Citizens Bank in Bedford robbed

The Citizens Bank at 453 Broadway Ave., Bedford, was robbed Monday morning. The following information is according to Vicki Anderson, an agent with the Cleveland Division of the FBI.

The unknown suspect entered the bank around 10:50 a.m. and presented a demand note threatening that he had a weapon, though a weapon was not observed. The teller gave the suspect cash and it is believed that he fled the bank in a 2005 silver Toyota Camry. Witnesses believe he entered the passenger side of the vehicle implying there could be a getaway driver, however, a driver was not observed. No physical injuries were reported.

He is described as a black male, approximately 6'2" and approximately 210 pounds.

Last Sunday, April 2, the Shrine Church of St. Stanislaus marked the 12-year anniversary of the death of the beloved Polish pope, Saint John Paul II (Karol Wojtyla), at the 10 a.m. Mass. The service concluded with veneration of three relics, those of John Paul II, St. Maximilian Kolbe and St. Padre Pio (the Padre Pio chalice).


The relic of John Paul is housed at St. Stanislaus, but the relic of Maximilian Kolbe was brought to Cleveland by Brother Donald Thielsen, OFM Conv., of the National Shrine of St. Maximilian Kolbe in Libertyville, Illinois, and the Padre Pio chalice is kept by The Padre Pio Prayer Group of Cleveland. The late Pope John Paul II canonized Maximilian Kolbe (he died at Auschwitz during World War II taking another's place in a death cell). St. Padre Pio, known for the "stigmata," was revered by the young Karol Wojtyla, who met him in the late 1940's after the war. During their meeting, Padre Pio told Wojtyla that one day he would be pope.

The three relics, all connected in some way, came together last Sunday, the anniversary of the date John Paul II died 12 years ago. What a testimonial to the three men who walked in the footsteps of the Savior, Jesus Christ, and continue to this day to witness the faith by their examples.

SISTER ANNE MARIE SNYDER, OP, formerly known as Sister John Vianney Snyder, died on March 30th, at the Dominican Life Center in Adrian, Michigan. She was 94 years old and in the 76th year of her religious profession in the Adrian Dominican Congregation.

Sister Anne Marie was born in Cleveland to Frank and Mary (Sadar) Snyder. She graduated from Ursuline Academy in Cleveland, and received a Bachelor of Philosophy degree in English, and a Master of Education degree in Administration, both from Siena Heights College (University) in Adrian, Michigan. Sister Anne Marie also was a chaplain certified by the National Association of Catholic Chaplains.

Sister ministered for over 31 years in education in Chicago, Illinois; Cleveland, Toledo, Wickliffe and Cincinnati, Ohio; and Gilbert and Casa Grande, Arizona. She was principal for five years at Nativity School in Cleveland. Sister was also a staff member for four years at St. Theresa Home in Cincinnati, and four years at Casa Maria Retirement Center in West Palm Beach, Florida. She was a pastoral-care worker for 12 years at St. Alexis Hospital in Cleveland, and a staff member and driver for seven years in the Florida Chapter Office in West Palm Beach. Sister became a resident of the Dominican Life Center in Adrian, Michigan, in 2001.

Sister Anne Marie is survived by two brothers, Joseph Snyder of Sagamore Hills, and Paul Snyder of Brecksville, and a sister, Jean McGrath of Cleveland. She was preceded in death by an aunt, Sister Regina Clare Sadar, also an Adrian Dominican.





Dear Sirs;

In an article by Judith Goldsworth, Wednesday, March 29th, 2017, with the headline: "Bedford Official Says Meals program will continue," Mr. Pozar misstated certain facts regarding funding of the SE Clergy Meals on Wheels program.

Although it is true that our organization receives no direct government funds, there is a great misunderstanding that we will not be impacted by a cut in budget to the Older Americans Act. Two-thirds of our clients receive federally paid for meals which are administered by the Western Reserve Agency on Aging, a government entity, through two of our working partners: Maple Heights Senior Center and Rose Center for Aging Well. They provide us 60 meals each day (paid for by the federal government) for qualified residents of Bedford, Bedford Heights, Oakwood Village and Walton Hills.

Mr. Pozar is correct that we do receive donations from private entities, charitable groups and others, monies which are applied to subsidizing meals for persons who don't qualify for federal meals: those under 60 years old, those requiring special diets. These donations from private sources and our clients themselves also help to keep our program operating, paying our rent, insurance and even office supplies. To my knowledge, in the last 10 years, we have never applied or received any Community Development Block Grant.

Our 85 volunteers and wonderful donors will continue to provide service and assistance to keep our program running, but we also need the continued commitment of federal funds for a growing senior population to make it all possible.

We suggest in the future if Mr. Pozar wishes to answer questions about our Meals on Wheels Program, he might want to check with our officers to determine the facts first. We hope that the misinformation Mr. Pozar provided will be corrected as soon as possible.

I write this as an open letter to the residents of Maple Heights. I appreciated the article in last week's Neighborhood News concerning the levy renewal ballot issue on May 2nd. The information was accurate, but the ballot language that the newspaper was quoting can be confusing to anyone. I had a couple of readers call me with questions. So I wish to clarify a few important points:

1. This is strictly a renewal of an operating levy for the same annual fixed dollar amount of \$6,708,732. This is the same amount the voters renewed in 2012.

2. There is no second school levy on the ballot. There are no additional taxes being voted on. This is strictly a renewal levy and is the only issue on the Maple Heights ballot.

3. This levy represents a significant amount of the current operating budget, approximately 15 per cent of the budget.

4. The money from this levy allows for the continuation of educational opportunities for our students, salaries and benefits for staff, utilities, repairs and maintenance of our buildings and buses, and the instructional supplies and equipment that our

County Executive Armond Budish and Cuyahoga County programming initiative, that provides a one-stop-shop for supporting older adults in Cuyahoga County.

Just one call to a central number will connect staff at senior centers, senior apartment buildings and other senior service organizations with programs for their senior clientele. These programs cover: financial wellness, nutrition education, health and wellness, and aging mastery.

"Initiatives like 'One Call for Wellness' equips professionals who work with older adults with the tools and programs needed to help our older residents to age at home, rather than an institution, and to empower seniors to take an active role in their own successful aging," said Budish.

The pilot project is a partnership among Benjamin Rose Institute on Aging, the City of Cleveland Department of Aging, ESOP, Fairhill Partners, the Greater Cleveland Food Bank and Rose Centers for Aging Well, LLC. This initiative is funded in part through a Senior Center Innovation Grant awarded by the Cuyahoga County Division of Senior and Adult Services through the Health and Human Services Levy.

"We know that senior centers, senior apartments and municipal offices on aging need a more coordinated, cost-effective approach to providing services to their clientele. 'One Call for Wellness' provides such an opportunity," said DSAS Administrator Dr. Richard Jones.

"Having a one-stop-shop approach like 'One Call for Wellness' will make it easier for seniors to access the programs that give them a path to economic security and healthy living that reduces social isolation," Jones continued.

The National Council on Senior Centers estimates that one in six seniors are at risk for social isolation, which can often lead to debilitating illnesses like chronic depression, heart disease, cognitive decline and an increase risk of suicide.
