GHPD investigating shots fired in Bonkers lot; owner offering reward

Garfield Heights police the male in the Adidas shirt to call the Garfield Heights fired in the back parking lot at Bonkers, a bar on Turney Road, on Saturday, June 16th. Bonkers owner, Rick Shuba, is offering his own \$500 reward for information leading to the capture and arrest of the persons involved.

According to footage shown on Fox8.news.com, surveillance video inside the bar shows a man in a black Adidas t-shirt looking to argue with another patron. Once outside, a surveillance camera on Turney Road shows the same male outside the bar trying to throw a punch at a second male. The males are then seen running to the back parking lot and one of the males begins firing a gun. It is unclear whether about the incident is urged

> Shuba said a new light is being installed in the back lot and police will be patrolling the area to provide more security.

> "Having extra security measures is necessary to prevent this from happening again. I'm frustrated and sick over it," he said.

He and his wife have owned the bar for about 14 years. In a phone interview, Shuba said the incident was so spur of the moment and unlike anything that has happened there recently.

- •PAPER & BOXES: Flatten cardboard items, like cereal boxes, to save space.
- PLASTIC BOTTLES & JUGS: Empty and rinse. Replace the cap.

Place these items loose - not bagged - in your recycling bin or cart. All items should be clean, empty and dry. Plastic bottles and jugs include items with an opening or neck that is narrower than the body.

Newburgh Hts. police arrest suspect in rape

The Newburgh Heights Police Department arrested Chinyere "Ray" Okoronkwo, a 20-year-old male suspect in a strong arm rape incident reported on June 17th on Alpha Avenue, according to a press release from Police Chief John Majoy.

Okoronkwo, of Newburgh Heights, was apprehended without incident on Tuesday, June 26, around 5 p.m., while walking near E. 49th St. and Harvard Ave., according to Majoy. He was charged with rape and felonious assault and held on a \$1 million bond, according to Majoy. He said NHPD will be seeking other indictments in addition to these charges resulting from the same

He appeared in Garfield Heights Municipal Court Tuesday morning and waived a preliminary hearing. The case has been bound over to the grand jury, according to Majoy.

Cuyahoga County Medical Examiner Dr. Thomas Gilson recently released the 2017 Preliminary Drug Deaths Report. While this report marks an increase in the number of fatal overdoses, the rate of increase has slowed.

Overdose fatalities increased by 80 percent between 2015 and 2016, but only increased by 9 percent between 2016 and 2017. Notable trends/data include:

We will continue to attack this epidemic through treatment and prevention. And we have filed a lawsuit to hold those pharmaceutical companies accountable for the damage they have caused," said Budish.



For the next three months, persons with warrants out for their arrest are being given a second chance to appear in court without further penalty or punishment.

While hundreds of people have taken advantage of the 2nd Chance Program in the past, many more could have cleared their outstanding cases if they would just show up. The court currently has about 10,000 warrants for people's arrest.

"We have to issue arrest warrants when people do not appear for their cases. If they come into contact with police through a traffic stop or otherwise, they are immediately arrested and taken to jail. You can imagine the impact on their families and jobs if they are caught in this situation. They can avoid the loss of time from work and embarrassment by just coming to court," said Garfield Heights Municipal Court Judge Deborah Nicastro.

The 2nd Chance Program involves both criminal and traffic cases. When an arrest warrant is issued for failure to appear, the court notifies the BMV which suspends or blocks the person's driver's
