Students take center stage at Garfield Heights Council meeting

It was a pretty packed house Monday night at the regular meeting of Garfield Heights Council as Garfield Heights High School's 2018 "Top 10" graduating seniors and their families were recognized with applause and a resolution commending them. (See photo on Page 4.)

Also on hand was one of the winners of the Mayor for a Day essay contest, sponsored by Garfield Heights United. Garfield Heights Middle School 8th grader Anthony Hemel sat next to Mayor Vic Collova at the meeting after spending the day with co-winner D'adriana Jackson, a 7th grader at the Middle School, touring the various municipal departments, talking to city officials and learning what makes a local government work.

McDonald's on Turney Road furnished everyone at City Hall with lunch Monday and Garfield Heights United awarded plaques to the pair. A family emergency prevented D'adriana from attending Monday night's meeting.

Legislation passed by council at the meeting included:

•Authorizing the purchase of a 2017 Freightliner rescue squad for the fire department as well as a power cot and power load apparatus for the vehicle.

• Renewing an agreement with Thomson Reuters for access to westlawnext, a legal information website.

•Entering into a contractual agreement with Ciuni & Panichi, Inc., an independent accounting firm, to review the city's capital asset and infrastructure policies and procedures.

Indy police save woman trying to jump from Valley View bridge

Independence police saved a suicidal woman who was attempting to jump from the I-480 bridge over Valley View last Friday morning, it was noted in Independence Mayor Anthony Togliatti's most recent administrative update

The woman was saved due to swift response of dispatchers Brenda Wadle and Sara Spieth, along with Independence police officers Andrew March and Jim Green, Togliatti said.

He also stated the city's Crown Center surveillance camera, which enables dispatchers to monitor traffic on the I-480 bridge, also played a large part in averting the crisis.

At around 10:15 a.m. on April 20th, Wadle observed on surveillance video a female park her car on the berm of the bridge and approach the fence. She alerted officers immediately and Patrolmen March and Green responded.

As March arrived, the female scaled the fence and had one leg over, according to Togliatti. In an instant, March leapt up onto the fence, grabbed the female and pulled her to safety despite her active resistance. The female did not suffer any physical injuries and was taken to a local hospital to receive proper treatment.

"These officers and dispatchers showed outstanding coordination of effort and communication, and a life was saved as a result," said Togliatti.

"Officer March's quick actions prevented a horrible tragedy. I cannot say enough about these employees and their professionalism and performance under pressure. They are a credit to the Independence Police Department and the city of Independence. Thank you to all involved," he said.

Council passed an ordinance for a contract with HGE Concrete Supply Company/Concrete Properties LLC to sell a landfill property the city owns at 7160 Krick Rd. in Walton an ordinance at last week's Hills, with Bedford retaining rights to continue tract with Ohio Council 8 dumping clean fill there, City Manager Mike Mallis explained.

Council also passed an ordinance to amend previous legislation regarding trash in the city, intended to specifically address disposal and collection in the downtown district.

After being informed by the dealerships that three vehicles the city had voted to purchase at a previous meeting were no longer available, council passed three amended pieces of legislation to purchase trucks for the city from Valley Ford Truck.

The vehicles include three 2019 Ford pickup trucks for the Water and Service departments, at a cost of \$30,611, \$25,215 and \$28,610, respectively. Mallis explained that when the city contacted the original dealerships, they were informed that the factory had stopped all new orders due to upcoming changes



Mallis said it was imperative to replace the existing city vehicles, due to their In a statement released deteriorated condition.

> Having previously approved union contracts with the city's police and firefighters, council passed meeting to approve a conand Local 2007 AFSCME (American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees) AFL-CIO, representing the city's service department employees.

> Also approved was legislation to enact a new chapter of the codified ordinances regarding contracts, including new sections on contract procedures, professional design services, public works and surplus property.

Addressing the city manager's authority to investigate costs and discretionary spending without council approval, the new chapter will simplify handling of these items "to spur economic development, simplify procedures in regards to contracting and related services in the most efficient manner," the ordinance states.

Council also passed ordinances for the following: an agreement for the village of Walton Hills to use Bedford's jail facilities, to condemn properties and structures located at 83 Henry St. and 20 Elm St., and to accept three parcels of land in the city from the Cuyahoga County Land Bank.


