Valley View Police has set up a safe transaction area in the police department parking lot, located at 6899 Hathaway Rd., for residents to safely exchange items being purchased through online classified sites, according to a release on the village's website, www.valleyview.net.

The parking lot, directly in front of the department's main doors, was chosen because it is well lit and under surveillance from cameras at the police station. During **Cuyahoga Hts.** business hours, the location is easily visible to employ ees and police. The spots will soon be marked with **Council notes** visible signs, according to the release.

The Cuyahoga County Department of Consumer Affairs and Cuyahoga County Sheriff, who work together in the county's Scam Squad task force, are issuing the warning in response to multiple inquiries over the weekend from people trying to verify the calls.

'These calls use many subtle cues calculated to make people believe they are really in trouble with the law," said Sheryl Harris, director of the Cuyahoga County Department of Consumer Affairs. "The scammer asks for the victim by name. He gives fake badge and citation numbers. He invites people to call him back at a 216 number. The recording that answers that line sounds plausible - it even directs people who have a real emergency to dial 911.

In the latest version of the scam, a male scammer using a 216 number claims to be "Lt. Brown." He tells people that unless they pay a civil fine, deputies will be dispatched to arrest them. The caller directs wouldbe victims to go to specific stores near them to buy Green Dot cards – which is not a form of payment police accept.

The caller, who has demanded amounts ranging from \$1,500 to \$2,900, tries to stay on the phone with those targeted until they purchase the cards. Some would-be victims said they were on the phone for as long as half an hour. When people call back the

Property survey set to begin in five of Cleveland's eastside suburbs

The cities of Euclid, Garfield Heights, Maple Heights, South Euclid and Warrensville Heights are ready to launch a survey of all 50,000 residential parcels in the municipalities, and the buildings associated with them, to develop an updated snapshot of the condition of these properties.

These cities have endured high rates of mortgage foreclosures, having had between 29 and 41 percent of their housing stock in foreclosure at some point since the housing crisis began nearly a decade ago. Sally Martin, housing director for South Euclid, noted, "By teaming up with other municipalities facing similar issues of vacancy and abandonment and collecting property data, we will better be able to make strategic and cost-effective decisions to support each of our communities.

The survey, conducted by the nonprofit Western Reserve Land Conservancy, will start in early July in Euclid, and then move to South Euclid, Warrensville Heights, Maple Heights and Garfield Heights. It is expected to be finished by late August. The project is being funded by the Cleveland Foundation

Matt White, director of GIS and information services 63rd St. for the Land Conservancy, said surveyors will work in teams of two and gather information while on sidewalks and public rights-of-way. "Our previous property survey work in places like Akron, Cleveland, Dayton, Lorain and Sandusky has proved the importance of having this valuable information," emphasized Jim Rokakis, Land Conservancy vice president and director of its Thriving Communities program.



"City officials and community development officers are able to use survey results to make data-driven decisions to prioritize rehabilitation and demolition of structures with available funds," he concluded.
