Safe At Home program

Rebuilding Together Northeast Ohio, local affiliate of the national organization Rebuilding Together, the leading national nonprofit in safe and healthy housing which provides low-income homeowners with critical home repairs, will bring its Safe at Home Program to the



city of Cleveland for a second year. The effort, supported by The Cleveland Foundation, The City of Cleveland's Department of Aging, and Job Corps is going on now in various Cleveland neighborhoods.

Safe At Home exemplifies the efforts central to the mission of Rebuilding Together, helping to solve the urgent need for safe and healthy housing for every person. Recognizing that unsafe or unhealthy living conditions at home account for many of the leading causes of preventable fatalities, illness and disability, this effort demonstrates the positive effects of home and neighborhood revitalization on the overall health of homeowners, families and communities.

Within the upcoming months, Rebuilding Together Northeast Ohio will serve elderly homeowners and homeowners with disabilities by providing them with a variety of critical home repairs and modifications including: installing grab bars, smoke and CO detectors, handrails and other accessibility modifications. Additionally, the program will provide minor handyman repairs such as: minor flooring, drywall, electrical and plumbing repairs to low-income homeowners who often, faced with diminishing resources, must choose food and medicine over critical home repairs.

Cleveland residents interested in applying for the program should contact The Department of Aging at 216-664-2833 or Rebuilding Together Northeast Ohio at 216-800-8556. In order to be eligible for the program, applicants must live in the city of Cleveland, be over the age of 60 and/or have a disability, have current homeowners insurance, and be up to date on their property taxes or be on a verifiable payment plan with the county. Rental properties and mobile homes are not eligible to be repaired through this program.







New collaboration aims at **Building Futures through** housing rehab program

Slavic Village Development, Union Miles Development Corporation, Mt. Pleasant NOW Development 429-1182, ext. 128 or Corporation and Passages, Inc. (Passages) have formed ChrisA@slavicvillage.org. a collaboration, Building Futures, to establish a comprehensive housing rehabilitation program.

The program intends to rehabilitate vacant, blighted houses in Ward 2 and train ex-offenders/returning citizens for employment and income producing opportunities in housing rehabilitation or property maintenance.

"You cannot rebuild a neighborhood simply by tearing down houses," said Ward 2 Councilman Zack Reed. "You have to provide hope and jobs. Therefore I welcome the newly formed partnership which will help us rebuild homes, rebuild neighborhoods and rebuild lives in the hopes of reducing violence here in Ward 2. We must always remember that 'nothing stops a bullet like a job."

Returning citizens accepted to the program will choose between three separate tracks: an eight-week landscaping training program, a 12-week general construction/maintenance program, or a six-month preapprenticeship training program focusing on several construction trades with classroom and hands-on training.

Classes are taught by program instructors, as well as retired construction workers. Students follow a Monday through Friday training schedule from 8 a.m. until noon.

Along with soft skill training in one of these programs, participants will develop basic entry-level skills, familiarity with trade tools, terminology and basic principles, an understanding of apprenticeship opportunities, which are available in the construction trades, and knowledge of various career opportunities within the trades.

Near completion, participants will be placed within an internship opportunity with a local construction company, and upon graduation, program participants will have assistance with permanent job placement and will have gained the following certifications: Basic Construction, Landscape Design, Employment Readiness, Employment Retention, Entrepreneurship, OSHA Safety Training.


