The site, one of the largest parcels of undeveloped land in Independence, is located at the northwest corner of Rockside Road and Oak Tree Boulevard. Valley View man dies New NN in motorcycle accident 'Freebies'

Nathaniel VanNostran, 22, of Valley View, was killed in a motorcycle accident on 1-480 eastbound on October 14th, according to Garfield Heights police.

Officers were dispatched to I-480 between Transportation Blvd. and Granger Rd. around 8:35 p.m. on a report of an accident. Dispatch said several motorists had stopped to help,

including an off duty nurse, according to the police report. Officers limited the traffic to one lane and VanNostran was pronounced dead at the scene by a doctor from Marymount Hospital. Dispatch notes indicated he was not wearing a helmet.

Garfield Heights Police Chief Robert Byrne said VanNostran was driving at a high rate of speed and rearended a vehicle which then struck another vehicle.

Officers found the motorcycle in the berm on the south side of the highway and later learned VanNostran was borrowing it from a friend.

Police identified the rest of the motorists/passengers involved in the three-vehicle accident; three people were taken to MetroHealth Medical Center and two more were taken to Marymount Hospital to be treated for minor injuries, according to Byrne. The Cuyahoga County Medical Examiner was called to further investigate.





Expect to receive notification about emergency events, water boil alerts, safety messages, Cuyahoga County building closures and other information. Receive the info via email, phone or SMS/text messaging.

Participation in the Ready Notify program is voluntary. A valid email and phone number will be needed to sign up. During the registration process, you will be asked to give information about yourself such as your address, primary language and if you require any special assistance during an emergency. Only information indicated with a star (*) will be required.
