Closing of U.S. Bank office in Bedford to affect city's coffers

With U.S. Bank announcing the closing of one of its mortgage offices in Bedford later this year, city leaders commented at the council meeting last week on how the loss of about 260 jobs and the consequent loss of an estimated \$350,000 in annual revenue will affect the city.

U.S. Bank officials confirmed earlier this month that their mortgage and consumer banking office at 17500 Rockside Rd. will begin shutting down operations in July.

Jo Ann Svihlik, 65, of Garfield Heights, died last Friday when her SUV caught fire as she was travelling with her husband on Ohio Rt. 2 near the Ohio 269 Lakeside-Marblehead exit, according to The Plain Dealer. The newspaper also reported her husband, Dennis, 71, died Sunday morning at MetroHealth Medical Center from injuries sustained in the crash.

Published reports said the woman was driving a 2005 Chevy Trailblazer when it began to smoke and catch fire and was engulfed in flames in seconds. Dennis Svihlik was able to get out of the SUV while it was still moving and fell onto the road, but his wife was unable to get out and was pronounced dead at the scene, according to The Plain Dealer.

Before ownership of the former Chanel High School property on Northfield Road transfers to the Bedford City Schools, council passed legislation to collect a total of \$1,700 in fines imposed on the property, due to violations of the false alarm ordinance.

The city has notified Saint Servan Chanel LTD, current owner of the property, that it owes \$600, and Rock Church, an occupant of the premises, that it owes \$1,100, for police response to false alarms, as of February 23, 2018.

Council approved two ordinances at last week's meeting, one to purchase a 2018 Ford SUV from Lebanon Ford for \$31,929 to replace a police car that was totaled in an accident, and another to pay North Coast Two-Way Radio \$7,151.90 to purchase and install police equipment in the vehicle.

The legislation, if passed by council at a future meeting, would also allow for the costs to be placed on property taxes if the bills are not paid within 30 days of being received.



AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE CITY OF BEDFORD TO CERTIFY TO THE COUNTY FISCAL OFFICER THE COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH POLICE RESPONSE TO 480 NORTHFIELD ROAD (P.P. 811-29-031) AS SAID PROPERTY OWNER IS IN VIOLATION OF BEDFORD'S FALSE ALARM ORDINANCE AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

WHEREAS, the City of Bedford has previously declared by ordinance various activities to be in violation of the City's False Alarm, and

WHEREAS, the City of Bedford has notified **Saint Servan Chanel LTD** and **Rock Church**, who has failed to pay to Bedford Codified Ordinance Chapter 747, Ohio Revised Code Chapters 727 and 5321, and

WHEREAS, on February 23, 2018, the property owner, Saint Servan Chanel LTD Rock Church 480 Northfield Road (P.P. 811-29-031) was notified that any future police response to this business would result in the property owner being responsible for the costs associated with the police response, and

WHEREAS, Saint Servan Chanel LTD owes \$600.00 and Rock Church owes \$1,100.00 totaling \$1,700.00. The property owner was provided with thirty (30) days to remit payment in the total of \$1,700.00 and has failed to do so.

NOW, THEREFORE,

It is found and determined that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the passage of this Ordinance were passed in an open meeting of this Council and that all such deliberations of this Council and any of its committees that resulted in such formal actions were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all legal requirements, including the City's Charter and Codified Ordinances and Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.

Section 4. This Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure because an emergency exists requiring immediate action to preserve and protect the public peace, property, health, safety and welfare of the City and its inhabitants and to place a lien against the property as soon as possible, enabling the City to immediately protect its right to collect this assessment.

WHEREAS, this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage.

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
