
Black Walnut Fest set for Oct. 14th



M.H. Council declares bar 'nuisance;' approves program for city leaf pickup

After repeated reports of assaults, liquor violations, obstruction, numerous other offenses, and several shootings at the All Stars Ultra Sports Lounge at 15755 Broadway Ave., Maple Heights Council passed a resolution declaring the operation a "nuisance subject to abatement" at its meeting last week.

Council's approval of the legislation follows the actions of the Cuyahoga County Prosecutor's Office which it filed a nuisance action against All Stars and Adonis Horne, owner of the liquor permit of the establishment and also listed as the bar's owner, as stated in the resolution.

As a result, Cuyahoga County Common Pleas Court issued a preliminary injunction against All Stars on June 21st of this year, "closing All Stars pending

"We are focused in working with our Cleveland Police to help solve these break ins," said Ward 12 Councilman Brancatelli. "They have a few of the criminals in custody and are looking for another, Glenn Adkins, Jr. We are asking the public for help in locating Adkins.

Adkins is a 20-year-old white male with reddish-blonde hair and is 5'7" inches tall and may be armed. He is known to frequent the areas of Fleet and Harvard aves. and Denison and W. 84th St. Adkins goes by the nick-

be "a nuisance because of repeated criminal activities."

A nuisance, as defined in the codified ordinances. is "an unreasonable interference with a right common to the general public, including conduct that significantly interferes with public health, safety, peace, comfort or convenience; conduct that is contrary to a statute, ordinance or regulation; or conduct that is of a continuing nature or has produced a permanent or long lasting effect, and has a significant effect upon the public

Individuals responsible for creating a nuisance are aware or "should be aware" of the situation, the resolution stated.

Blackwell, Police Chief John Popielarczyk, and Law Director Frank Consolo have been authorized and directed to abate the nuisance in accordance with Maple Heights' codified ordinances "in any manner determined by them to be appropriate and necessary, including revocation of a Certificate of Occupancy and/or a Registration of Rental Property, and/or a Tenant Rental License," the resolution stated.

Other nuisances

Council passed two other resolutions declaring other properties in the city to be nuisances, at 5205 Milo Ave., and at 15800 Northwood Ave.

In the Milo legislation, it was noted that Blackwell, Popielarczyk, and Councilwoman Ebony Miller had found that police have been sent 12 times to the Milo address since July 2016. Officers have responded to complaints of domestic disturbances involving physical fighting and violence, false 911 calls, fights in the street, gunshots, suspicious drug activity and blocking the street with cars.

The resolution on the Northwood property declares it to be a structural/maintenance nuisance, as Blackwell, the building department and Councilwoman Toni Jones have reported that since December 27, 2016, the garage on this property "has been determined to be structurally unsound" and nothing the determined to be structurally unsound" and nothing has been done, despite written notices from the building department to tear the garage down and dispose of debris.

Leaf collection contract approved

Three Z Trucking and Supply Co., Inc., of Valley View, to pick up and dispose of leaves on residential properties, after the city had not conducted the service for the past few years.

The contract is for three years, at a cost of \$153,957 for 2017; \$155,958 for 2018; and \$157,959 for 2019. Additionally there are option years for 2020 in the amount of \$159,960; and for 2021 in the amount of \$161,961.

Residential water customers currently pay a fee of \$9 per MCF (MCF equals 7,480 gallons of water, according to the Cleveland Water Department) for improvement, repair and maintenance of the city's sewerage system, that is deposited in the city's Water Usage Fund.

City Engineer Ed Hren stated, "For the last couple of years, the city has not collected leaves. As a result, leaves often accumulate in the city's sewage system causing blockages, deterioration and maintenance issues. It is my opinion and recommendation that leaf collection must be performed on a yearly basis in order to properly operate and maintain and improve the city's sewage

Under the codified ordinances, the revenues from the Water Usage Fund can be used towards the leaf collection, Hren stated.

Other resolutions

Council also passed a resolution for application to the Western Reserve Area Agency on Aging for funding under the Older Americans Act to continue nutrition and transportation services provided by the Maple Heights Senior Center, including meals at the Center, home-delivered meals, transportation and related programs and activities. The application is for the two years from January 1, 2018, through December 31, 2019.

Two resolutions for contracts with the Ohio Patrolmen's Benevolent Association for the city's full-time and parttime corrections officers for the three years through June 30, 2020, were placed on first reading for further discussion.

Bills introduced in Bedford to eliminate hospitalization, raise salaries for future mayor, council placed on first reading

Two ordinances before Bedford Council last week, one to eliminate hospitalization for the future mayor and council members and another to raise their salaries, were placed on first reading for further discussion.

The legislation to eliminate hospitalization, which according to the codified ordinances has been in place since 1970, is intended as a cost-saving measure and has been in the planning process for more than a year, Councilman Greg Pozar explained during the vote to amend it and place it on first reading.

As stated in the ordinance, if it is passed at a future meeting, "Effective December 31, 2017, the city shall eliminate the hospitalization, dental, vision and prescription drug benefits for all members of council, including the mayor, for terms commencing on or after January 1, 2018 (Wards 1, 3, 5 and Mayor/At-Large commencing January 1, 2018/Wards 2, 4 and 6 commencing January 1, 2020). The city shall continue to pay the full costs of said insurance for the judges of the Bedford Municipal Court, unless declined.

Pozar stated that an initial ordinance was instigated at his request more than 16 months ago, in an effort to address the city's financial situation, and statistics were compiled regarding hospitalization offered to city officials in other communities.

"Subsequent research done by the finance director and **Announcements** our clerk indicates that 48 out of 59 communities do not offer what we're offering," he continued.

This was prior to the passage of an income tax issue in May, raising the city's income tax from 2.25 percent to 3 percent, and which according to city officials will be used to fund street and sidewalk repairs and hire new police officers.

Pozar said the proposal to eliminate hospitalization for mayor and council could save \$150,000 to \$200,000

Also placed on first reading was an ordinance to increase the salaries of future mayors and council members in the city. According to information released by Council Clerk Lorree Villers, the annual salary for the mayor is \$13,622.88, with a proposed increase of \$7,200 to \$20,822.88. The current annual salary of each council member is \$12,771.36, with a proposed increase of \$7,200 to \$19,971.36.

As explained in this ordinance, if council were to approve the ordinance to eliminate hospitalization for the future mayor and council members, it would result "in a substantial reduction of the council members compensation, and savings to the city of Bedford.'

Council voted to place this ordinance on first reading, Councilman Donald Saunders dissenting.

Other legislation

Placed on second reading were two ordinances, one



for the city to accept the donation of property at 83 Henry St. from the owners; and another for a contract between the city and TRW Construction LLC, for demolition of property at 38 Gould Avenue.

The city wants to tear down the Gould property, and TRW has submitted a bid of \$7,800 to conduct the demolition, according to the ordinance, which will be discussed for possible passage at a future meeting.

Also passed was an ordinance for the city to enter into an extension of the lease with option to purchase with MRLM LLC, a landscaping company, for property the city owns at 600 Solon Rd., to December 31, 2018.

Also passed were the following ordinances:

- To amend an ordinance entitled "Criminal Activity Nuisances." This will clearly define that the property owners will be charged following multiple offenses, and only the property owner will be allowed to appeal, City Manager Mike Mallis said.
- To condemn property and structures at 810 McKinley Ave., as it is "unsafe, unsanitary and unfit for human occupancy," the ordinance stated.
- •To allow employees to make insurance plan premiums on a pretax basis for calendar year 2018, through Wage Works. This has been done in the past, Mayor Stan Koci noted.

Finance Director Frank Gambosi will be receiving the Dorian Lifetime Achievement Award for his services to public finance, through the Government Finance Officers Association, Mallis stated, adding, "It is a very, very prestigious award."





Need to privatize public education

The public school system today continues to fail at educating our children both in terms of job training and citizen awareness. The most powerful country to ever exist continues to lag behind other countries when it comes to the very basics expected of this institution. The reason for this is because of the bureaucratic non-incentives consistent with government waste.

Teachers are not held accountable as a unit manager would be held accountable for their unit achieving objectives in a private corporation. They are also not rewarded financially for the success of their students when it comes to test results. And the biggest benefactor of all, private enterprise, is not required to reinvest in an educational system that provides free training to future employees.

The time for privatization of public education is long overdue. We as a country need to finally get serious about training and educating our future citizens. It is time to use corporate property tax along with entertainment property tax as a means of funding schools. Educational facilities from preschools to colleges and universities need to be converted to entities of private enterprise whereby an education is crafted as the finest product available to United States citizens.

Every time I encounter someone in the workplace, I am reminded of just how much we have failed to properly educate United States citizens in the fundamentals of communication: reading, writing, speaking and listening. Few would argue that the time is long overdue for the United States to "get back to the basics" of a fully functional education system. We need to exclusively focus on the development of communication skills from kindergarten to eighth grade along with annual testing that measures aptitude and interest. This is to determine what someone is good at combined with what they like to do. Training in mathematics should be limited to **your photos!** addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. Unless communication skills are fully mastered, there is no need to advance to high school.

For those who graduate to high school, the emphasis could evolve into a curriculum of philosophy, sociology, economics, psychology, science and religious studies. Books such as "For Dummies" and "The Complete Idiot's Guide" could be used to foster an understanding of different religions. Athletic activity would be strictly confined to cardio vascular exercises and all sports would be eliminated. While there would still be an emphasis on communication skills, the focus would now be on developing a foundation of basic knowledge so as to be able to graduate to college. Testing for aptitude and interest would continue through high school increasing the chances of picking the right field of study. Those not continuing on to college would enter some type of apprenticeship training for the purpose of learning a trade. For those who do graduate to college, the student would continue to study an advanced version of the same curriculum as high school but only for the first two years, then they would complete their education by strictly focusing on coursework designed to train them in their field of study. Nearing graduation, internships would be required to begin the transition to the working world. Think of how different our society would be if our education system could just teach the fundamentals of reading, writing, speaking and listening. Let us begin...again.




