# Metroparks to take over operation of Dunham Park in Maple Heights

By Judith Goldsworth The Cleveland Metroparks moved a step closer to taking over operation of Dunham Park in Maple Heights, after Maple Heights Council passed a resolution approving a lease agreement at its meeting last week.

The resolution authorizes Mayor Annette Blackwell to enter into a lease agreement with the Board of Park Commissioners of the Cleveland Metropolitan Park District (Metroparks) for Dunham Park, located in the Schreiber-Dunham area of western Maple Heights, and comprising about 53 acres.

Blackwell said next spring Dunham Park will be added to Bedford Reservation, which is 2,336 acres, making it the first Cleveland Metroparks property in the city of Maple Heights.

The Metroparks has advised Blackwell that the park district wants to enter into a 99-year lease with the city for Dunham Park, and to operate it and maintain it, thereby adding it to the existing 18 Metroparks reservations throughout Northeast Ohio, according to the legislation. The plan now goes to the Metroparks board for approval.

As part of the lease agreement, the Metroparks will pay Maple Heights the rent of \$1 per year, with the option of payment as a lump sum, the agreement states. The city has not yet applied for a tax exemption for the leased property, but "anticipates pursuing such exemption" with the cooperation of the Metroparks.

The resolution also stated that the Metroparks addition of Dunham Park "will advance connections and trail systems that complete the Emerald Necklace and, in partnership with other agencies and communities, will connect Maple Heights with local, state and regional trail networks, communities and places of interest," and is committed to improving, expanding and strengthening outdoor experiences and recreation opportunities for the residents of the city.

#### Kokosing to provide materials for park

county grant funding, by contracting with Kokosing Materials Inc. to provide asphalt materials for the Dunham Park Improvement Project in spring 2018.

Although the county has extended the deadline for expenditure of \$150,000 of that grant funding to May 31, 2018, it has maintained the deadline for expenditure of the remaining \$50,000 in supplemental grant funding to December 31, 2017, or risk forfeiture, according to the legislation.

In November, council passed a resolution for the city to enter into a contract with C & J Contractors at a cost of \$26,962 to perform demolition work at Dunham Park.

And last week council approved the contract with Kokosing at a cost of \$23,038 for the asphalt materials, thereby spending the entire \$50,000.

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at Dunham Park, and utilizing part of the \$200,000 in Group LLC to perform additional economic development services for the city, at an hourly rate of \$175, in an amount not to exceed \$32,500. Previous legislation had set the cap at 17,500.

> Also passed at the meeting were three additional resolutions: one to request that the city participate in the Tax Advance Program of the Cuyahoga County Fiscal Officer to receive tax advances for 2018; another adopting the county's 2017-2022 All Hazards Mitigation Plan, as required by federal law, to outline processes for identifying natural and human-made hazards, and also to plan for activities that will "reduce losses to life and property;" and another resolution for an agreement between the city and Assurant for group dental insurance for full-time employees of Maple Heights for the year 2018.

#### 2018 budget on second reading

Placed on second reading at last week's meeting was an ordinance for the city's budget for 2018, with total appropriations set at \$20,239,959. Council will continue to discuss the budget before passage at a future meeting.

Also placed on second reading for further discussion was an ordinance to make final amendments to this year's appropriations for the fiscal year ending Decem-

It was later learned that the Subway in Turneytown Shopping Center appeared to have been damaged by the Wadsworth Avenue gunfire. Two window panes had been struck.

Also around 10 p.m. last Tuesday, police were dispatched to the E. 105th Street and Grace Avenue area for a report of shots fired. A total of 10 spent casings were found between the 10300 and 10400 blocks of Grace Ave., and a bullet fragment was also found in the street.

A resident had possible surveillance footage of the incident which showed a vehicle that appeared to be chasing another vehicle at a high rate of speed on E. 102nd Street, then onto Grace. Police saw flashes of light coming from the second vehicle which were believed to be the gunshots, according to the report.

Police believe the Grace Avenue and Wadsworth calls may be related and continue to investigate.

# **Dollar General chain to open new store** in former Medic building in Bedford

Dollar General, a Tennessee-based chain of variety stores that operates more than 14,000 locations throughout the United States, will be investing about \$1 million to open a new store in the former Medic building on Broadway Avenue, after Bedford Council gave its approval at its meeting last week.

Last month the Planning Commission recommended council's approval of a proposal by Bedford DG, LLC, of Birmingham, Alabama, the developer, and Hilco Acquisition (Medic Real Estate) LLC, owner of the building located at 647 Broadway in Bedford, to completely renovate the exterior and interior of the property, which has been closed since Medic drugstores went out of business in 2005.

Council's approval of the recommendation means that Dollar General can go forward with its plans to take a long-vacant structure and turn it into a viable commercial enterprise that will employ 8 to 10 people, according to information released by the city.

According to the minutes from the November 21 Planning Commission meeting, Civil Engineer Jeff the amount not timely paid shall be imposed. Paulson, representing Dollar General, stated that upon council's approval, Dollar General would move forward to purchase the building, with interior and exterior renovations figured at \$700,000 to \$1 million.

Paulson stated that since Medic Drug had vacated the Broadway building, the premises had been neglected for many years and the current condition was "basically condemnable" because of the years it sat empty, citing a leaky roof, peeling floors and ruined walls as part of the Announcements deterioration.

He said interior renovations would be conducted during the winter months, with exterior renovations ad- be held on Wednesday, Dec. 20, during which residents dressed according to the weather conditions. City Manager Mike Mallis stated that he understood that Dollar General was investing a substantial amount of money to renovate the building, but that he also struggled with not keeping Bedford's historical downtown district as a "quaint historic district."

A petition from residents stating their issues with having a Dollar General in downtown Bedford had also been formally submitted as record at the Planning Commission meeting. However, Law Director John Montello noted that no one was officially present to submit the petition or speak on its behalf.

In response, Paulson said that he understood and appreciated the concerns of Mallis and the residents and that the changes being made to the appearance of the building as a future Dollar General location were at the request of the Historical Preservation Board. He also stated that Dollar General usually had a set structure for its stores, but out of respect for the board's desire for the building to fit in the historical area, the company would accommodate those wishes.

Councilman Walter Genutis commented that "an empty, dilapidated building that's been empty for many,



many years is getting a million dollar renovation, and the description that has been given to us is not unlike what was in there in the first place, and also historically going back to Franklin's Five and Dime."

Dollar General representatives stated that cameras would be installed inside the store, and contingent upon studies of crimes reported in the area, they would determine how many security cameras may be installed on the outside.

#### Tax ordinances passed

Only two ordinances were on the agenda at last week's meeting, both to clarify existing legislation regarding the filing of income taxes in the city in the wake of House Bill 49 enacted by the Ohio General Assembly in September.

As explained by Finance Director Frank Gambosi, the first ordinance mandates that municipal income tax codes be amended by January 31, 2018, dealing with penalties, interest, fees and charges, with the following meet on Tuesday, Dec. 19, amendment: "With respect to any unpaid withholding tax, a penalty equal to and not to exceed 50 percent of

The second ordinance establishes two different due dates for declaration of estimated tax, with businesses in the city having to file by December 15, and to allow individuals to file by January 15, 2018.

"Be aware of federal tax laws and deductions," Gambosi stated, adding, "All we are doing is matching our dates with their dates in this ordinance."

Councilwoman Paula Mizsak said that the annual "Lights Out For Hunger" observance in the city would spent on electrical costs to local food banks.

Garfield Heights Council met Monday night and passed an emergency ordinance to reinstate the position of safety director in the city.

The position had been abolished in 1990 and council did not reassign the duties of safety director. Currently Mayor Vic Collova has been performing the duties of safety director with no additional pay. The ordinance passed Monday will rectify that situation and provide the mayor with a rate of pay of Range 1, Step 1 (minimum wage).

Other ordinances passed by council Monday included:

Council also voted to cancel its December 27th meeting as there is no city business on the agenda. A special meeting may be called as needed. The next regular meeting of council will be Monday, January 8th, 2018.

In his report to council, Police Chief Robert Byrne said there continues to be a rash of thefts from autos, locked and unlocked. #### **GARFIELD HTS.**

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#### **Aggravated Robbery**

•A Mayfield Heights resident said he was robbed and shot in the hand by someone he was supposed to meet with to purchase a gaming system through the website Offer Up on December 2nd, around 5:50 p.m., in the area of É. 144th and Cranwood Park Blvd. He said he and his girlfriend pulled into a driveway on Cranwood and were greeted by the suspect. The suspect told the victim to follow him to the back of the house, and once there the suspect pulled out a gun and told the victim to give him his money. When the victim said it was in the car, the suspect led him back to the car and again demanded money from the victim and his girlfriend at gunpoint. The victim tried to reverse out of the driveway and flee but instead only revved the engine. The suspect fired one round before the victim was able to reverse the car and leave the scene. He noticed he had been hit by a bullet which grazed his thumb. Detectives found a bullet hole in the victim's dashboard. Officers from Garfield Heights, Solon and Maple Fleeing Heights were called to the area to search for the suspect with negative results.

•A man wearing a black coat, gray beanie and royal blue jogging pants with white stripes down the sides allegedly robbed the Walgreens at Turney and Rockside last Thursday, around 9:25 p.m., according to reports. Employees said the man brought a package of toilet



paper to the checkout counter, then demanded all the money from the register be put in a Walgreens bag. The employees complied and the man fled. The employees were not sure if a getaway vehicle was involved. A copy of surveillance video footage was to be given to the Detective Bureau for further investigation.

#### **Criminal Damage/Theft from Auto**

#### **Disorderly Conduct**

On December 10th, around 10:10 p.m., police were dispatched to the area of E. 131st and Maplerow Ave. and found a man sitting completely naked in the middle of the roadway with cars passing by; his clothes were scattered in the road. Police were able to identify him as a 42-year-old Cleveland resident and noticed he had been sweating, even though the temperature outside was 20°F, and officers believe the man was high on PCP. Police said that as they approached the man he took a defensive stance and refused to turn around and put his hands behind his back. Officers deployed one round from a Taser and the man was arrested. He was taken to Marymount Hospital to be treated/evaluated and was issued a summons for disorderly conduct and resisting arrest.

While on patrol on December 7th, around 2:15 a.m., officers heard a vehicle with a loud exhaust in the Warner Rd. and Garfield Blvd. area. Police followed the vehicle and attempted to pull the car over on Blythin but the vehicle fled and eventually crashed into a fence on Garfield Blvd. The driver, a 24-year-old Cleveland male, and the passenger, an 18-year-old female from Maple Heights, were immediately taken into custody. Inside the car, police found clear plastic baggies, 131 grams of marijuana, two plastic bags containing over 9 grams of a pink rock substance consistent with carfentanyl, several cell phones and over \$2000 in cash. The 18-year-old said the drugs were hers. The male and female were arrested and held on investigation of drug possession. The 24-year-old was cited for reckless operation, fleeing and eluding, driving under suspension, failure to control, muffler, excessive noise and running stop signs. The 18-year-old was issued a summons for possession of marijuana and the pink rock substance.

#### Theft

A 73-year-old woman told police someone snatched her purse from her shopping cart while she was loading groceries into her car in the Marc's parking lot on December 6th, around 6:40 p.m. A similar incident was reported to GHPD on December 1st. The woman said the male got into a black, 4-door sedan and fled the lot towards Turney Rd.

While police were still at Marc's, GHPD received a similar call concerning a purse theft at Dave's Supermarket at Turneytown. The suspect vehicle was described as a black Chrysler 200. GHPD had a report of a vehicle stolen matching that description on December 2nd. The same vehicle has also been reported as being seen in robberies and thefts in Cleveland. Police continue to investigate.

#### Weapon Offense

•Around 11:40 p.m. December 4th, police were dispatched to the Edgepark Dr. area near the Metroparks after receiving several complaints of shots fired in the area. Police found no evidence of shots fired on Edgepark but were flagged down by a Russell Ave. resident who said he heard several gunshots near his home, then noticed fresh damage to his vehicle. The front bumper had been grazed by a bullet and the front driver's side tire was flattened. He told police he did not believe he was specifically targeted.

Another Russell Ave. resident told police he saw someone at the intersection of Russell and Edgepark exit a vehicle from the driver's side, shoot indiscriminately in a southwest direction, then get back into a dark colored Ford 4-door and leave the area towards Edgepark Dr. Police found two spent rounds in the intersection.

• Police were dispatched to the area of Woodward and Eastwood Blvd. on December 6th, around 1 a.m., for a report of shots fired. Three males were congregating next to a white SUV but one of them fled on foot before police could question him. The two other males said they agreed to fight someone who lives on Hastings Rd. and when they got next to the Ace Hardware on Turney Rd. near Hastings they saw someone standing down the street who began firing shots at them so they ran away. They did not believe it was the same male they wanted to fight.

Police went to the suspect's home on Hastings and spoke to him. Six shell casings were found in front of his house. The man said the two males did want to fight him but when he went outside he didn't see anyone. He went back inside and heard several gunshots, then ran back out but didn't see anyone, according to the report. Police continue to investigate.
