Robbers come up empty at PNC

Four would-be bank robbers went into the PNC Bank at 7101 Broadway Ave. in Slavic Village last Friday but came up empty, according to Cleveland police. This is the third time this location has been robbed or attempted to be robbed in the last five months.

According to the police report filed, a bank teller said she was working at her window when a man came in around 3:40 p.m. followed by three others. The first male pulled out a gun and said, "This is a bank robbery," and told everyone to get down.

The teller told police the suspect then jumped over the counter and pointed the gun at her and demanded money. She was unable to open a locked drawer and the suspect opened a second and third drawer but both were empty. At that time one of the other suspects yelled, "Let's go, she pushed the alarm," and they fled out the back door.

A security guard outside the bank said he saw the bank manager lying on the ground inside the bank with a man pointing a gun at him. The guard ran across the street and flagged down a state trooper on traffic duty and told him the bank was being robbed.

Dispatch said the males fled in a blue Jeep Liberty with the back window broken out and the Ohio State Highway Patrol was possibly in pursuit of the vehicle.

The report said officers saw the Jeep in the 6400 block of Heisley Avenue parked head-on with a Dodge Caravan. Officers saw four males walking from the Jeep to the Caravan who fled on foot when they saw police. Next to the Jeep, which was left running, police found a pair of jumper cables and a silver revolver. A second gun was also found in a yard on Heisley.

Private security camera footage from a nearby home showed the males running through the yard. Police found a black jacket and two gloves that were inside out in the resident's yard. The Detective Bureau is continuing the investigation.

Maple Heights Council approves applying to Safe Routes program

The city of Maple Heights is taking an active interest in helping school children in the city get to and from school safely, as council approved a resolution to apply for the Safe Routes to School program at a meeting earlier this month.

The project cost is estimated at \$399,268.91, and Congress has set aside monies for Safe Routes to School (SRTS) projects, administered through the Ohio Department of Transportation, according to the legislation.

"The city will work closely with the Maple Heights City Schools to improve student safety as children go to and from school, which is a transportation activity eligible to receive federal funding," the resolution stated.

Mayor Annette Blackwell and City Engineer Ed Hren were authorized by council to apply for the STRS funds to ODOT. If it gets the funding, the city would pay 100 percent of the construction cost over and above the maximum amount provided by ODOT.

Council also approved a resolution authorizing Blackwell and Police Chief John Popielarczyk to apply for \$5,000 in grant funding to purchase tools, materials and services to install counters and cabinets in the squad room kitchen of the city's police station.

According to the legislation, the Home Depot Foundation offers Community Impact Grants to fire and police departments, "using the power of volunteers to improve the physical health of the community to repair, refurbish or modify, specific to ADA compliance or safety regulations, community facilities such as fire and police stations."

The Home Depot grants are given in the form of gift cards to buy tools, materials and services, up to \$5,000, and projects must be completed within six months after the grant is awarded.

Council also passed a resolution authorizing Blackwell and Hren to apply to the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) for an Ohio NatureWorks Grant for improvements to Dunham Park.

The ODNR provides financial assistance to communities for the purpose of providing public recreation through the NatureWorks grant program.

Council passed a resolution setting its summer meeting schedule for this year, announcing that meetings will be held on the following Wednesdays at 7 p.m.: June 7, July 5 and August 2. The regular meeting schedule will resume in September.

All council meetings will be held at the Maple Heights Senior Center, 15901 Libby Rd.

Bedford residents can go to the Bedford Police Department, 165 Center Rd., Monday through Friday, between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m., to ask for assistance getting into a treatment program. An information packet will be completed and a treatment liaison coordinator will facilitate getting the resident into a treatment program.

"We are well aware of the crisis created by the heroin/fentanyl epidemic. It is our belief and commitment that we can make a difference in the community and provide an avenue for treatment," said Bedford Police Chief Kris Nietert in a press release.

with information about your heart attack risk."

The test uses CT scanning to show the amount of calcium that has accumulated in the walls of the arteries in the heart. The more calcium present, the higher the heart attack risk. Scores can range from 0 (lowest risk) to greater than 400 (highest risk). Calcium scoring has been available for several years, but few people have had it done because it is a relatively costly test, and it is not covered by insurance, according to a UH press release. UH decided to make the test available at no cost because of its significant potential to impact the health of northeast Ohio residents, the release continued.

"We recommend calcium scoring for men age 45 or older and women age 50 or older who don't have coronary artery disease but have at least one risk factor for it," Dr. Cireddu says.

Special presentation on President Lincoln's assassination, funeral

DeJohn Funeral Homes and Crematory will host a special presentation on President Abraham Lincoln's assassination and funeral on Wednesday, May 10, at 7 p.m. at the DeJohn Funeral Homes & Celebrations Center, 12811 Chillicothe Rd. in Chesterland.

Everyone in the community is welcome to an open viewing of the replica coffin from 4-7 p.m. There is no cost to attend the viewing or presentation but an RSVP for the presentation is requested.

"We will relive an epic moment in history, including having a replica of the coffin in which President Lincoln is buried. Many people are not aware how elaborate his coffin was for the time or that his funeral set the standard for the modern day funeral service we know today," said Ross DeJohn III.

The presentation will be filled with many interesting facts about Lincoln and his funeral procession which lasted 22 days and traveled across several states - including Cleveland. Not until President John F. Kennedy did so many thousands witness a funeral.

Large funeral processions were held at each major stop along the funeral route, as the coffin was transported from the train to the place of public viewing. Cleveland was the only city to hold its public viewing outdoors, as they did not have a building large enough to accommodate the large crowds of mourners. It is estimated that one million people viewed President Lincoln's body from the time of his death until his burial in Springfield, Illinois.

The Village of Cuyahoga Heights Council met last Wednesday, April 12, and passed the following:

Clothing recycling encouraged in G.H.

Garfield Heights residents can recycle clothing, shoes and household textiles using the city's free curbside program. The program is separate from the Kimble curbside collection, yet occurs the same day.

Once a resident determines that items are no longer useful, they can place them in a green Simple Recycling bag, provided

by the company at no cost, and put it on the curb the same day as their regular rubbish pick up. Bedding, belts and ties, hats and gloves, stuffed animals and more can be recycled.

Collected items are sorted and graded for condition. Top quality materials, approximately 20 percent of what residents no longer want, are sold to local thrift stores. The vast majority of clothing collected, about 80 percent, will not be resold in the United States, so it is further sorted for international export or broken down for raw materials.

Only five percent ends up as waste. The other 95 percent is exported as secondhand clothing, converted to other materials such as cleaning rags for industrial and residential use, or recycled into fiber used in home insulation, carpet padding, etc.

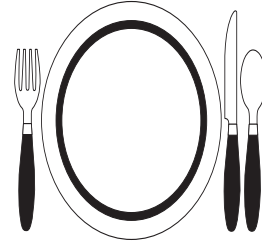

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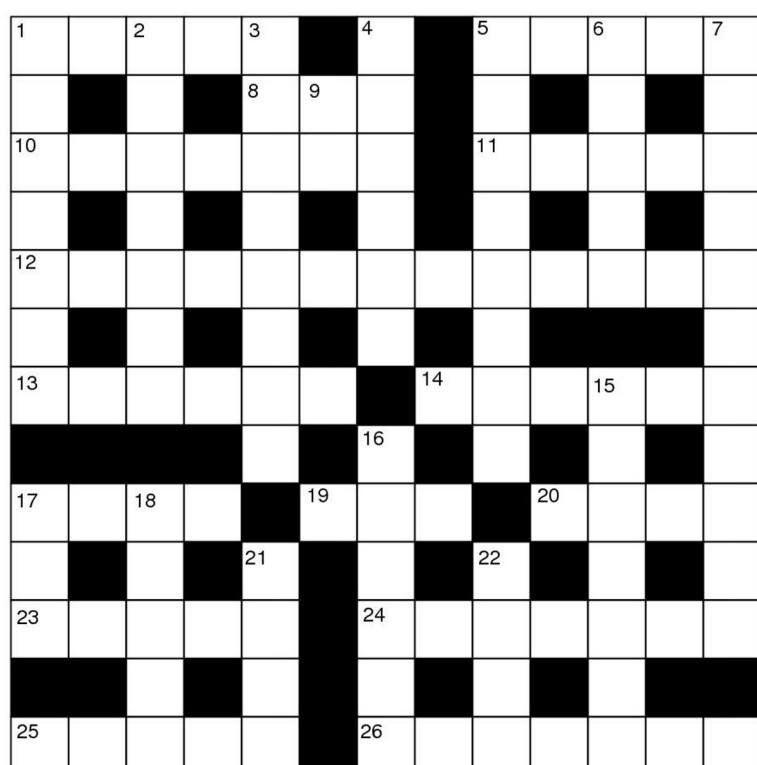
