Garfield Hts. residents should get their (trash) cans in gear; violators could face stiff fines

After Garfield Heights Mayor Vic Collova's impassioned plea at last month's council meeting for residents to take responsibility for cutting their own grass, his focus at Monday night's meeting was the garbage can issue.

Collova said Service Director Tim McLaughlin sent foremen in his department out for a month to check on how many garbage cans were not being brought back to houses in a timely fashion. A city ordinance requires that residents bring in their cans at least 12 hours after garbage pickup.

The mayor said trash can violators averaged between 500 and 600 homes per week with the number as high as 770 violators in a one-week period.

"We have to do something about this," Collova said.

He said the city was looking into sending out warnings to all residents before actually issuing tickets to offenders.

"If it costs them (violators) some money, they might start caring," he said.

In his report to council, Police Chief Robert Byrne said the city's dispatch center returned to Garfield Heights as of May 31st. He said residents with emergencies should call 911; the police non-emergency number is now 216-475-

Byrne also said he has received complaints of cars without handicapped placards being parked at the Civic Center in the disabled

parking area across from the center's back entrance. He said violators will now be ticketed.

City Engineer Dave Krock reported that the Granger Road Hill Rock Scaling Project could be behind by three of four months because of a delay with the utility companies moving poles from one side of the road to the other.

On Monday, June 11, around 7:40 a.m., police received a call from a woman who stated her brother called her and told her he had killed his wife and he was going to kill himself, according to the press release. Officers went to a home on Gardenview Drive and attempted to make contact with the residents without success. As the situation unfolded, evidence indicated there may have been shots fired prior to the release.

The South East Area Law **Enforcement SWAT Team** and Crisis Intervention Team were requested and arrived at the scene. SWAT went into the home and found two people dead, Aclee Dudley, 57, and Arlene Dudley, 56, according to the release. The Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation was called to continue the investigation.

> Currently the mayor has sole power to "appoint and remove or suspend" whoever is serving as law director in the city, according to city ordinances.

> One of the proposed charter changes is stated as follows: "The Director of Law shall be appointed annually by the Mayor with the approval of Council, and may be removed only by affirmative vote of twothirds of the members of Council at any time during that period, provided that such removal shall not impair any contract rights which the Director of Law may possess.'

The other charter change in the proposed legislation states that candidates must have five years or more of 'experience in municipal and "The municipal law requirement may only be waived by the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of Council."

Both pieces of legislation will be discussed by council before consideration at future meetings. As stated in both ordinances, they must be passed by Friday, September 7, to go to voters on the Tuesday, November 6

Passed by council at last week's meeting was a resolution authorizing Engineer Ed Hren to begin preparing plans and go out for bids for the Lee-Libby ordinances, whoever serves Pocket Park Project, after

Council also passed a resolution for the city to contract with vendors to provide grass cutting and landscape work at vacant and nuisance properties within all seven districts of the city, at a cost of \$30 per single lot, \$60 per and \$120 per quad lot.

And also passed was an ordinance to accept titles to four parcels of land obtained through the Cuyahoga County Land Bank on Lincoln Street, Street and Garfield Avenue.

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NOACA awards grants away on June 8th.

The Northeast Ohio Areawide Coordinating Agency (NOACA) Board yesterday approved \$1,787,130 in projects to serve older adults and individuals with disabilities in the area.

Locally, the city of Maple Heights will receive \$84,665 for vehicle replacements, and University Settlement in Slavic Village has been awarded \$42,000, also for vehicle replacements.

The Enhanced Mobility for Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities Program helps communities and organizations purchase wheelchair lift-equipped vehicles, computers and dispatch software to serve the unique transport needs of special populations.

NOACA received 27 total grant requests amounting to nearly \$4.2 million. After a rigorous evaluation, 15 organizations, including transit authorities, municipalities, non-profits, for-profits, and social service agencies, were chosen to receive awards.

Out of the 22 inner-ring cities that were asked to submit an application, only 4 cities were granted the award.

Applicants for funding will include small businesses and manufacturers, ethnic businesses, startups and economically disadvantaged businesses. Activities eligible for funding are property acquisition, new construction, signage, renovations and purchase of machinery and equipment. Program parameters and criteria for the program as well as applications can be downloaded from the City's website.

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CITY OF BEDFORD, OHIO - RESOLUTION NO. 2524-18

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE NECESSITY TO IMPROVE CERTAIN STREETS IN THE CITY OF BEDFORD, OHIO BY LIGHTING THE SAME AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Bedford, County of Cuyahoga and State of Ohio, three-fourths of the members elected thereto concurring:

<u>Section 1</u>. That it is hereby deemed and declared necessary and conducive to the public health, convenience and welfare to improve the following streets; to wit:

Section 2. Pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Chapter 727 that the plans, specification profiles and estimates of the proposed improvement now on file in the office of the City Manager, exofficio the Director of Public Service, be and the same are hereby approved.

Section 3. That the whole cost of said improvement, less one-fiftieth thereof, and the cost of intersections shall be assessed by the percentage of the tax valuation on the following described lots and lands. All lots and lands bounding and abutting upon the streets named above between the termini above set forth which lots and lands are hereby determined to be specially benefited by said improvement. The cost of said improvement shall include the cost and expense of the assessment, and printing, publishing the notices, resolutions and ordinances required, including notices of assessment, the cost of lighting said streets and any other necessary expenditure

Section 4. That it is hereby determined and provided that notice of the passage of this Resolution and the filing of the estimated assessments under Section 727.12 of the Revised Code, be given by publication of such notice once a week for two consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Bedford, Ohio and provided for in Section 727.14 of the Revised Code.

Section 5. That the assessments herein provided for shall be collected before the improvement herein provided for shall be completed so that funds may be available for the payment of said improvement.

<u>Section 6</u>. The owner of any property assessed may, at this option, pay such assessment in cash within thirty (30) days after passage of the assessing ordinance.

<u>Section 7</u>. That no bonds or notes shall be issued in anticipation of the collection of said assessments and that the remainder of the entire cost of said improvement shall be paid out of the general fund.

Section 8. This Resolution is hereby determined to be an emergency measure immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, safety and welfare of the City of Bedford and for the further reason that it is necessary to provide for such lighting as soon as possible for the general safety and welfare of the citizens of this city and the general public.

 $WHEREFORE, this \ Resolution \ shall \ be \ in \ full \ force \ and \ effect \ immediately \ upon \ its \ passage.$

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
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Ward 12's Marcy Shannon honored on 'Senior Day'

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
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
