OverDrive gets top honors at 'Best of Tech'

More than 220 tech leaders from across Northeast Ohio gathered on April 19th to see which companies would be honored at OHTec's 12th annual Best of Tech Awards, which recognizes the highest performing and most innovative technology companies in Greater Cleveland.

OverDrive, located near Granger Road in Garfield Heights, was honored as Large Tech Company of the

OverDrive has worked exclusively with digital content since 1986. As an early leader in the industry, the company began developing interactive diskette and CD-ROM products in the 1980s. As technology progressed, so did OverDrive. It moved from providing digital media in physical formats to providing digital media downloaded - and now also in browsers, without downloading - all through the internet.

In 2000, OverDrive launched its digital marketplace, Content Reserve (now OverDrive Marketplace), which now contains millions of titles from more than 5,000 publishers. In 2003, it launched its download service for libraries, which provides eBook, audiobook, and other digital content to millions of library users.

After surpassing one million digital book checkouts in 2007 and 100 million in 2012, leading digital reading platform OverDrive recently announced another remarkable milestone – libraries around the world have reached one billion digital book checkouts.

Maple Heights gets 453K for water main project in Granger-Libby area

The city of Maple Heights has received almost a half million dollars in grant funding, which will be used for a water main project in the Granger-Libby road area of the city, according to a resolution passed at council's April 18th meeting.

The grant was awarded by the Cleveland Water Suburban Water Main Re-Fund, and will be used to Maple Heights, funded reconstruct the water main through a total of \$200,000 on Maple Avenue.

Council also passed a resolution authorizing Mayor Annette Blackwell to enter into a contract with Pro Construction Inc., to provide repairs to the bathroom/concession building said the repairs will be com-

Council also passed a resolution authorizing Blackwell to enter into an agreement with the Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District (NEORSD) for Community Cost-Share Program Funds for stormwater management and construction of a new salt storage facility (salt dome) at the city's Dunham Road Service Center.

The NEORSD has informed the city that the 2018 stormwater management work and the salt dome, which will replace a deteriorated facility, would serve as pollution control and qualify as projects eli-

Garfield Heights okays mediated raise for AFSCME union members

At a special meeting Monday night, Garfield Heights Council okayed a 2 percent wage increase retroactive to January 1, 2018, for all employees of the city who are members of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees Local 2729, AFL-CIO and Ohio Council 8.

These employee union members will also have the option of receiving a retroactive 48-cent wage increase in lieu of the 2 percent raise.

Passage of the raise was the result of recommendations by Factfinder Nels E. Nelson in a Fact-Finding Report of the Ohio State Employment Relations Board.

The union had previously rejected the city's offer in negotiations held in February and appealed the dispute to fact-finding. The union had demanded a 4 percent increase for all bargaining unit members.

Officials address 'State of Schools'

Garfield Heights Schools Superintendent Terry Olszewski, Trinity High School Director of Admissions & Public Relations Patrick Straffen and Cuyahoga Valley Career Center Superintendent Dave Mangas delivered their annual State of the Schools address on April 18th at the Garfield Heights Center for the Performing Arts, sponsored by the Southeast Region Chamber of Commerce.

Blending a mix of prepared remarks with an interactive power point presentation, Olszewski used videos to help share the state of the schools. He opened by remarking on the mandatory statewide testing that "has become a source of great consternation in the last few years."

These test scores do not define our district, nor do they reflect the true accomplishments of our students," he pointed out.

Olszewski provided some basic statistics on the school district, including the fact that there are a total number of 3,653 students, and, of those, 983 are new enrollees and 761 withdrawals since the start of the year. He also stated how

-gible for cost share funds, also fulfilling Ohio EPA permit requirements, and the city was successful in applying for the funds in the amount of \$224,000, according to the resolution.

Council passed a resolution authorizing Blackwell and Fire Chief Vito Kavaliunas to enter into a contract with Gatchell Grant Resources, LLC, to apply for a 2017 SAFER (Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response) Grant by April 27, 2018, to receive financial assistance to support the hiring of three additional firefighters/paramedics for a 36-month period.

Grant recipients are required to contribute a cost share toward the actual cost of hiring firefighters, and Blackwell and Kavaliunas have recommended that the city enter into the contract with Gatchell to develop and submit an application for the SAFER grant, to receive the financial assistance toward hiring the three additional firefighters/paramedics.

For submitting the grant application, Gatchell will receive a fee of \$750, plus a fee of eight percent of the amount of the grant awarded, up to a maximum payment amount of \$3,000.

Placed on second reading by council was an ordinance amending existing legislation that currently requires landlords to renew rental registration and tenant rental licenses upon a change in tenancy and/or ownership of the property.

Under the proposed ordinance, Councilwoman Sharri Thomas has recommended that renewals and payment of fees be on an annual basis, regardless of whether there has been a change in ownership or tenancy from the previous payment. Renewals and licenses would not be transferable, meaning that a new owner would have to pay the fees, even if the previous owner had paid the fees for that calendar year.

Renewals would have to be paid no later than April 30th of each year, according to the legislation.

Updated recovery plan approved

At the April 18th meeting, council passed a motion to approve an updated Financial Recovery Plan for the city, with the continued goal of bringing Maple Heights

out of a state of fiscal emergency, as declared by State Auditor Dave Yost in early 2015.

Council has passed previous versions of the recovery plan, as part of a state-mandated five-year initiative to bring the city out of its deficit, which has been reduced from more than \$2.5 million reported in 2015, to an amount reported as being less than \$800,000, as stated in a version of the plan passed by council in March.

Council did approve the amended version of the plan in March but passed the updated plan to include the number of residential units in the city and an additional line item entitled "Property Taxes, Additional 3.20 mills," Council Clerk Leonette Cicirella stated.

Spotlight Lounge liquor permit hearing requested

Also passed April 18th was a motion authorizing Cicirella to request a hearing with the Ohio Division of Liquor Control "regarding the advisability of transferring the liquor license currently held by Spotlight Restaurant and Lounge, LLC, to Aries Restaurant and Lounge, LLC, at 5154 Warrensville Center Rd."

Earlier this year council passed a resolution declaring the Spotlight a "nuisance, subject to abatement," after incidents had been reported by city officials and police over an 11-month period dating from March 2017.



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
