Bedford Council passes bill to Attorney General DeWine honored with Freedom Award by American Nationalities hike sewer rates; Zolata honored

Ohio Attorney General Mike DeWine was honored recently by the American Nationalities Movement with its Freedom Award. DeWine received the award at the organization's annual Christmas event on Saturday, Dec. 16, in Parma.

The American Nationalities Movement was founded by former Cleveland Mayor Ralph Perk in 1959. Its mission is to educate, advocate and represent the interests of all the diverse ethnic groups in the United States and "to overcome any differences between us and act together to further the goals of reducing and eliminating any potential efforts by any group to adversely affect our values and beliefs."

The Freedom Award is given for service to the community and support of the goals of the group: freedom for people of all countries and bringing together the various nationalities organizations and leaders

Sewer rates in Bedford will be going up 4 percent next year, after council passed legislation last week to increase the rates. The monthly minimum charge is now \$21.75, which will be raised to a minimum of \$22.44 per month, effective Feb. 1, 2018. Any additional water usage over the monthly minimum of 300 cubic feet will be billed accordingly.

Because the city operates its own sewer system for Bedford homeowners and also some residential owners in the neighboring Village of Oakwood, it charges "reasonable rates designed to cover the costs of operat-

debt service charges on bonds and notes issued for improvements in the sewer system. A sister ordinance also

passed at the meeting will provide for a rate reduction for senior citizens and the permanently disabled who own residential property. Users who qualify for the rate reduction will pay a proportionate share of the costs to operate and maintain the sewer system, and must meet all requirements of the city's Water and Sewer Discount Program.

Senior and disabled residents will pay a monthly minimum sewer bill of \$15.71, effective Feb. 1, 2018, up from the current monthly minimum of \$15.10, and as with the

A third reading for the city's 2018 budget was tabled at last week's Maple Heights Council meeting, Council Clerk Leonette Cicirella stated, explaining that council will further discuss the legislation and vote on it at a special meeting of council tonight, Wednesday, Dec. 27, at 6:30 p.m. in Room 7 of Maple Heights City Hall, 5353 Lee Rd.

Cleveland water department ment with the county fiscal officer. employee arrested last week

As a result of an internal investigation conducted by the City of Cleveland and the Cleveland Division of Police, an employee of the Harvard Avenue water department facility at 4600 Harvard Ave. was arrested last week by the Cleveland Division of Police on suspicion of selling stolen goods, according to a press release from the City of Cleveland.

The employee, Thomas Sneperger, 58, is accused of stealing metals belonging to the City of Cleveland that he had access to while working at the facility. He is accused of selling the metals as scrap, according to the release. Following the city's internal investigation, its findings were turned over to the Division of Police, who arrested the employee at work on December 20th.

Sneperger is being charged with theft and aggravated theft. His arraignment is scheduled for this Friday.

Total expenditures and expenses for next year's bud-regular sewer rates, addiget are projected at about \$20.3 million, according to figures released by Finance Director Tracy Smith.

Also tabled on third reading last week was an ordinance to amend this year's budget, for the fiscal year ending Dec. 31, 2017, and to submit the amended appropriations (about \$19.5 million) to the county fiscal officer; and an ordinance for Smith to amend the 2017 Certificate of Estimated Resources and file the amend-

The 2017 estimated receipts were \$20.7 million, while the amended estimated receipts are \$20.2 million, according to Smith. Along with the budget ordinance, these pieces of legislation will be discussed and voted on at tonight's special council meeting.

Another ordinance authorizing Smith to prepare and file an amended 2018 certificate of estimated resources with the county fiscal officer to reflect the 2018 budget was placed on first reading for future discussion.

State Senator Kenny Yuko, whose district includes Maple Heights, gave a special presentation honoring outgoing Council President Richard Trojanski at council's meeting last week.

Yuko recognized Trojanski for his years of service to the city, including three terms as District 6 councilman, and a term as the council president, Cicirella stated.

Environmental Management Service, Inc., for asbestos abatement at the Ellenwood Recreation Center, at a cost of \$25.000

The city determined that Ellenwood was in need of asbestos abatement to expand use of the facility, and the Building Department had recommended Arick's, to provide the services.

Mallis stated that about a month and a half ago asbestos was found in some areas of the building. He said Arick's would tear down portions of the ceiling that need to get abated.

"The goal is to utilize that building much more than we are currently utilizing it," he said. "We want to make sure everything is in good working order before we look to increase programming and other things at the Center."

The U-Haul storage unit facility at Broadway near Rockside will be moving into a new home in the city, after council approved a recommendation of the Planning Commission regarding a request from Amereo Real Estate of Phoenix, Arizona, to use the structure at 19000 Rockside Rd. for interior self storage, U-Haul Truck & Trailer share and retail sales.

Koci explained that the Rockside property was the former Tim Lally auto dealership property that U-Haul wanted to purchase. The move to consolidate to the new location will be within a reasonable amount of time to allow storage unit customers to move their items, Law Director John Montello stated.

Cuyahoga County among those chosen for foster care recruitment program

Ohio Attorney General Mike DeWine announced that eight counties hit hard by the opioid epidemic, including Cuyahoga County, have been chosen to participate in a family finding and foster family recruitment program DeWine announced in August.

"Ohio still has a great need for families to help children in foster care. These can be biological family members or those who feel called to serve children in need," said Attorney General DeWine.

"I am pleased the grants we announced earlier this year will be used to address this need in counties that have been greatly impacted by this opioid epidemic," he said.

The pilot program, which is part of a \$1 million grant that the Attorney General announced in August, provides for the cost of a full-time staff member in each county who would be responsible for family search and engagement and foster family recruitment. The program will be administered by the Waiting Child Fund, a nonprofit with expertise in foster care which has pledged to contribute additional funds to the effort.

'Children are entering foster care throughout the state at an alarming rate. casings with negative results. The 27-year-old was taken to MetroHealth Medical Center for treatment. The Detective Bureau continues to investigate.


Weapon Offense
