



State Issues

Two Ohio state-wide issues will be on the November 7th ballot, one involving rights for crime victims and the other addressing prescription drug pricing.

Issue 1: Rights for Crime Victims, Proposed Constitutional Amendment, Proposed by Initiative Petition

existing language in Section 10a of Article I of the Constitution of the State of Ohio. A majority yes vote is necessary for the amendment to pass. The proposed amendment would expand the rights of victims under the current Section 10a and require that the rights of victims be protected as vigorously as the rights of the accused. More specifically, for the purpose of ensuring due process, respect, fairness, and justice for crime victims and their families in the criminal and juvenile justice systems, the amendment would provide victims with:

• the right to privacy and to be treated with respect, fairness, and dignity;

• the right to information about the rights and services available to crime victims:

• the right to notification in a timely manner of all proceedings in the case;

• the right to be present notes issued in anticipation and heard at all court proceedings, including the

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right to petition the court to protect the victim's rights;

conclusion of the case;

• to refuse discovery requests made by the accused, except as authorized by Article I, Section 10 of the Ohio constitution;

• the right to reasonable To repeal and replace the protection from the accused;

> the right to notice of the release or escape of the accused; and

• the right to restitution.

The proposed amendment would not establish a •the right to a prompt cause of action for damages or compensation against the state or any political subdivision.

> If approved, the amendment will be effective 90 days after the election.



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


Spiced Pumpkin Seeds

Position a rack in the center of the oven and preheat to 350°. Line two heavy large baking sheets with parchment paper.

In a medium bowl, combine the flour, oats, cinnamon, baking soda, salt and allspice. Stir to blend well. In a large bowl, combine the sugar, pumpkin puree, oil, syrup and vanilla; whisk to blend. Using a flexible rubber spatula, gradually stir the dry ingredients into the pumpkin mixture. Stir in the raisins.

For each cookie, drop one generous tablespoon of batter onto the prepared baking sheet, spacing the mounds about one inch apart (or use a mini ice cream scoop). Using moistened fingertips, flatten each to a 2-inch-diameter round. Sprinkle each cookie with a bit more raw sugar.

Bake the cookies until brown and a bit firm to the touch, 17 to 20 minutes. Using a metal spatula, transfer the cookies to a rack and cool completely.

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
