Garfield police searching for suspect in shooting

The Garfield Heights Police Department has issued an arrest warrant for 18-year-old Robert Jackson of Cleveland. He is wanted for attempted murder for the shooting of a 17-year-old male on April 2nd on North Parkway Avenue in Garfield Heights, according to Detective Carl Biegacki with the Garfield Heights Detective Bureau.

The 17-year-old male was shot in the chest and hand on April 2nd, around 10:15 p.m., in the 12800 block of North Parkway, according to a police report. Cleveland and Garfield Heights police arrived at the scene and spoke to the teen who said he had been with four other males and one of them shot him, then the four males fled the scene on foot, according to the report.

Cleveland police searched the area and found two spent casings in the street where the teen said the shooting occurred. The teen was taken to Rainbow Babies and Children's Hospital to be treated, and Det. Biegacki said he is doing much better and will pull through.

Police later learned that the suspects involved were driving a silver Jeep prior to the shooting, and it may have been low on fuel so still could have been in the area, according to the report. Officers found the vehicle on a treelawn in the 9200 block of Miles Avenue and confirmed it had been stolen out of Cleveland.



Bedford Council considers bill to make landlords pay delinquent property taxes

Bedford Council is considering an ordinance to amend existing legislation which would force landlords in the city to pay up on their delinquent Cuyahoga County property taxes. Council placed the ordinance on first reading at its meeting last week.

The ordinance is similar to legislation passed in other northeast Ohio communities, City Manager Mike Mallis said, explaining that it is intended to combat the problem of rental property owners dodging property taxes in the city, all while continuing to collect rent from their tenants

The proposed legislation states, "No certificate shall be issued for any structure used... for residential occupancy... which has a certified delinquent property tax balance or other unpaid liens," unless the property owner or agent "provides documentation of being on a delinquent payment plan in good standing with Cuyahoga County.'

Property owners who also have unpaid balances for nuisance abatement costs imposed by the city will not be issued rental certificates, according to the ordinance. It also states that if structures falling under these violations are occupied by a tenant, "the Building Commissioner shall provide notice to such tenant of the rejection of the application for the issuance or renewal of a certificate.

Mallis said the county was willing to help property owners who might have trouble paying on their taxes. "You might not have the money to deal with it today, but contact them and they will work with you," he said.

If passed, Bedford's new legislation would require owners of rental properties to be current on their property taxes. Council will discuss the ordinance before a vote at a future meeting.

Vehicle purchases

To replace aging and deteriorated vehicles used by various city departments, council passed several ordínances to purchase new vehicles, including amended ordinances that had been placed on first reading at a meeting last month.

Passed were two ordinances to purchase two 2018 4x4 GMC pickup trucks, both from Jay Buick GMC of Bedford, for the city's Water Department, one for \$28,115.60, the other for \$27,367.21.

Originally the trucks were to be purchased from other dealership's outside the city at a lower price, but as Mayor Stan Koci explained, "We go with our rule that [if the price is] within 10 percent, we will take a local business over an outside business. We have a certain loyalty, especially to our Auto Mile and to local businesses... whenever we can do the 10 percent difference we will go with getting a local business, so that's why we're doing this.

Another ordinance that was passed was to purchase a 2018 F-450 Ford dump truck with plow for the Service Department, at a cost of \$64,223.55 from Valley Ford Truck of Valley View.

Council passed another ordinance to buy another vehicle from Jay Buick, a 2018 4x4 GMC pickup for the Service Department, for \$30,204.66. "These are GM Fleet Bid Assist prices that we are getting," Mallis explained.

Opt-in ordinance prompted by lawsuit

Another ordinance that was passed at last week's meeting was prompted by a lawsuit between numerous municipalities in the state of Ohio and the state tax commissioner, in which the cities had challenged the constitutionality of House Bill 49 and the state's collection of the municipal net profits tax.

Law Director John Montello stated, "This is the result

of a lawsuit decided by trial court that we are required to follow the state law regarding income tax collection. We're presently involved in a lawsuit along with a number of communities and we've appealed that decision, but so far the appeal has been unsuccessful.'

Finance Director Frank Gambosi added, "We have to abide by passing their legislation and adding that to our ordinance that allows them to collect our taxes. Otherwise, we would be in for a situation where we wouldn't have a tax ability... At this point, I ask council to approve this... and we will continue our efforts towards appeals in regards to this matter."

Other legislation

Council passed an ordinance to approve a contract with the city's firefighters, Local 1683, with the terms in effect retroactive to January 2018.

Mallis said the firefighters contract was similar to legislation passed at a previous meeting for a contract with the city's police. "Ultimately we came to an agreement that was very fair on both sides. We've addressed things such as health care provisions... smoking clauses in there similar to the police and adjusting longevity and some other items... I think it's a fair deal and a good deal on both sides.

Also passed was legislation to declare a structure at 401 W. Glendale a nuisance and ordering that it be condemned due to "dangerous, unsafe and insanitary" conditions; a two-year contract with AC Lawncare & Landscaping for tree lawn and lot maintenance in the city on an as-needed basis; and to accept three parcels of land obtained through the Cuyahoga County Land Reutilization Program (Land Bank) for the city's use.

Council approved a motion to accept the Planning Commission's recommendation regarding Third Sun Solar LLC, representing owner Dick Marcellino of Motorcars Acura/Volvo Arm Performance Group LLC, 18123 Rockside Rd., on a proposal to install a rooftop mount, 411-panel, solar photovoltaic electric energy system

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Also approved was a motion to accept the Planning Commission's recommendation regarding a conceptual approval of Mazda of Bedford/Qua Inc., of Bedford, on a proposal to build an auto dealership for new and used auto sales and service, at part of the Meadowbrook Shopping Center at Rockside and Northfield Roads.

"This is the first step in getting the new dealership up there at Rockside and Northfield, and starting the reclaiming of all that property and making it useful again," Koci said.

Council denied a motion to accept a Board of Zoning Appeals recommendation regarding Byron Greene, 660 Columbus Rd., who was approved by the Planning Commission and council to build a 30' by 40' pole barn garage, and was seeking relief from the codified ordinances for a height regulation variance.

Announcements

City residents who need help on their taxes can visit the city's Tax Department this Saturday, April 14, from 9 a.m.-1 p.m. for assistance.

The city's chipper service is expected to start up again this month, and residents who have debris that needs to get picked up can contact the city's service department.

A Shred Day will be held from 9 a.m.-noon on Saturday, May 19, in the City Hall parking lot for residents.

The Ohio Department of Transportation has informed the city that repairs and maintenance of the Northfield Road Bridge is now the city's responsibility, and since Bedford had neither the resources nor the manpower. Mallis said he would continue trying to appeal that decision.

Koci addressed comments made on a Facebook page dealing with issues in Bedford from residents who were concerned that an American flag on Public Square appeared to be at half mast. He explained that due to trees near the flagpole, the flag was lowered about 10 feet to avoid it becoming snagged and damaged by branches.



Maple Hts. Council approves Beverly water main replacement project

A water main replacement project for Beverly Avenue, in the Warrensville Center-Libby Road area of the city, was approved by Maple Heights Council at its meeting last week.

A resolution authorizing Mayor Annette Blackwell to enter into a contract with S.E.T. Inc. to replace the water main on the street, from Mayville Avenue to Auburn Avenue, was okayed at a cost of \$295,598.56.

In March of last year City Engineer Ed Hren applied to the Cleveland Division of Water to fund the water main replacement project, under the Suburban Water Main Renewal program. The city was then awarded \$492,734 from the water department, and in July council passed a resolution for Hren to begin preparing plans and specs and to go out for bids.

Grass cutting, rental regs addressed

Two ordinances concerning property owners in the city were on the agenda at last week's meeting, one concerning notice to cut weeds and grass six inches or higher, the other regarding renewal of rental registra-

Council passed the grass cutting ordinance, which reduces the time period for abating the nuisance, from Hren said the earliest start date for the project would five days to two days. Property owners will receive a calendar year, and subsequent violations "need no fur-

"The notice shall conspicuously state that failure to Council also passed a resolution authorizing Maple comply will result in the city causing the work to be done, and the costs to be assessed against the property,'

the legislation states.

Placed on first reading was the registration/license "because it is obsolete and not needed for any public ordinance, which would amend existing legislation that currently requires landlords to renew rental registrations and tenant rental licenses upon a change in tenant and ownership of the property.

> Under the proposed ordinance, Councilwoman Sharri Thomas has recommended that the renewals and payment of fees be on an annual basis, even if there has been no change in ownership or tenancy from the previous payment. The renewals and licenses would not be transferable, meaning that a new owner would have to pay the fees, even if the previous owner had already paid the fees for that calendar year.

Other legislation passed

A resolution designating April 2018 as "World Autism Month" in the city was passed by council at last week's meeting. It was noted in the legislation that autism is "the fastest growing developmental disability in the United States, affecting more than three million people, is an urgent public health crisis that demands a national response.

An estimated 38,858 children with autism reside in the state of Ohio alone, according to information provided by the city. Maple Heights was participating in the observance of Autism Awareness Month and World Autism Awareness Day "in the hope that it will lead to a better understanding of this disorder.'



Also passed was a resolution designating April 2018 as "Fair Housing Month" in the city, as April 11, 2018 marked the 50th anniversary of the passage of the Fair Housing Act of the Civil Rights Act of 1968.

Maple Heights has adopted its own Fair Housing chapter within its codified ordinances, prohibiting discrimination in housing, the legislation states, and will begin a year-long commemoration of the Fair Housing Act, calling upon officials and residents to recognize the celebration of this milestone throughout the year.

Council also passed legislation to change the regular meeting schedule of its meetings, normally held twice a month, to one meeting a month during the summer. Meetings will be held at 7 p.m. on Wednesday, June 6, Thursday, July 5, and Wednesday, August 1, at the Maple Heights Senior Center, 15901 Libby Rd.



Alternative school administrator accused of sexual misconduct

Courtney Alfred, an administrator at a Bedford alternative school, is being accused of having an inappropriate relationship with a student, according to Bedford Police Chief Rick Suts.

The complainant is alleging that he had a sexual affair with Alfred, 39, of Northfield, that began

when he was 17, during the 2016-17 school year, according to Suts.

"He had text messages that he claimed were from her discussing sexual encounters. He also had a clip of a white female and a black male engaged in sexual intercourse. He tells us it is him having sex with her," said

Suts said the female in the video had a tattoo on her tattoo. Suts said it matched the tattoo from the video clip. Alfred was arrested March 28th and is being charged with sexual battery, according to court records.



4 oz. goat cheese, crumbled

Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil. Add the fusilli and cook as the label directs. Add the sugar snap peas and/or broccoli, carrots and bell pepper to the boiling water during the last 2 minutes of cooking. Reserve $\frac{1}{2}$ cup cooking water, then drain the pasta and vegetables and return to the pot.

Meanwhile, heat the olive oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Add the garlic and cook until just golden, about 30 seconds. Add the tomatoes, red pepper flakes and 1 teaspoon salt; cook until the tomatoes begin to wilt, about 2 minutes. Stir in ½ cup of the reserved cooking water. Pour the tomato mixture over the pasta and vegetables. Add the mint, parmesan and half the goat cheese and toss to combine. Season with salt.

Divide the pasta among bowls. Top with the remaining goat cheese and drizzle with olive oil.
