Two five-year levy renewals for the city's police and fire departments, in the amount of 2.0 mills each, will appear on the November ballot in Maple Heights, after council approved legislation at a meeting earlier this month.

including revenue from the re-opened Fannie Mae Candies plant; the Pennzoil-Quaker State income tax; and the opening of Bogg Equipment, Bruder Manufacturing, Prime Meats, Signature Health, Save-A-Lot, Southgate Bowling Lanes, Shoppers World, and Sides-To-Go, among other businesses.

- That competitive civil service examinations shall not be required for appointment of the police or fire chief, or lateral entry transfers.

- That the city's civil service rules, regulations, orders or decisions prevail over conflicting state law provisions.

- That the mayor shall have the authority to appoint the police chief and fire chief, and shall have the authority to remove each only with the consent of two-thirds of council members.

The levies date back to 1998, and have been renewed several times, the most recently in 2012 for five years. Providing revenue to fund salaries, equipment, buildings and operations, they currently generate about \$526,000 apiece annually, according to Maple Heights Finance Director Tracy Smith.

Other revenue will come from property taxes, income taxes and other sources.

The city is required to adopt a budget each year for the upcoming year, and a timeline was set forth for each year the city remains in fiscal emergency. This timeline includes updated estimated revenue projections, submission of departmental budgets, submission of an estimate for appropriations by Mayor Annette Blackwell, completion of budget hearings on the mayor's estimate, forwarding of the proposed appropriations ordinance to the financial supervisor, and adoption of the budget for the upcoming year by December 31st of each year.

Passage of the resolutions authorized Council Clerk Leonette Cicirella to submit both renewals to the Cuyahoga County Board of Elections for appearance on the ballot, city officials stated.

Financial recovery plan passed

After consideration at past meetings, council passed a resolution for an amended financial recovery plan intended to get the city out of fiscal emergency by 2019.

The actual fund deficit stated for 2016 is \$1.76 million, and a 2017 fund deficit of \$1.28 million is projected by the end of this year.

The projected fund deficit for 2018 is about \$907,000; 2019-\$579,000; 2020-338,000; 2021-\$337,000, according to the recovery plan figures released by the city.

Substantial revenue to the General Fund is expected to help reduce the deficit this year,

All financial reports from the city's finance department must be completed on a monthly basis and copies sent to the administration, according to the plan.

"Based on the implementation of the items in this plan, the city anticipates applying for termination of the fiscal emergency status in 2019," both Blackwell and Council President Richard Trojanski stated.

Other legislation

An ordinance amending the city's codified ordinances on Certificates of Occupancy "to further the goal of promoting and encouraging responsible rental property ownership," was placed on first reading at the meeting.

The new section states that certificates of occupancy will not be issued by the building commissioner for the following reasons: delinquent property taxes or unpaid liens, or unpaid balances for nuisance abatement costs. This ordinance will be discussed for possible passage at future meetings.

Also placed on first reading for further discussion and potential passage in the future were three ordinances proposing charter changes that may appear on the November ballot:

A resolution approving the salary of \$38,064 to Natalie D. Wade as a full-time executive assistant to Mayor Blackwell was also placed on first reading.

Garfield Hts. police news



By Amber Weisbarth Aggravated Robbery

An employee of Zak's Deli on E. 131 St. told police that around 7:30 p.m. on May 22nd, two men wearing black jackets, gloves and hats covering their faces came into the store. One of the men pulled a revolver from his pocket and demanded money from the employee. He complied and the males fled on foot.

Police said they had already been in that area checking on a

maroon SUV that had been parked in the 13200 block of Thornhurst Dr. A caller said there were three males in the SUV for about 20 minutes and it appeared two of them were hiding their faces and wearing gloves. Police got the call about the robbery several minutes after the other caller said the SUV fled the area northbound on E. 136th St.

A security camera at the deli captured the incident; a copy was to be forwarded to the Detective Bureau. Police believe

the males parked on Thornhurst were the same males who committed the robbery.

Criminal Damage

The owner of Crowned Barber Shop on Garfield Blvd. told police he saw a black pick-up truck parked in front of his business on May 27th, around 10:30 a.m. A few minutes later he heard a popping noise and saw his front door had three BB holes in it, then saw the pick-up truck drive away. He said about a half hour later the same truck drove past his business but he didn't recognize the driver.

Littering

On May 24th, around 7:35 a.m., police were dispatched to a home in the 4700 block of E. 93rd St. and found a man sit-

ting on the edge of a dumpster in the driveway going through its contents and throwing trash onto the lawn. Police identified the man, 55, of Garfield Heights, and learned he had an active felony warrant for vandalism with the city of Cleveland. He was taken into custody and police found a marijuana pipe in his pants pocket. Cleveland police was unable to confirm the warrant at the time so the man was released with a summons for littering and marijuana.

Robbery

A 15-year-old E. 90th St. resident told police he left his home on his bike on May 26th to head to the library on Turney Rd. around 9 p.m., and came across 7-8 males he did not know also on bikes. They asked the teen if

he'd like to hang out with them and he agreed. They headed towards the library, then rode their bikes down an alley near Happy's Pizza and Garfield Heights High School and began playing with their cell phones. The teen said that as he was looking at his phone, one of the unknown males punched him in the face several times, snatched his cell phone from his hands and all the males rode off on their bikes in different directions. The teen walked to Happy's Pizza to call police. He suffered a swollen lip from the attack.

Shoplifting

The assistant manager of Save-A-Lot at 4790 Turney Rd. told police a man came into the store on May 23rd, around 11 a.m., and stole four bags of

shrimp, valued at about \$56, then got into a tan SUV and fled.

Police watched security camera footage and were able to identify the suspect and owner of the vehicle, a 38-year-old Cleveland resident, through his license plate. A copy of the footage was to be given to police for further action.

While working as School Resource Officer at the Garfield Heights High School on May 25th, around 7:20 a.m., and officer was contacted by the assistant principal who said a student was followed to school by the owner of a local convenience store after he was observed stealing several packages of gum. All six packs of gum were found inside the teen's backpack. Charges are pending through the Youth Bureau.

"We are excited to see 37 new homes being constructed in our community with an investment of over \$9 million dollars," Brancatelli said. "The opportunity to build on these vacant lots

is another step towards the rebuilding of our community and it is a strong sign that we are seeing market recovery."

The project was made possible by the Ohio Housing Finance Agency, Enterprise Community Investment, Huntington National Bank, the City of Cleveland and the Cuyahoga County Land Bank.

The homes will be available to families at or below 60 percent of the area median income. CHN's Lease Purchase program offers a pathway to home ownership to low income families who could not qualify for conventional financing. The program starts with 15 years of affordable rental housing followed by home ownership in the 16th year.

Financed by the low income housing tax credit, after 15 years

CHN helps individuals and families buy their home by providing support and financing through its Lease Purchase model.

CHN has built or rehabilitated more than 2,000 houses in the Cleveland area since 1987 when it began linking housing tax credits to home ownership opportunities.

What makes these homes green? All are well insulated, have low energy lighting, high efficiency windows, water saving fixtures and power saving appliances. In addition, many of the homes will also be equipped with solar panel arrays.

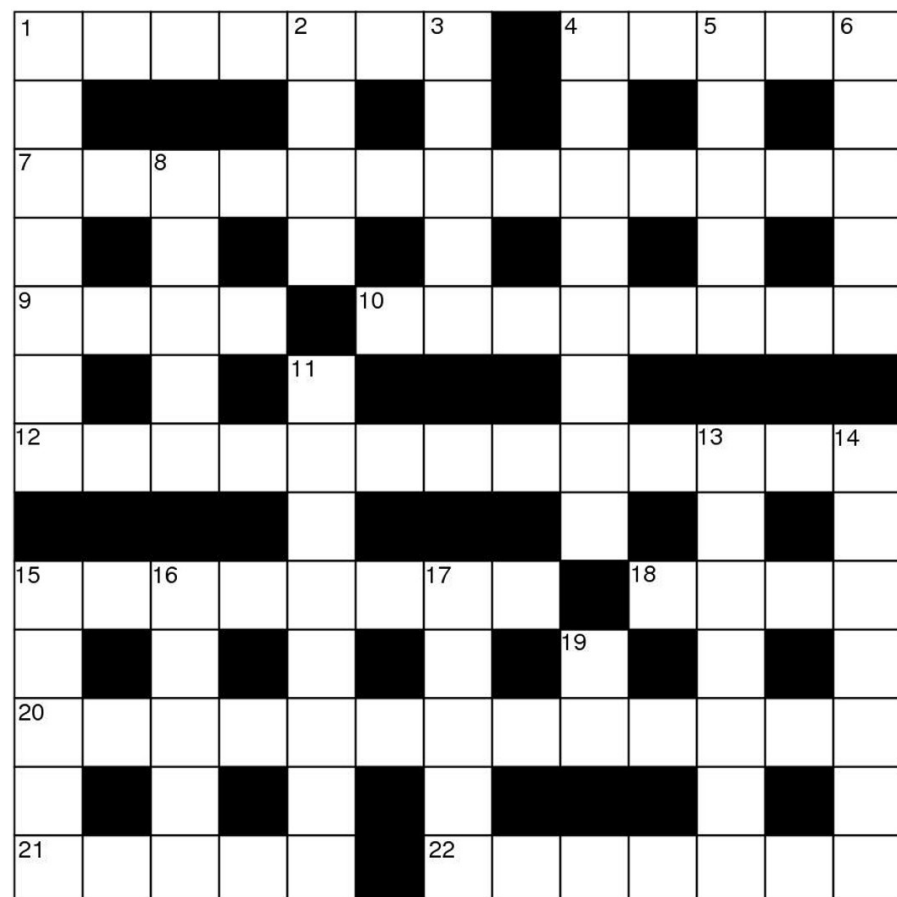
