Garfield joins Indy in collecting items for disaster relief in Texas

In his report at the regular meeting of Garfield Heights Council Monday night, Mayor Vic Collova said the city was partnering with the city of Independence to collect items for disaster relief following the devastation in Texas caused by Hurricane Harvey.

Donations sought include water bottles, nonperishable food items, baby food, toiletries, new socks and underwear, which all can be dropped off at the Garfield Heights Service Garage, 13600 McCracken Rd., Monday through Friday, 7:30 a.m. to 3 p.m., until September 28th; donations can also be dropped off at the Garfield Heights Civic Center during regular business hours.

The donated items from Garfield Heights and Independence will then be shipped to Texas in a truck donated by Valley Ford.

The following was among legislation passed by council Monday night:

- Three ordinances dealing with plans, funding mechanism and payment of engineering costs related to the Granger/Transportation Boulevard improvements.

- A Cooperation Agreement with the city of Cleveland for the submission of an Ohio Public Works Commission grant application for the Johnston Parkway Reconstruction Project, which is located in Garfield Heights and Cleveland. The ordinance notes that Johnston Parkway, between McCracken Road and Velma Avenue, has deteriorated and is in need of major reconstruction.

If the grant is okayed, Garfield Heights would pay \$503,938.80; Cleveland

\$992,431.20; and the Ohio Public Works Commission \$3,330,630.00.

- Participation in the Ohio Works Commission State Capital Improvement Program for the Midwest Neighborhood Storm/Sanitary Sewer System Reconstruction Project Phase II.

- Lease-purchase agreement for the purchase of an ambulance, as well as lease-purchase agreements for other vehicles for various municipal departments, including the police and service departments.

- Declaring the month of September to be Prostate Cancer Awareness Month.

- Authorizing the social services director to apply for grant funding for the Garfield Heights Senior Center through the Western Reserve Agency on Aging.

- Resolution thanking Royal Landscape-Garden-

ing, Inc. for its hard work "which has improved and beautifully enhanced the landscape of the Garfield Heights Civic Center," the resolution states.

- An emergency resolution requesting advances in tax settlements for fiscal year 2018.

The next regular meeting of council will be Monday, Sept. 25.

Maple Hts. approves bill to put security cameras in District 6

In an effort to improve safety for residents and serve as a possible deterrent to crime, Maple Heights Council last week approved legislation to buy and install security cameras in District 6 of the city.

The contract with Security Installations, LLC, of Cleveland is for purchase and installation of closed circuit television monitoring cameras, in an amount not to exceed \$10,000.

Over the past few months, council's Public Works Committee discussed the proposal by Security Installations "with the goal of dampening and abating the impact of crime on the streets of Maple Heights, especially in areas containing vacant, abandoned and foreclosed residential homes and commercial buildings," according to the legislation.

Councilwoman Sharri Thomas, who represents District 6, recommended that her district serve as a "test area" for the cameras, which will also provide night vision surveillance, the resolution stated.

District 6 includes most

of the northeast section of the city, including portions of McCracken, Libby, Warrensville Center, and Northfield roads; portions of Maple Heights Boulevard, Fairway, Gardenview, Homewood, Longview, Nitra, and Raymond Street; and the entirety of Camden, Clampher, Clare, Franklin, Hansen, Hillgrove, Mayville, Milan, Mountville, Portland, Prayner, and Watson Road, according to the Maple Heights street directory. City officials have not yet stated exactly where the cameras would be installed in the district.

Guidelines stated

Thomas enumerated guidelines for the security and surveillance program, which included:

- At least three residents per street form a Street Council to assist with fundraising and monitoring the program on their street.

"There is a special city fund earmarked to abate nuisances in our district," Thomas said. "So if the street has foreclosed or vacant homes or at least three criminal nuisance calls

which include vandalism to vacant properties, criminal or gang activity, home invasions of any kind, property theft, etc., the street can receive assistance in the form of cameras to assist in abating these issues."

- Once it is determined that a street qualifies for

the funds, the Street Council will hold an initial meeting to introduce the program, discuss criteria, logistics, camera placement and costs.

•The Street Council will work with the District 6 Neighborhood Association to raise the funds, with the recommendation that the street councils consider fundraisers, in addition to asking each resident of the block for a onetime investment of \$60. The funds raised will be placed in a separate account, established by the nonprofit association for each participating street, and once the street has raised its portion of the funds, the District 6 Neighborhood Association will send a check for installation, which will begin within 30 days of the payment, Thomas stated.

•Cameras will be installed on utility poles and digital video recorders (DVRs) will be installed in the host house.

•A community monitor-

ing committee will be established through the Neighborhood Association, to be comprised of qualified citizens, including ex-military, law enforcement, security guards and retirees, and will be subject to a required screening and background check, Thomas stated.

"This group's responsibility includes working in tandem with the district councilperson, police department, administration, courts, law department, vendor, etc., to offer tech support as well as having access to sensitive information by monitoring cameras, retrieving surveillance data, and issuing community alerts," she said.

•If there is a crime in progress or recently committed, a community alert will be released via text message, letting neighbors know that there was criminal activity on their street and to be vigilant and alert.

•There will be a Crime Stopper Facebook page that will legally post information that can help solve

a crime, Thomas stated, adding, "If you believe this is a valuable and worthy cause, please encourage your neighbors to get involved and invest in our neighborhood."

Other legislation

Council approved an ordinance to amend the codified ordinances of the city regarding composition and appointment of council committees, "to increase the effectiveness of each committee by allowing council members from each district to choose a committee that best fits their strength and ability."

Standing committee chairpersons and members will be determined and appointed by the elected council members of each district, according to the legislation. If council members cannot decide the appointment of a committee, then the council president will make the appointments.

Council also passed a resolution to place the cost of trash collection on Maple Heights property taxes for 2018. The monthly rate for next year will be \$18.75 per residential unit, and \$9.38 for each residential

unit for residents qualifying for Homestead Exemption as of June 1, 2017, according to the legislation.

In July council passed a resolution to create and maintain a "pocket park" at the southwest corner of Mayville and Gardenvue roads for the benefit of city residents. However, after the legislation was passed, it was found that the city in fact did not own the property, necessitating that the resolution be repealed, which council did at last week's meeting.

GHFD awarded grant money for new equipment

In 2016, the Garfield Heights Fire Department applied for an "Assistance to Firefighters Grant" which enhances the safety of the public and firefighters with respect to fire and fire-related hazards. The opportunity comes up annually with thousands of applications submitted. This year only 2,500 awards will be given.

"Our goal this year was to obtain a grant to replenish our outdated SCBA's (air tanks) utilized by firefighters to be able to go into fires and other hazardous situations," said Garfield Heights Fire Department Chief Thomas Nemetz.

The Garfield Heights Fire Department recently learned it was awarded a grant for \$123,617 to purchase the new equipment. "This is in addition to the over \$1,500,000 in grant money that we have received in past years," said Nemetz.

"Lt. Dave McKee and firefighter Mark Creque worked on these grants and submitted them without resorting a third party grant writer, which saved the city thousands of dol-

lars," said Nemetz. Thanks to their efforts, the Garfield Heights Fire Department was able to comply with all current federal standards.

"It is the intent of the fire department to apply for every possible grant in order to keep our equipment updated without putting the burden on the taxpayers," the chief said.

Bedford Council to share \$100K grant for Safe Passages program to help combat opioid addiction

In an effort to combat the ongoing problem with opioid addiction throughout the Northeast Ohio area, Bedford City Manager Mike Mallis announced the city has received a \$100,000 grant to be shared with three other communities in the "Safe Passages" program, as part of a greater statewide initiative, at council's meeting last week.

Mallis said, "We started what's called the Safe Passages program to help with the opioid issue, throughout and all across the country, and primarily in Bedford. We've really partnered with three other communities, and those communities are Olmsted Township, Berea and Newburgh Heights. We applied for a grant, and we were successful in getting that grant. It's a \$100,000 grant, funded through the state."

Mallis stated that Ohio Attorney General Mike DeWine would be making an announcement regarding Bedford's participation in the program. Last week DeWine held a press conference at the Strongsville Police Department, another participant, to announce that he had awarded \$3 million in grants to a total of 40 law enforcement departments and their partners throughout Ohio to create and/or expand programs to combat the escalating opioid problem in the state.

The goal of Safe Passages is not punishment such as

arrest or incarceration, but intervention with the assistance of first responders, law enforcement agencies, rehabilitation facilities and other entities to help addicts and their families, as stated by Mallis and confirmed by DeWine's announcement.

Information released from DeWine's office stated that response teams would be made up of law enforcement officers partnering with drug treatment providers and others, "who assist overdose survivors in the recovery process. Team members visit survivors after an overdose and offer counseling and referrals to drug rehabilitation facilities for assessment, detoxification, ongoing drug treatment, and aftercare."

"These teams work to reduce overdose-related deaths, reduce repeated overdoses per victim, and increase the support network for survivors and their families," DeWine's office stated.

The grant funding will become available to Bedford and the other participating communities by the end of the year.

Break-ins reported

In his report to council, Mallis stated that he wanted council and residents to be aware that "there have been more car break-ins, and we also had four home break-ins recently. That's definitely something that's concerning to us."

Mallis said that police were going to release information on social media

to further inform the public as to what residents could do to help. "Just keep your eyes out. If you see someone riding a bike or walking down the street at 11:30 at night, maybe give us a call... If something just doesn't look right, call. You're not going to bother us," he said.

Councilwoman Paula Mizsak also cautioned residents to be aware of solicitors coming to their homes, stating that residents had the right to ask for identification and also to ask if they had a permit from the city.

Lobenthal promoted, Spinks honored

Mayor Stan Koci swore in John Lobenthal to Sergeant in the city's police department, and honored Councilwoman Sandy Spinks and other participants for their work in the "Hoop It Up" program, in its fourth year, which promotes leadership and cooperation in the city's youth through a structured course of basketball skills.

Legislation passed

Council passed two pieces of legislation regarding the city's ongoing water meter installation project, including a change order for United Systems for residential water meters at a cost of \$30,025.89; and a change order for Utility Sales

Agency of America for the meters at a cost of \$10,880.

Mallis said that the United Systems change order was to purchase the remaining 250 meters that will be needed to complete the installation. The additional \$30,025.89 approved will bring the total purchase cost to \$845,240.89, according to the legislation. The new meters will allow automatic communication with the city's water department, he said, adding, "We will no longer have meter readers anymore."

The Utility Sales Agency change order was to install the remaining meters, and the additional \$10,880 will raise the total installation cost to \$257,919.92, according to the legislation.

Mallis encouraged residents who have not yet had their new water meters installed to call the number included on information sent to their homes to get that done. About 1100 more meters have yet to be installed, and the goal was to get them in residences by November 1st, he said.

Three ordinances were on the agenda regarding demolition of properties at 4 Dewhurst Avenue, 97 Cowles Avenue, and 38 Gould Avenue, all to be performed by TRW Construction LLC.

The legislation for the demolition on Dewhurst was approved, at a cost of \$8,450; and on Cowles, at a cost of \$3,450. The legislation for the demolition of the Gould property, projected cost of \$7,800, was placed on first reading for further discussion.

Council also approved a motion to accept the recommendation of the Planning Commission for Xellia Pharmaceuticals of Northfield Road (the former Ben Venue plant) to demolish four buildings at the property and restore green space.

Council approved the following ordinances: levying assessments on property owners for grass cutting on lots; collecting from individuals who have not paid for multiple false alarm responses; adopting new matter and repealing conflicting legislation in the codified ordinances; a contract for \$147,300 with Campopiano Roofing for repairs to the Solon Road Service Garage Roof; and sponsoring up to three students in the Hawthorne


Valley Youth Council at a cost of \$325 per student per year.

Announcements

The city will have its second Shred Day in the City Hall parking lot on Saturday, Sept. 23, at 9 a.m. This has been funded through a grant, Mallis said.

The Fall Fest at Light of Hearts Villa will take place on Sunday, Oct. 8, Councilwoman Marilyn Zolata stated, with reservations due by Sept. 28. A dinner, drawing and a craft fair will be featured, she said.

Mallis welcomed the city's new Recreation Director, Aaron Thach, to his new post. He said Thach came from Orange Village and had also worked in other communities in the area.

College scholarships will be awarded to the top three individuals or teams of two. The first place winner will receive \$2,500, second-place \$1,500, and third-place \$1,000. Winners will be announced in March 2018 during National Consumer Protection Week and may have their videos featured on the Attorney General's website.

"This contest is a way for students to creatively learn and educate others about important consumer protection topics while earning money for college," DeWine said. "I encourage high school students from across Ohio to participate."

Cleveland police investigate area homicides

Cleveland police are investigating two area homicides that occurred last week, according to Public Information Officer Sgt. Jennifer Ciaccia with the Cleveland Police Department. They appear to be unrelated.

Two males were shot, one fatally, while in a vehicle last Monday evening, according to Ciaccia. A third male in the car was not injured.

Officers were originally called to MetroHealth Medical Center on September 4th, around 11:30 p.m., for two males who had been shot. Dispatch said the males had been in the area of E. 55th St. and Broadway Ave. when the shooting occurred. Police had searched that area but could find no evidence, according to the police report.

Officers at Metro found the vehicle the males had been in; there were multiple bullet holes in the passenger side and one in the windshield in front of the driver's side. Inside the car, in plain view, were two handguns protruding from under the driver's seat, according to the report.

Ciaccia said a 23-year-old male had been driving the vehicle and he was not injured during the incident. According to the police report, the 24-year-old, who later died, had been in the front passenger seat and had been shot in the shoulder, neck, head and foot. A 20-year-old in the backseat was shot in the chin, neck and collar bone area.

Ciaccia said the 24-year-old got into a verbal altercation with a man standing on a corner when persons unknown began shooting at the vehicle. After searching for evidence, police found shell casings and bullet fragments in front of property in the 4900 block of Mead Ave., according to the report. The investigation is ongoing.

E. 93rd St. shooting

On September 9th, around 2 a.m., police were called to the 3500 block of E. 93rd St., near Union Ave., for shots fired and a male shot. Upon arrival, officers located the victim, 49, of Cleveland, on the sidewalk in front of Cheers Bar at 3560 E. 93rd St.

The victim suffered multiple gunshot wounds to his chest, legs and arms, according to the police report, and was taken to University Hospital, where he was pronounced dead around 3:45 a.m.

Ciaccia said the victim was at Cheers with family and friends and upon leaving, a suspect ran up to him and shot him for reasons unknown. The suspect then fled on foot. Multiple shell casings were found in the street in front of the bar, according to police.

Members of the Homicide Unit along with the CCMEO responded to each of the scenes for investigation. These matters will be further investigated. Anyone with information regarding these incidents is asked to contact investigators at 216-623-5464.

Glenn is also the main suspect in four other armed robberies in Euclid and South Euclid during the month of August, and is suspected in an armed robbery last week of a bank in Euclid, according to a news release from the U.S. Marshals Service.

Glenn was arrested last Tuesday night, September 5, at an apartment in the 16000 block of Maple Park Drive in Maple Heights.

U.S. Marshal Pete Elliott said, "Our Task Force worked tirelessly to locate and arrest this dangerous individual who put many

people at risk during his crimes. It was a high priority to get him off the streets."
