Re'Jon Luttrell, 18, is being sought by the Garfield Heights Police Department for attempted murder, according to GHPD Lt. Robert Petrick.

Teen sought in attempted

murder case in Garfield Hts.

According to a filed police report, two young women, both 18, said they were shot by an acquaintance after a gathering at an apartment on East 126th Street in Garfield Heights turned into an argument on New Year's Day, around 4 a.m.



Police learned a group of girls went to the apartment around 2:30 Luttrell a.m. and left around 4 a.m. when the boys there began arguing with them. They said one of the males pulled out a gun and started shooting after they had gone outside, striking one of the girls in the leg, according to the police report.

Police later learned two of the girls from the group went back into the apartment to get the belongings they had left behind, and the same male became angry. According to the report, they began arguing, and once the girls were outside, the same male again started shooting, striking a second girl in the leg.

Petrick said Luttrell's mother had recently rented an apartment for him on East 126th Street but he has not been seen there since the shooting on January 1st.

Luttrell's last known address is on Hildana Road in Shaker Heights. "He is known very well by the Shaker Heights Police Department from his past criminal behavior as a juvenile and he is most likely in that area at this time," said Petrick.

"We are currently still investigating the shooting and attempting to gain informa-tion from uncooperative witnesses," Petrick said. Anyone with information should call the Garfield Heights Detective Bureau at 216-475-5686.

Manager Mike Mallis to Maple Heights to apply for FEMA funds for fire dept. vehicle, equipment

Maple Heights Council approved legislation at its meeting last week to apply for almost \$1 million in Federal Emergency Management Agency grant funding for the city's fire department, which would be used to buy vehicles, pumper. equipment and other needed items.

Two ordinances authorizing Mayor Annette Blackwell and Fire Chief Vito Kavaliunas to enter into a contract with Gatchell Grant Resources, LLC, were approved to develop and submit an application for a 2017 Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) from FEMA.

"This grant would cover 90 percent of the cost of the new apparatus and is a significant opportunity to replace this pumper at a very low cost, as the city may have a difficult time replacing it at full cost in the future," he noted.

Kavaliunas stated that the pumper has over 80,000 miles, over 8,000 engine hours and has required \$35,799 in repairs over the past three years.

eral advantages over a pumper, he stated, because a 75-foot hydraulic aerial ladder would be better able to reach upper windows of multi-story buildings, and would "give us the ability to provide elevated water streams for buildings and homes involved in heavy fire, and reach buildings that are set back from the street or parking lots. This would be extremely important for numerous apartment complexes and warehouses throughout the city.'

The height advantage of a ladder truck would also give firefighters a greater ability to cut ventilation holes in roofs during work-



Also passed was an ordinance for Mallis to enter into a contract with Lally Chevrolet to buy two 2018 Chevrolet Tahoes, also through the state purchasing program, at a cost of \$71.974.

All of the vehicle purchases were budgeted items and were purchased at the lowest price available through the state contract, Mallis stated.

Sign up for CodeRED alerts in Bedford

Residents of the city of Bedford can now sign up for CodeRED, a system that sends emergency notifications by phone, email, text and social media to keep citizens informed of emergencies such as an evacuation notices, utility outages, water main breaks, fire or floods, chemical spills or other emergency situations.

The City may also activate CodeRED to send general notifications to registered subscribers to communicate non-life safety matters, such as planned road closures, water main repairs, water and power service interruptions, etc. By selecting the box for general alerts, you will also receive these types of notifications.

Drug Abuse

On January 8th, around 4:20 a.m., police saw a vehicle travelling on Broadway at E. 131st St. with no rear license plate illumination and pulled the car over at Forestdale. The driver and backseat passenger provided identification, however the front seat passenger refused. Police said the backseat passenger appeared to be very nervous and the driver and front passenger were evasive when answering questions. The driver also refused to give police consent to search the vehicle.

Officers then called for a K9 unit for a vehicle sniff. A K9 arrived and alerted police to the front passenger side. Inside the car under the front passenger seat, police found a used hypodermic needle, syringe and crack pipe. The passenger gave police false names several times before finally admitting she was a 25-yearold Kent resident. After running her identification through LEADS, police learned she had a felony warrant for dangerous drugs through the Portage County Sheriff's Office and a misdemeanor warrant with GHPD. Officers then arrested her. She was issued a summons for possession of drug abuse instruments and paraphernalia and obstruction of official business.

The driver of the vehicle, 37, of Cleveland, was cited for no rear illumination and she and the backseat passenger were released at the scene.

On January 17th, around 1:10 p.m., police were dispatched to the area near the Garfield Heights Library in reference to an attempted abduction complaint. A 32year-old Garfield Heights woman told police she was outside the library when two men in their 20s came up to her and asked what she had in her pockets. She told police she then covered her pockets with her arms and the men grabbed her. She said she was able to run away from the males and they left the area in a gray vehicle.

Western Union agreed to pay \$586 million to settle charges by the Federal Trade Commission and U.S. Justice Department that the company looked the other way while scammers used its money wiring system, despite receiving hundreds of thousands of complaints about scam activity.


