Third man charged in 2017 Broadway gas station murder

Jahil Hardwick, a 26-year-old Cleveland resident, is the third man to be charged in connection with the aggravated murder of Elante Johnson in April 2017 at a gas station in Slavic Village, according to court records.

Two others were recently convicted of aggravated murder in the shooting, Damon Chapman, Jr., 24, and Marquez Williams, 27, both Cleveland residents.

Johnson, 21, also of Cleveland, was fatally shot at Speedy's gas station in the 6200 block of Broadway Avenue in Slavic Village on April 9, 2017, around 3 p.m. He was found lying on the ground on Morton Avenue with multiple gunshot wounds to the chest, abdomen and right forearm, hand and knee area. He was still conscious and breathing as officers administered first aid. EMS then took him to MetroHealth Medical Center where he died.

On May 29th, Cuyahoga County Common Pleas Court Judge Sherrie Miday sentenced Chapman to 33 years to life and Williams to 26 years to life, to be served at Lorain Correctional Institution.

Garfield Heights chosen by state for medical marijuana dispensary site

Garfield Heights has been chosen by the State of Ohio Board of Pharmacy as one of 56 sites in the state that will be issued a provisional dispensary license for medical marijuana, according to a press release issued by the board.

Four other sites in Cuyahoga County were awarded dispensary licenses, two in Cleveland and two in Lake-

The site in Garfield Heights is listed as CannaMed Therapeutics LLC, 10500 Antenucci Blvd., Suite 200.

CanniMed Therapeutics Inc. (CMED) is a Canadianbased, international plant biopharmaceutical company and a leader in the Canadian medical cannabis industry, according to its website. In addition, CMED has an active plant biotechnology research and product development program focused on the production of plantbased materials for pharmaceutical, agricultural and environmental applications.

Provisional license holders can now establish dispensaries in compliance with program rules. All provisional license holders have six months to demonstrate compliance by completing a successful on-site inspection by Board of Pharmacy agents.

Once a dispensary is awarded a certificate of operation, it can begin to sell medical marijuana to Ohio patients and caregivers in accordance with Ohio laws

Marinated Grilled Chicken

1/4 cup balsamic vinegar

Juice of 1 lemon

2 Tbsp. olive oil

2 Tbsp. Dijon mustard

2 Tbsp. brown sugar, packed

1 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce

2 cloves garlic, minced

½ tsp. dried thyme

½ tsp. dried oregano

1/4 tsp. dried rosemary

Kosher salt and ground black pepper, to taste

4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts

2 Tbsp. chopped fresh parsley leaves

In a medium bowl, whisk together balsamic vinegar, 3 cups whole cherry or grape tomatoes lemon juice, olive oil, Dijon, brown sugar, 3 green bell peppers, cut into 1-inch pi Worcestershire, garlic, thyme, oregano and rosemary; season chicken with salt and pepper, to taste. Reserve 1/4 cup and set aside.

In a gallon size Ziploc bag or large bowl, combine balsamic vinegar mixture and chicken; marinate for about an hour, turning the bag occasionally. Drain the chicken from the marinade.

Preheat grill to medium high heat. Add chicken to grill

Heat grill to high. Cut four sheets of foil about 12" long. Grill sausages until charred, three minutes per side, then divide among foil. Fold foil packets crosswise over the sausage and peppers mixture to completely cover the food. Roll top and bottom edges to seal closed. Grill until peppers and onions are tender and sausage is cooked, 13 to 15 minutes. Garnish with parsley and serve.

Preheat oven to 400°. On eight wooden skewers, thread cherry tomatoes, bell peppers, mushrooms, pepperoni and basil.

On a large work surface, roll out pizza dough. Slice into thin, half-inch strips and wrap around skewered ingredients. Brush skewers with olive oil, sprinkle with Italian seasoning, and season with pepper.

Bake until dough is deeply golden, 15 minutes, then remove from oven and sprinkle with mozzarella. Bake until melty, five minutes more.

With summer beginning in the Buckeye State, the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) wants to remind all outdoor enthusiasts to be safe while enjoying outdoor recreational activities this summer in

On the path:

- Stay on the trail when hiking. It is critical for visitors to remain on the trail while hiking to ensure their safety and protect native species. Visitors should not climb rocks or lean over waterfalls or cliffs. Stay on the trail. Learn which state parks offer hiking trails at parks. Visit ohiodnr.gov/hiking.
- Bring water and a high-energy snack. If temperatures are expected to be high be sure to have plenty of water to stay hydrated while hiking. A good snack will help keep hikers energized, especially during longer
- Dress in layers. Wearing different layers will allow hikers to be comfortable as the temperature fluctuates throughout the day.
- •Wear sturdy shoes. Hikers should wear shoes that protect their feet and are appropriate and comfortable for long hikes.
- When hiking alone, check in with others about leaving and returning. Cellphones may not have good reception on the trails so hikers should tell others where
