Robbers hit two more banks in Garfield Hts.

Two banks in Garfield Heights were robbed within less than two hours of each other last Wednesday afternoon, apparently by different suspects.

According to police reports, the US Bank at 5695 Turney Rd., was robbed at 2:38 p.m. Wednesday, Aug. 23, and the Huntington Bank in Turneytown Shopping Center was robbed at 4:17 p.m. that same afternoon.



US Bank robbery suspect

In the US Bank incident, a bank teller said the suspect approached her teller desk and handed her a handwritten note demanding money or he "will shoot." After receiving the money the man fled through the main entrance in an unknown direction.

The suspect was described as a black male in his 40s to 50s, about 6-feet tall with average build. He wore a red The Neighborhood News offices at 8613 Garfield Cleveland Cavaliers hat and a brown striped short-

The teller told police she did not know the exact Deadlines for advertising and news items for next amount given to the suspect, according to the report.

In the Huntington robbery, a bank teller told police the suspect came up to her in line and asked about opening a checking account. She told him he would have to wait to talk with a manager. He sat for a while American work force and the end of the lazy, crazy days then returned to the line for the teller. The report stated the suspect passed the teller a note demanding money

and she gave him an unknown amount.

A security guard followed the suspect outside and lost sight of him as he fled behind the bank and onto David Drive. GHPD officers responded to the scene and set up a perimeter, and with K-9 Arlo tracked the suspect to E. 96 St. where the track was lost.

The suspect was described as a black male about 25 years old, approximately 5'10" and wearing a blue jump suit with red pin stripes on it.

Last Wednesday's bank robberies bring the total this year to nine in Garfield Heights, of which four of those were at Huntington in Turneytown.

I-480 closure

Sr. Illuminata Maple Hts. awarded Small Block Clubs **Business Initiative Grant**

The city of Maple Heights has been awarded a \$150,000 Municipal County Small Business Initiative Grant from Cuyahoga County in partnership with the Small Business Administration (SBA). The grant will be used to help fund the city's Small Business Partnership Program which provides assistance to small business startups and expansions in the city.

To qualify for the grant, the city was required to contribute \$50,000 to the program, be an inner-ring city, show evidence of capacity to run the program and provide details of their approach. Out of the 22 innerring cities that were asked to submit an application, only four cities were granted the award.

Applicants for funding will include small businesses and manufacturers, ethnic businesses, startups and economically disadvantaged businesses. Activities eligible for funding are property acquisition, new construction, signage, renovations and purchase of machinery and equipment.

inSITE Advisory Group assisted the city with the grant application and will continue to work with Mayor Annette Blackwell to further develop and implement the program as well as develop materials that will be used to help identify and attract small businesses to the city. Emphasis will be on minority and female-owned busi-

Mayor Blackwell will be hosting a roundtable discussion to be held on Tuesday, Oct. 10, to celebrate National Manufacturing Month. The event will focus on G.H. Ward 4 workforce development and early career early education programs for middle and high school students. Additional details and the location for the event will be posted on the city's website at a later date.

Woman dead in Fleet Avenue hit-skip crash

A pedestrian was killed last week in a hit-skip crash on Fleet Avenue in Slavic Village, as reported by Sgt. Jennifer Ciaccia, public information officer for the Cleveland Division of Police.

Ciaccia said that at about 11 p.m. last Tuesday, Aug. 22, a woman driving a 2016 Chevrolet was stopped in traffic at the red light in the eastbound lane of Fleet Avenue at the East 71st Street intersection.

A 38-year-old woman and a 22-year-old man were walking westbound on the north sidewalk of Fleet Avenue, east of East 71st Street. An unknown vehicle headed eastbound on Fleet Avenue drove to the right of the 2016 Chevrolet, side-swiping the right front corner of the Chevrolet, Ciaccia said.

The Chevrolet operated out of control through the East 71st Street intersection, drove off the left side of the road and struck the fence on the northeast corner of Fleet Avenue and East 71st Street.

The Chevrolet continued in an easterly direction and struck the 38-year-old female, who was later pronounced dead at MetroHealth Medical Center.

The suspect vehicle in this case is unknown, possibly a gray or white vehicle of unknown size with left side and front damage. No arrrests in the case have as yet been made, Ciaccia said. Anyone with information is asked to contact detectives at 216-623-5290.

Indiana man shot in S.V.

An Indiana man was shot in the chest last Thursday, Aug. 24, about 4 a.m. in the cab of his truck parked at E. 79 St. and Finney Ave., in the Broadway-Harvard neighborhood of Slavic Village.

Police responded to the scene and found the victim, 66, conscious and breathing and he was taken to MetroHealth Medical Center, according to a police report.

At Metro the victim told police that he had been sleeping in the back part of the cab of his truck when he heard two loud crashes. He looked out the curtain and saw a male reach into the cab's window and grab a silver metal lock-box that was on the passenger seat. The victim then reached for the lock box, which contained miscellaneous tools.

The suspect told him to let go of the box or he would blow his brains out. The victim let go of the box and the suspect fired two rounds at the victim and then he and another man got into a silver vehicle and fled in an unknown direction, the report stated. The Detective Bureau is investigating the shooting.

Cuyahoga County Scam Squad announces new number to report scams

The Cuyahoga County Scam Squad has a new phone number, 216-443-SCAM (7226).

Scam Squad is a project-driven senior financial fraud task force made up of local, state and federal consumer, law enforcement and social service agencies in Cuyahoga County

Scam Squad's goals are to:

- Encourage Cuyahoga County seniors to report scams.
- Ensure scam reports are referred to the agency best suited to investigate.
- •Educate county residents about how to spot and avoid scams.

"Creating a dedicated line for consumers reassures people who are already upset that they've reached the right place," said Sheryl Harris, Director of the Cuyahoga County Department of Consumer Affairs.

"Even if one of our investigators isn't available, callers get a message reminding them that if someone's demanding they pay with a money wire or gift card, it's likely a scam," Harris said.

Cuyahoga County Consumer Affairs acts as a clearinghouse for the task force, and, originally, residents were encouraged to call the Department's main line, 216-443-7035, to report or get information about scams. "We think 443-SCAM is so much easier to remember," Harris said.

Scam Squad members include the U.S. Federal Trade Commission, the IRS, the U.S. Postal Inspection Service, the Cuyahoga County Sheriff's Department, the Cleveland Police Department, the Lakewood Police Department, the Cuyahoga County Division of Senior and Adult Services, the Cleveland Department of Aging, the Western Reserve Area Agency on Aging, the Cleveland Office of Fair Housing and Consumer Affairs, the Cuyahoga County Department of Development, the County Treasurer's Office, the Cleveland Office of Community Affairs, the Ohio Attorney General's Office, the Benjamin Rose Institute, ESOP, Neighbor-Cuyahoga County Prosecutor's Office, United Way 2-1- Bring a blanket or lawn chair.

E. 55 St. improvement update, traffic advisory

The East 55th Street improvement continues in Slavic Village as traffic switches to the west side of East 55th Street from Broadway Avenue to Bower Avenue to perform work on the east side of the street.

Two lanes of traffic - one lane north and one lane south - will be maintained from Broadway Avenue to Truscon Avenue. Three lanes of traffic – two lanes north and one lane south – will be maintained from Truscon Avenue to Bower Avenue. Motorists should be alert for lane shifts and barrels used to direct traffic. This change will remain in place until October 2017.

Access to all businesses, residences and side streets will be maintained during construction. On-street parking will not be allowed during this phase of the project. Advance notice signs will be posted to remind East 55th Street traffic of construction activities.

All travelers are urged to use caution in construction zones.

The East 55th Street Improvement Project is being administered by the Ohio Department of Transportation and includes asphalt roadway removal and replacement. The project is scheduled for completion by October 2018.






