Garfield Heights Council met in regular session Monday night. Mayor Vic Collova was not in attendance following the recent passing of his wife Jeannie's brother. A moment of silence was observed in his honor.

The following legislation was passed:

• An emergency ordinance approving a change order regarding the East 135th Street Sewer Replacement Project, which has now been completed. City Engineer David Krock said the change order was necessary as the result of a waterline leak late in the project.

• An emergency ordinance to enter into an agreement with Cuyahoga County to apply for matching funds for an FY2016 Assistance to Firefighters Grant.

• An ordinance to contract with the Cuyahoga County General Health District to provide health services to the city for the year 2018, as required by state law.

The next regular council meeting is scheduled for Monday, Nov. 13.

Ghost Pizza

- 1 tube (8 biscuits) refrigerated biscuits
- 1 jar pizza sauce
- 8 slices mozzarella cheese
- 1 can (4 oz.) sliced olives

Heat oven to 350°. Flatten biscuits into a 5-inch circle and place on an ungreased cookie sheet. Spread pizza sauce on top of each biscuit. Use a cookie cutter to shape the cheese into ghosts or other desired shape. Lay on top of pizza sauce. Cook for 15-20 minutes. Cut sliced olives into shapes for eyes and mouth.

Spooky Eyeball Tacos

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 (1¼ oz.) package taco seasoning mix
- 12 taco shells
- ¾ cup salsa
- ¾ cup sour cream
- 1 tomato, small cubes
- 1 small head lettuce, sliced into small confetti squares
- 1 (2¼ oz.) can large black olives, sliced
- 1 cup cheese, shredded & long (cheddar is good, but a Mexican blend would be good, too)

Mix meat and seasoning mix. Shape half of the mixture into 24 (1-inch) balls; place in 15x10x1-inch baking pan and bake at 350° for 15 to 20 minutes or until cooked through.

Brown the remaining seasoned ground beef and add salsa. Fill each taco shell with a thin layer of ground beef, sour cream, lettuce and tomatoes.

Position two meatballs inside the taco shell and add a dollop of sour cream to each. Garnish with olives to make "eyeballs." Spread the cheese out along to the top for stringy hair.

Mummy Meatball Crescent Bites

- 1 can (8 oz.) Pillsbury refrigerated crescent dinner rolls or 1 can (8 oz.) Pillsbury refrigerated Crescent Roll Sheet
- 20 frozen cooked meatballs, thawed
- Ketchup or mustard, if desired
- Marinara sauce, as desired

Heat oven to 375°. Line work surface with cooking parchment paper. On parchment-lined surface, unroll dough (if using crescent roll dough, press perforations to seal); cut into four rectangles. With knife or pizza cutter, cut each rectangle lengthwise into 10 pieces, making a total of 40 pieces of dough. Wrap two pieces of dough around each meatball to look like "bandages," stretching dough slightly to cover meatballs. Separate "bandages" near one end to show meatball "face."

On ungreased large cookie sheet, place wrapped meatballs. Bake 13 to 17 minutes or until dough is light golden brown and meatballs are hot. With ketchup and mustard, draw "eyes" on mummy bites. Serve with warm marinara sauce.

according to a Garfield Heights police report. The man was wanted on a felony warrant related to a homicide with the Ohio Adult Parole Authority, according to the report.

On October 19th, around 3:45 a.m., a Garfield Heights patrol officer, in a marked police unit, saw a grey Chevrolet SUV make an illegal and abrupt turn in the area of Garfield Blvd. and Rockwood Rd., according to a press release from GHPD. The officer attempted to initiate a traffic stop by activating police lights and sirens but the vehicle fled into Cleveland.

Garfield police called off the pursuit at Broadway and Harvard aves. in Cleveland, but the vehicle continued to travel northbound on Broadway and lost control, crashing into a light pole at Broadway and E. 78th St., according to the release.

The 36-year-old driver fled on foot and was later found lying face down in the grass in the 3800 block

of E. 78th St. He was arrested and began complaining of a leg injury and he was taken to University Hospital for treatment by Cleveland EMS. Before being taken, police confiscated an ID that did not belong to the man and learned he had been driving under suspension.

The Cleveland Accident Investigation Unit arrived on scene to collect evidence.

The driver is charged with fleeing and eluding and obstructing official business, and he was cited for multiple traffic violations, according to the police report.

Another male in the car at the time of the crash was taken to Cleveland Clinic and later transferred to MetroHealth Medical Center for treatment; his condition is unknown, according to the press release. "The entire incident remains under investigation at this time," said Sgt. Matthew Berdysz with GHPD.

Halloween safety tips

The following Halloween safety tips have been provided by the Garfield Heights Police Department to assist in everyone's safety this Halloween during trick or treating:

- Young children should be accompanied by parents or other responsible adults on the "trick-or-treat" visits.
- Trick-or-treat visits should be confined to your neighborhood.
- Trick-or-treat visits should be confined to your

neighborhood's designated Trick-or-Treat time frame.

• Residents who wish to welcome treaters should light their front exterior light as a sign of their hospitality.

• Children should call only at homes with their outside lights glowing.

• Halloween costumes should be light in color, short enough to prevent tripping and non-flammable. Reflection tape, so they "glo" in the beam of a car's headlights, should be placed on clothing.

• Follow the basic pedestrian rules:

-Cross only at corners, never between parked cars, and never diagonally across an intersection.

-Look in all directions before crossing the street.

-Watch for and obey all traffic lights and stop signs.

-Walk, never run, across the street.

-Use sidewalks, not the street, for walking.

-Wait on the curb, not in the street, until the street is clear to cross.

-Motorists should be alert and use extreme caution during the treating time.

• Children should carry a flashlight in their bag for added visibility.

• Bring treats home so parents can see them and don't eat treats that are not wrapped.

Residents of all cities are encouraged to report all suspicious activities to their local Police Department at once by calling 9-1-1 or its local telephone number.

Pros and cons of State Issue 2 outlined

State of Ohio Issue 2 in the November 7th election would require state agencies to not pay more for prescription drugs than the federal Department of Veterans Affairs and would also require state payment of attorney fees and expenses to specific individuals for defense of the law.

The repercussions of this issue can be hard to understand for the average voter, or anyone else for that matter, so The Neighborhood News offers the following pros and cons of Issue 2 for your consideration, as taken from the website of Ohio Secretary of State John Husted on the statewide issues this November.

companies have completely rigged the system so you pay more. Washington, DC doesn't negotiate fair prices with drug companies, so it's up to the states to enact reforms. To do that we must change Ohio law and vote YES on Issue 2.

Here are the facts:

- Issue 2 changes Ohio law to ensure we pay the lowest known price for medicine. Ohioans would save \$400 million, which would help fund schools, police departments, and cut taxes. Instead, that money goes to drug companies.

- Drug companies keep driving up prices on medicines needed to treat everything from asthma to cancer until they become too expensive for you to afford or insurance to cover. Lifesaving medicine for children with allergies has skyrocketed from \$80 to over \$600 –

just one of many examples.

- Drug companies fueled their profits by lying about opioids. They paid doctors over \$46 million to get them to over-prescribe opioid pain medication, getting Ohioans hooked, killing kids and destroying our communities.

These are the same drug companies spending millions of dollars to get you to vote against this issue – all so they can protect their profits.

Politicians make promises they never keep. They say they'll lower the cost of healthcare, but then the lobbyists and political donations come, and our costs don't go down - they only go up.

Here's your chance to change that.

You can hold politicians and drug companies accountable even while they threaten to retaliate against us. They say they'll hurt veterans and raise prices on senior citizens. But you can stand up to them. Take the power into your own hands. Join doctors, nurses, and veterans from across Ohio and bring change that is desperately needed. Vote yes on Issue 2.

Ohioans pay too much for lifesaving medicine. Drug

VOTE NO ON ISSUE 2

Unworkable regulatory scheme for state prescription drug purchases which includes requirement to pay attorneys' fees and expenses.

Issue 2 is a deceptive and vaguely-worded proposal funded by a controversial California healthcare CEO. It imposes a regulatory scheme for state prescription drug purchases that experts say is unworkable and warn could actually increase drug costs. Issue 2 also gives its sponsors the unprecedented right to intervene in legal challenges to the regulation and requires taxpayers to pay their attorneys' fees, win or lose.

While leaving out two-thirds of Ohio's population altogether, Issue 2 mandates that state government pay no more for prescription drugs than the federal Department of Veterans Affairs.

Maple Hts. Council passes Board of Health contract

At its meeting last week, Maple Heights Council passed a resolution authorizing Mayor Annette Blackwell to enter into a contract with the Cuyahoga County Board of Health to provide health services to residents of the city.

Since Maple Heights does not have its own health department and is required by state law to provide health services to its residents, it contracts with the county health board to provide the services every year.

Cost of the contract for the year 2018 is \$95,329, at a rate of \$4.12 per person based on the population in the city according to the 2010 U.S. Census. This is "among one of the lowest rates for health districts in the state of Ohio," the legislation stated.

Among the health services provided to Maple Heights residents through the county are immunization clinics, newborn home visits, lead poisoning prevention, services for children with medical handicaps, family planning services, breast and cervical cancer prevention programs, child obesity prevention programs and much more.

Health education programs offered through the contract include the Prevent Premature Fatherhood Program aimed at male youth ages 11-19, Teen Pregnancy Prevention Program, unused prescription medication awareness initiative, Cuyahoga County Opiate Task Force, school health and special needs child care. Environmental health and safety programs are also available.

Health Commissioner Terry Allan confirmed that the Board of Health was continuing its work on the opioid epidemic that is currently devastating many communities throughout Ohio, stating, "We convene a countywide taskforce that is working to address the alarming rise in the misuse of opiate prescription drugs and the corresponding and alarming rise in overdoses and deaths related to prescription opiates, heroin, fentanyl and recently carfentanyl."

"Through this work," Allan continued, "we have coordinated the distribution of the naloxone overdose reversal drug [commonly known as Narcan] to police departments in almost 50 Cuyahoga County communities and work to educate families, community providers, safety forces, students and administrators in academic settings."

Other legislation

Council passed a resolution to renew the city contract with Medical Mutual

of Ohio for health care insurance for full time city employees from January 1, 2018 through December 31, 2019.

A resolution declaring a property at 16112 Woodbrook Rd. to be a "nuisance" was okayed by council "because of the deterioration of the structure such that it is a hazard to the health, safety or welfare of its occupants and the public."

The resolution authorizes the city to remediate the issue appropriately, which may include tearing the house down or revoking its

certificate of occupancy.

A similar resolution declaring a property at 6306 Dunham Rd. to be a structural/maintenance nuisance because of deteriorated conditions was placed on first reading for further discussion.

An ordinance to establish an unclaimed monies fund in the city was also placed on first reading.

Bedford Council cuts hospitalization, raises pay for future mayor, council members

After extensive discussion at previous meetings, Bedford Council passed two ordinances at a special meeting Monday night, one to eliminate hospitalization, dental, vision and prescription drug benefits for the future mayor and council members; the other to raise salaries, also for future mayoral and council office holders.

Both ordinances were on the agenda for third reading and possible passage at council's regular meeting last week, but because of the excused absence of Councilwoman Paula Mizsak, Mayor Stan Koci

moved to table them so all members of council could be present and have the opportunity to vote on the two important issues.

The ordinance to cut hospitalization, which will become effective December 31, 2017, is intended as a cost-saving measure. Finance Director Frank Gambosi had noted at a previous meeting that the city could have saved about \$390,000 in the past three years in hospitalization costs had it chosen to address the issue previously.

In lieu of hospitalization, to offset their costs of health care, all of those elected to the offices of mayor and

council in upcoming elections will receive \$7,200 each in raises, according to the other ordinance passed at the special meeting. The future mayor's salary will be increased to \$20,822.88 annually, while future council members' salaries will be increased to \$19,971.36 annually.

The future mayor and representatives of Wards 1, 3 and 5, to be elected next month, will have their hospitalization cut and receive their raises upon taking office in January 2018, while future representatives of Wards 2, 4 and 6, to be elected in November 2019, will have their hospitalization eliminated and get their pay raised upon taking office in January 2020, according to both ordinances.

Medical marijuana

Also passed at Monday's meeting after being placed on first reading at last week's meeting was an ordinance to enact regulations to create a comprehensive licensing system for

medical marijuana entities in the city, including amendments and new sections regarding the planning and zoning code, zoning administration, definitions, medical marijuana dispensaries, and other regulations.

The ordinance notes that on September 8, 2016, Ohio House Bill 523 took effect "approving a Medical Marijuana Control Program, under which licensed medical marijuana cultivators, processors, dispensaries, and testing laboratories could legally operate within the state of Ohio."

Newly proposed medical marijuana dispensaries must be located at least 500 feet away from a "prohibited facility," defined in the ordinance as schools, churches, public libraries, public playgrounds or public parks, and cannot be located in a residentially zoned area.

Also, applicants must be registered with the Ohio Secretary of State as operating a medical marijuana business and also have a certificate of good standing from the secretary of state

Other legislation passed

Passed at last week's meeting was an ordinance authorizing the city to enter into a five-year contract with Julian & Grube, Inc., certified public accountants, for performance of the city's audits from 2017 through 2021, at a cost of \$26,000 annually.

The city is required to perform an independent audit annually, according to the ordinance. City Manager Mike Mallis said that in past years the cost was about \$36,000 annually, and Julian & Grube offered

their services for \$26,000 annually, through December 31, 2021.

Also passed was an ordinance related to the audit legislation, authorizing the city to enter into an agreement with the Auditor of the State of Ohio, specifying local government services for the city for the years 2017, 2018 and 2019, at a cost not to exceed \$19,500 annually.

Announcements

Mayor Koci, other city officials and council members offered their condolences on the passing of Mary Jane (nee Mokrahaisky) Gambosi, the mother of Finance Director Frank Gambosi, who was absent from last week's meeting.

Mallis said the city was applying for funding through the Ohio Public Works Commission for resurfacing city roads. Also, there were plans to apply for a Community Development Block Grant through Cuyahoga County for signage and streetscaping. A public meeting will be announced in the near future for residents to give their input on possible uses of the county funds.

Volunteers are needed for the Meals on Wheels program, Spinks said.

Gun Buy Back Results

The 11th annual Gun Buy Back event held at Third District police headquarters last weekend took in 98 guns, according to Sgt. Jennifer Ciaccia with CPD. In exchange for operable handguns or semiautomatic weapons, citizens were given either a gas or food gift card valued at \$100 (handguns) or \$200 (semi-automatic weapons).

Body Found

On October 16th, around 8:15 a.m., police were called to the E. 93rd St. and Benham area and found a 52-year-old Garfield Heights man dead in a field. Drug paraphernalia was found in the man's hand. However, an official cause of death was not included in the police report. A representative from the Cuyahoga County Medical Examiner's office said the cause is still pending.

Felonious Assault

• A 24-year-old Cleveland resident told police he was

shot by two males on October 18th, around 3:15 p.m. He was at MetroHealth Medical Center and told police he was at a corner store on Warner Rd. that afternoon and saw the two males. He said he asked them if he could buy marijuana from them and they told him to follow them.

The victim said he thought they were taking him to one of their houses but they turned into the driveway of a vacant home in the 7900 block of Connecticut Ave. and one of the males held a gun to his face. The victim said the man pulled the trigger but the gun didn't go off, but the man then "opened fire," shooting the 24-year-old in the hip and ankle, and both suspects fled on foot through backyards, according to the report. Police found a cell phone and one shell casing in the vacant home's driveway. Another bullet and another casing were found in the street. Officers searched the area for suspects with negative results.

• Two Cleveland men suffered gunshot wounds to their faces while in a car in the Harvard and Broadway Ave. area on October 23rd, around 10:40 p.m. One of the males, 43, said he thought he recognized someone in a vehicle nearby and he pulled up

next to it. The 43-year-old said he rolled down his window to speak to the other driver. The other driver, wearing glasses and a skull cap and unknown to the 43-year-old, rolled down his dark-tinted window and said, "Do you know me?," then pointed a gun out the window and began shooting. He then drove off westbound on Harvard Ave. The 43-year-old suffered gunshot wounds to his cheek and upper lip, and his 38-year-old passenger suffered gunshots to his nose and shoulder. They were taken to MetroHealth Medical Center for treatment. Security cameras on Broadway Ave. may have captured the incident.

GARFIELD HTS.

Drug Abuse

Around 12:30 a.m. October 20th, police noticed a vehicle driving on E. 115th

St. with no headlights on and pulled the vehicle over. Police noted that the driver, a 22-year-old Cleveland resident, had constricted pupils and was acting nervous. Dispatch confirmed the license plate was entered as stolen out of Portage County. Officers saw fresh marijuana on the seats of the vehicle as well as plastic baggies containing the same. In the trunk, police found two license plates; in the car, police found 12.5 grams of suspected cocaine. The man was also in possession of nearly \$400 cash, which was confiscated. The man was arrested and charged with felony possession of drugs, headlight required, tinted glass and fictitious plates, and was held on no bond. Police said the 22-year-old had a criminal history including a prior felony possession of drugs charge.

OVI

On October 16th, around 3 p.m., police saw a vehicle swerving on E. 119th St. near Plymouth and learned

the license plates on the vehicle were fake. Police watched the vehicle drive on the wrong side of the road, nearly turn into an emergency vehicle with its lights and siren on, and nearly strike another vehicle while continuing to drive on the wrong side of the road on McCracken Rd. Police finally pulled the vehicle over on McCracken and spoke to the driver, 39, of Maple Heights, who had slurred/sluggish speech and drooping eyelids. With a check through LEADS, police learned the man was driving under suspension and had active warrants with Maple Heights, Parma, Broadview Heights and Bedford police departments. After showing signs of impairment during field sobriety tests he was arrested. A passenger was released at the scene.

The man was charged with felony OVI and cited for driving under suspension, weaving, fictitious plates and failure to yield to a public safety vehicle; he was issued a summons for pos-

session of drugs. Police said the man has three prior OVI convictions within the last 10 years.

- Only applies to purchases by state government agencies and entities.
- Only applies to the limited number of drugs the VA purchases and could further restrict access to medications.
- Could increase drug costs for two out of three Ohioans who have private or employer-based insurance, rely on Medicare, or who have other coverage not provided by the state. Issue 2 requires the state to pay sponsors' attorneys fees and expenses.
- Gives the sponsors, the four individuals responsible for circulating the petition, the unprecedented right to defend legal challenges to the law. Three of those four are employed by the petition funder.
- Declares the sponsors have "a direct and personal stake" in defending the law.
- Requires Ohio taxpayers to pay the sponsors' attorneys' fees and expenses, win or lose, and sets no cap on the total amount of attorneys' fees and expenses.

Bipartisan opposition to Issue 2 includes three former Ohio Medicaid Directors who served in both Democratic and Republican administrations, a former Ohio Budget Director, and a coalition of more than 70 organizations representing Ohio doctors, nurses, hospitals, veterans, business, labor, and faith and community groups.
