Police watched security camera footage which matched the events described by the employees. However, officers said the employee who had fired his gun did so in the direction of the males, not into the air, according to the report.

Police confiscated the employee's gun and collected three spent shell casings in the area as evidence. Officers said a bullet went through the window of a home in the 12800 block of Rockside Road but no one was injured. The man was issued a summons for discharging a firearm within city limits.

Officers searched the area for the suspects with negative results. Police continue to investigate.

derstand what goes into that event the following day, so they will have their crews out there.

Mayor Stan Koci added, "We're going to be encouraging all our local businesses to be open and lit up on that morning. Some businesses downtown don't open up until noon; we'll contact all those individuals and remind them to keep their lights on so downtown looks really nice. It's a good thing.

Koci also mentioned that Bedford native Tim Taylor, a former newscaster at FOX-8, would be doing a "This is My Hometown" piece for the channel.

Also regarding the upcoming season, the annual Holiday Lighting Ceremony will be held in Bedford's Public Square at 6 p.m. sharp on Wednesday, Nov. 22, to kick off the holidays in the city, Mallis noted.

Break-ins update

Addressing the recent increase in car break-ins reported in the city of Bedford and the surrounding area, Mallis said, "We did have break-ins again with vehicles and I can tell you that with the police we've worked to establish an additional unit in the evenings. And we have some patrols going on."

"We are going to get them," Mallis continued, "and we do have suspects in mind." He said the suspects travel on foot and there is more than one of them.

'So if you notice individuals walking down the street, if you come home late and see these individuals, please give us a call. It doesn't hurt. We'll get out there and we'll check," he said.

Police, fireman honored, Eagles thanked

Police officer Ben Lang was honored as the Officer of the Year and Firefighter Chris Novak was honored as the Firefighter of the Year recently, Mallis said. He also thanked the Bedford Eagles for their generous donations to the city.

The Eagles contributed \$5,000 apiece to each of the city's safety forces for a total of \$15,000, Mallis stated, adding that the donations had been used for training equipment, vests and "a wide range of items... it's a great partnership and I want to thank them.

Councilman Donald Saunders mentioned that the Eagles Auxiliary also made contributions in the amount of \$500 apiece to the safety forces.

Legislation

Council passed an ordinance to make additional appropriations needed because of changes to the budget for this year, Finance Director Frank Gambosi stated.

He said that an additional \$10,000 clothing allowance was needed for new officers; \$5,000 in building department overtime; \$7,000 for the new recreation department director and assistant director for the last quarter of this year; \$19,635 for a new employee in the economic development department; \$3,000 for finance department separation pay/overtime in the office and \$1,500 in Workers Comp costs; \$3,000 for the tax department due to one less employee and \$10,000 for costs of outside contracting of invoicing and postage; and \$15,000 for law department costs related to legal disputes and contracted out legal projects.

Fund balances were also adjusted, Gambosi stated, to account for the Broadway Park construction and to use Neighborhood Services Program Income Funds and to budget for demolition of 38 Gould; \$28,000 for separation pay for Service Department roof replacement; \$8,000 for Drug Prevention Equipment costs; \$10,260 to account for a Worker's Comp grant to buy firefighter gloves and boots (grant \$8,550/city match \$1,710); \$45 Juvenile Diversion fee; overtime for fire medics; \$12,000 and \$25,000 front funds for Dominion for Sunoco Union/ Northfield storm sewer; for meter replacement costs as borrowed with bonds; and for costs of electricity bills.

An amended ordinance was passed to raise the fee from \$10 to \$40 on individuals and entities who request that the city research whether assessments exist on properties located in Bedford.

Also approved was an ordinance to rezone 46 Center Rd. from business to residential classification, and a contract with Nicks Tree Service Division to perform removal of trees too large for city crews to handle, at a cost of \$17,575.

Claims now accepted for \$586 million Western **Union Fund for fraud victims**

Ohio Attorney General Mike DeWine recently announced that Ohioans who sent money to scammers using Western Union's wire service may now apply for compensation from a \$586 million fund held by the U.S. Department of Justice's victim asset recovery

The fund is related to a multistate settlement Attorney General DeWine announced in January.

Consumers may be eligible to receive compensation if they sent a fraud-induced wire transfer through Western Union between January 1, 2004 and January 19, 2017.

"It's not often that scam victims have a chance to recover some of their money, so we want people to know about this opportunity," DeWine said. "If you think you're eligible, file a claim."

A settlement administrator is sending claim forms to over 500,000 consumers. Ohioans may receive a form in the mail if they reported to Western Union or to the Ohio Attorney General's Office that they had been the victim of a scam using Western Union. The form will contain instructions on how to file a claim.

Consumers who do not receive a claim form but believe they may have a valid claim should visit www.WesternUnionRemission.com or call 844-319-2124 for details on filing a claim.

Completed claim forms must be submitted online or mailed back to the settlement administrator by February 12, 2018.





World's Simplest **Thanksgiving Turkey**

Preheat oven to 325°. Pull the neck and giblets out of the cavity; throw away the liver and save the rest of the giblets for gravy. Dry the turkey with paper towels, then season inside and out with salt and pepper. Fill the turkey with aromatics like chopped onions, carrots, apples and herbs, then place breast-side up in a roasting pan and brush with melted butter. Tent with foil and roast for 2 hours (for a 10- to 12-pound turkey; add an extra 15 minutes per pound for larger birds). Remove the foil, baste with more melted butter and turn the oven up to 425°. Roast for another hour or until the meat at the thigh registers 165°. Let rest before serving.

Cranberry Dip

- 1 (12 oz.) package fresh cranberries
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 cup apricot jam
- 1 cup chopped pecans
- 1 (8 oz.) package cream cheese

Preheat an oven to 350°. Combine cranberries with sugar in a 2-quart baking dish with a lid, stirring well to coat all the berries. Bake in the preheated oven, covered, for about 30 minutes, until the cranberries pop and release their liquid.

Remove from oven and stir in the apricot jam and pecans. Refrigerate overnight to blend the flavors. To serve, allow the cream cheese to come to room temperature, and pour dip over the block of cream cheese on a serving dish. Serve with buttery round crackers or small pretzels.

1 tsp. apple pie spice, and additional apple pie spice (about 1/4 tsp.) for sprinkling on top of crescent rolls

3 Tbsp. butter, melted

1/3 cup chopped pecans

1 small Granny Smith apple, cored and sliced into 8 (1/2-inch) slices

1 (8 oz.) can Pillsbury original crescent rolls

Preheat oven to 375°. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper. In a small bowl, combine brown sugar and apple pie spice. Set aside. Melt butter and toss apple slices in butter, set aside.

Arrange crescent roll triangles on baking sheet lined with parchment paper. Evenly distribute brown sugar mixture onto each triangle. Sprinkle each triangle evenly with chopped pecans. Place an apple slice on the wide end of each triangle. Wrap crescent roll dough around each apple.

Brush each crescent roll with remaining butter. Sprinkle lightly with additional apple pie spice. Bake for 10-12 minutes, or until golden brown. Cool for 5 minutes before serving.

- An emergency resolution to apply for a grant through

Safety Foundation to purchase two CPR units.
