:

- An emergency ordinance directing City Engineer David Krock to prepare the necessary plans and specifications, per OHM Advisors proposal, and go out for competitive bids for the paving of Grand Division and Midwest avenues and authorizing payment of costs for the project.

- Preliminary legislation for Transportation Boulevard improvements.

- Declaring the month of April to be Autism Awareness Month and April 2, 2017 to be World Autism Awareness Day throughout the city.

- Authorizing application to the Lexipol Subscription Subsidy Program through Ohio Plan Risk Management, Inc., to update and maintain the city's law enforcement policy manual.

- Two resolutions were passed to ratify the appointments of James Feeney and Douglas Piascik as members of the Land Reutilization Program (land bank), both effective January 1, 2017 and ending December 31, 2020.

Mayor Vic Collova noted that trees being cut down along Granger Road hill are part of the rock-scaling project there to provide for safety along the roadway.

Krock said the rock-scaling is scheduled to begin this August.

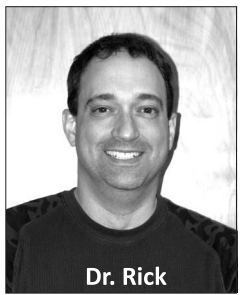

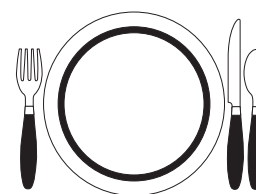

Maple Heights Council passes 2017 budget

(Continued from Page 1)

Impact Grant "for purchase of tools, materials or services to replace two entry doors and windows in the living quarters of Fire Station No. 1."

The second resolution is to apply to the Firefighters Support Foundation, Inc., a non-profit corporation, for an equipment grant to purchase automobile extrication equipment, not to exceed \$40,000.

And the third resolution is to apply for grant funds in the amount of \$35,000 from the Ohio Department of Public Safety, Division of Emergency Medical Services, "for a Priority I Training and Equipment Grant for purchase of a heart monitor/defibrillation unit and other medical equipment."

Finance director hired

Tracy M. Smith, CPA, was hired as the city's new finance director after council passed a resolution approving her appointment. She fills the position vacated by former Finance Director Irene Crowell, who resigned her post at the end of December.

Protests funding cut

Council also passed a resolution,

sponsored by Council President Richard Trojanski, protesting the Ohio Department of Health's decision to completely eliminate the AIDS Task Force of Greater Cleveland's federal funding in its fiscal year 2017-2018 budget.

"For nearly 35 years the Aids Task Force of Greater Cleveland has served the Greater Cleveland Metro with excellence in community and public health services, despite fluctuating government support for people at risk for, and living with, HIV/AIDS," the legislation states, adding that the ATGC's "tireless advocacy and service dedication have resulted in maintaining the health and well being of thousands of our area's most vulnerable residents," estimated at between 800 and 1200 persons annually. This includes 25 residents of Maple Heights, according to the resolution.

However, the ATGC "has just received verbal notice that it will not continue to receive [the federal] funding within 30 days," with the amount in jeopardy being \$559,681.

"The lack of courtesy in failing to provide written notification

with detailed justification of this funding disallowance is alarming," the resolution stated, adding that "nothing less than ODH's full restoration of the funding... is an acceptable response... Ohio Department of Health Director Richard Hodge is respectfully urged to restore the funding, to ensure that so many vulnerable lives dependent on these life-saving quality services and proven support continue to receive... the services they've become accustomed to."

Salt storage plans approved

Council also approved a resolution for the city to enter a contract with Caves Road Construction Company, for construction of a new salt storage facility at the Dunham Road Service Center.

City Engineer Ed Hren prepared plans and specs and provided for advertising for bids for the new building, and after another company failed to comply with conditions set forth late last year, the city had to go out again for bids earlier this year, according to the legislation. Caves was awarded the contract in the amount of \$114,550, with an additional alternate line item bid for a concrete pad in place of an asphalt pad in the amount of \$6,880. This brings the total bid amount to \$121,430.

Earliest start date for the project was given as April 15, 2017, with a 75-day completion timeline, Hren stated, adding, "The project costs up to an amount of \$135,000 will be reimbursed to the city... by the Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District through the Community Cost Share Program."

Police found a bullet hole in the station wagon.

The 32-year-old driver of the minivan was arrested for felonious assault, carrying a concealed weapon, weapons under disability and drug abuse.

Officials offered condolences to Councilwoman Sandy Spinks and Mayor Koci, both of whom suffered losses in their respective families within a few days of each other earlier this month. Spinks' mother, Frances "Jean" Smith, passed away at age 86 on March 8, and Koci's father, Stanley C. Koci Sr., passed away at age 91 on March 13.

Spinks and Koci gave moving tributes to their loved ones, with

Spinks honoring her mother's lifelong volunteerism and service to veterans groups and other organizations in Louisiana.

Koci said his father served in World War II in Panama, stating on a lighter note, "He liked to point out that no Germans crossed Panama while he was there," to the appreciation of the audience. "He was a good guy and we'll remember him well."

Agenda items passed

Council passed all items on the agenda, including an agreement with the State Auditor's Office for the performance of the 2016 city audit, as required every year, at a cost of \$34,645. This was cheaper than having

the audit done by a private entity, City Manager Mike Mallis said.

Passed was legislation amending a previous ordinance, for continuing membership in the Ohio Municipal League Joint Self-Insurance Pool and providing for payment, starting April 1st of each year for 2017, 2018, and 2019. Cost is \$165,031 per year and protects all of the city's assets, Mallis stated.

An ordinance to make additional appropriations for current expenditures of the city during 2017 was passed. The reasons were stated in a memorandum from Finance Director Frank Gambosi: Increases in appropriations in the General Fund due to the purchase of the Recreation Department pickup to replace the truck involved in an accident; transfers out to the Safety Forces Levy to cover a lack of necessary revenue from decreased real estate taxes; transfers into the General Fund

out of the Rainy Day Fund to cover \$100,000 in expenses; Community Development Block Grant Fund to allow expenditures of program income from sale of Neighborhood Stabilization Program homes; and State Highway Fund to account for salt purchases in early 2017.

Also in the Capital Improvement Fund, appropriations are to account for retainage funds paid to the contractor performing work on the street program, Gambosi stated.

Council also passed a resolution opposing the proposed centralized collection of next profit tax returns, as the city has been advised of a proposal by Governor John Kasich and his administration "to institute a state operated program for the centralized collection of Ohio Municipal Income Tax... any taking of the authority of local governments to collect and administer local income taxes is

contrary to Home Rule Authority... granted by the Ohio Constitution."

A motion was approved, appointing Barbara Tapocsi to the Bedford Historical Preservation Board.

Announcements

Mallis advised residents who have not yet made appointments to have their new water meters installed to call the company listed on the notices. "It is imperative to call the company and get those scheduled," he said.

Mallis also said that he, Koci and other city officials were more than willing to give presentations to discuss Issue 1, the proposed .75 percent income tax increase on the May 2 primary ballot.

He said all information on the proposed issue is also available on the city's website, www.bedfordoh.gov.
