### **MHPD** investigating **Stafford Park homicide**

Maple Heights Police need help in identifying a gunshot victim they found dead in Stafford Park yesterday morning, according to a press release from MHPD Lt. Joseph Mocsiran.

Just before 2:30 a.m., the Maple Heights Police Department received a call about a male on the ground in Stafford Park. Officers responded and found a young man in the park who was deceased and had a gunshot wound, according to Mocsiran. MHPD Detectives and the Bureau of Criminal Investigation are investigating the case

The victim has not been identified. He is a young adult, African American male, with a slim build, facial hair and close-cut hair. He was wearing beige pants, a white t-shirt, and a blue hoodie zip-up jacket under a forming Arts. Deadline to blue nylon jacket. The male had on camouflage tennis shoes. He appeared to be about 5'10" to 6' tall.

The State of Ohio Board of Pharmacy announced that drug court programs have access to the state's prescription drug monitoring program, known as the Ohio Automated Rx Reporting System (OARRS), to provide judges and court personnel with critical information regarding a participant's use of controlled substance medications.

### **2017 Ohio Veterans Hall of Famers to be inducted tomorrow**

The Ohio Department of Veterans Services will host the Ohio Veterans Hall of Fame 2017 Class Induction Ceremony on Thursday, Nov. 9, at 10 a.m. at Radiant Life Church in Dublin, Ohio. The public is welcome to attend. The 20-person class will be presented with medals and plaques by ODVS Director Chip Tansill and State Senator Frank LaRose.

Three of the 2017 Ohio Veterans Hall of Fame inductees are from Cuyahoga County.

#### Holly S. Koester

#### United States Army Veteran, Cold War Era

Holly Koester, 57, of Walton Hills in Cuyahoga County, served in the U.S. Army from 1981 to 1991 until she was injured. A 2006 graduate of Cleveland State University, Holly is a substitute teacher for grades K-8.

In 1996, she started racing in marathons, displaying her amazingly competitive spirit. In fact, she is the first person to complete a marathon in all 50 United States in a wheelchair. Holly received a resolution from the Ohio House of Representatives for her performance in the 2016 National Veterans Wheelchair Games, which netted her six gold medals. She attended her first National Veteran Wheelchair Games in 1991 and has attended every year since as an athlete and mentor. She is sports director and secretary for the Buckeye Chapter Paralyzed Veterans of America.

In 2017, the National PVA honored Holly with the Speedy Award, the highest honor that the group bestows. Holly is involved in local organizations including the Heritage Congregational Church and Berea Millstream Quilters, making children's charity quilts and veterans' valor quilts. In 2013, NASCAR driver Sam Schmidt presented Holly with the Spirit of Ability Award by Braun Mobility.

She is a peer counselor for newly injured spinal cord veterans at the Cleveland VA and a motivational speaker who has addressed veterans' organizations, school groups and attendees at Memorial Day and Veterans Day ceremonies.

#### John A. Evans Sr.

#### United States Army & Air Force Veteran, Vietnam War

John A. Evans, Sr., 81, of Cleveland, served in the U.S. Air Force and U.S. Army in the Vietnam War. John is a life member of the American Legion, AMVETS, Disabled American Veterans and the VFW. John served the American Legion 13th District as a Service Officer, chairman of the Gifts for the Yanks Program and chairman of the Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation Committee. After his military career, John experienced firsthand the unfavorable welcome home as a Vietnam veteran. He promised himself then that when he had more time, he would make sure he would do whatever he could to support all veterans. In 1992, upon retirement from a 16-year career with the Federal Aviation Administration, John began volunteering at the Louis Stokes Cleveland VA Medical Center and is presently serving as the American Legion VA Voluntary Services Deputy-Representative. In 2016, John received the Cleveland VA Medical Center Volunteer of the Year/You Make a Difference Award and the VA Voluntary Services Superior Service Award for 17,500 volunteer hours. One of John's first assignments as a VA volunteer was in the Cleveland VA Medical Center's Day Hospital for seriously mentally ill veterans. John is a champion for fellow veterans and his continued support and advocacy ensures these veterans have everything they need to engage successfully in their treatment and recovery.

#### Richard L. DeChant Jr.

#### United States Coast Guard Veteran, Operation Desert Shield/ Operation Desert Storm, Operation Iraqi Freedom

Richard DeChant, Jr., 61, of Fairview Park in Cuyahoga County, served in the U.S. Coast Guard including tours in the Gulf War and Operation Iraqi Freedom. Richard is the executive director of the Veterans' Initiative for Cuyahoga Community College. Under his leadership, the College was recognized as a Military Friendly Institution in 2017, marking eight consecutive years with this distinction. He was chair of a White House Council on Strong Cities/Strong Communities seeking best practices in developing a seamless transition for veterans looking for employment and employers looking for veterans. During his tenure with the TSA Operations for Northeast Ohio, he received both the Department Homeland Security Heroism Award and the Cleveland Police Department 2006 Citizen Heroism Award for helping to subdue an armed gunman at Cleveland Hopkins Airport. He is the co-chair of the Northeast Ohio Veterans Community Task Force, focusing on leveraging VA resources. He also is active in the Greater Cleveland Fisher House, the Ohio Values Veterans Military Committee and Hospice of the Western Reserve among many other organizations. He co-authored Ohio House Bill 488, which requires all state colleges to establish veteran service offices and review military training for college credit. He also helped create national legislation that established the first standard Military Training Transcript for use by colleges through the 2012 Defense Re-Authorization Act.

The Ohio Veterans Hall of Fame was established in 1992 by former Gov. George Voinovich to recognize outstanding professional achievement, service to the community and selfless acts of veterans following their military service.



## Maple Heights gets grant funding to aid new businesses

Small businesses in Maple Heights that want to create jobs will benefit from grant funding awarded to the city, after council passed an ordinance to accept the Cuyahoga County SBA Small Business Performance Grant at its meeting last week.

The city has set aside \$50,000 to start and finance the program, and the fund and the county will provide up to \$150,000 in matching funds to further assist the grant program, according to the agreement between Maple Heights and the Cuyahoga County Department of Development.

Passage of the legislation will enable the city to enter into an agreement with the county to implement the grant program "to provide performance grants to qualifying small businesses in the city in the form of forgivable loans."

The county established the grant program "to assist small businesses in the county by providing sources of capital that help those businesses grow and create jobs," the ordinance states.

Council's passage of the ordinance also allows Finance Director Tracy Smith to establish a Maple Heights-Cuyahoga County Credit Enhancement Fund in the amount of \$50,000, "to provide the capital necessary to make the performance grants to qualifying small businesses through the program."

The agreement is effective for two years from the date of authorization, according to information provided by the city.

### Economic development ordinance on first reading

Also addressing the encouragement of potential economic growth in Maple Heights, council placed a resolution on first reading to amend a previous contract with inSITE Advisory Group, LLC, to perform economic development services for the city.

In March 2017, council retained inSITE to perform these services at an hourly rate of \$175, "in an amount not to exceed \$17,500... since then, inSITE has worked tirelessly to perform economic development initiatives

as directed by the city administration," the legislation the amount of \$109,467 last year, and the city accepted bids for construction. However, the winning bidder

Initiatives performed by inSITE, according to the legislation, have included "marketing development property; compiling property reports containing the city's demographics, site plans and incentives, preparing a RFI [request for information] for light industrial buildings for sale in the city, identifying and securing grants, and conducting business retention meetings and expansion visits."

The resolution states that inSITE has reached the maximum allowed amount of \$17,500. If approved at a future meeting, the resolution will amend the previous legislation, allowing payment to inSITE for services rendered at the same rate of \$175 an hour, in a total amount not to exceed \$32,500.

#### Increased salt dome costs approved

After two previous resolutions addressing the costs of a salt dome being constructed for the city, council approved a third piece of legislation authorizing Mayor Annette Blackwell to enter into a second amendment to the Community Cost Share agreement with the NEORSD (Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District), after the project cost exceeded the total amount of \$135,000 in awarded program funds.

The NEORSD provides funding to member communities for community specific storm water management projects under the Community Cost Share program. City Engineer Ed Hren was informed by the NEORSD that the construction of a new salt storage facility "would effectively serve as a Pollution Prevention and Good Housekeeping Best Management Practice and thus qualify as a storm water management project," making it eligible for the funding.

Hren was successful in applying for NEORSD funds in

the amount of \$109,467 last year, and the city accepted bids for construction. However, the winning bidder defaulted, requiring Hren to re-advertise for bids for the project. In the process or preparing the plans and specs for the rebid, Hren determined that concrete floors were necessary to better manage the salt dome facility, according to the legislation. This resulted in an additional cost not to exceed \$25,533.

The salt dome has been completed, but Hren and Smith determined that the total amount of eligible construction and engineering costs associated with the project exceeded the total amount of \$135,000 in the awarded funds.

Therefore, the NEORSD agreed to a second amendment to the agreement to include the eligible construction and engineering costs, and allocate an additional \$13,500 for the added work. This brings the total cost of the project to \$148,500, as covered by the NEORSD funds, the resolution stated.

### Unclaimed funds ordinance on second reading

Placed on second reading was legislation amending the codified ordinances of the city, enacting a new section relating to the establishment of an unclaimed monies fund.

If approved at a future meeting, unclaimed money will be deposited in the Unclaimed Monies Fund and will be retained in that fund until it is claimed by its lawful owner, the ordinance states.

Withdrawn from the agenda by Councilman Stafford Shenett was a resolution declaring a property on Dunham Road to be a structural and maintenance nuisance property, after city officials had discussions with the property owner, Council Clerk Leonette Cicirella stated.


