### Bedford to seek grant for major Broadway project

#### **By Judith Goldsworth**

Plans are underway for a grant application to the Ohio Public Works Commission for a significant improvement project for Broadway Avenue in Bedford, City Manager Mike Mallis announced at the city council meeting last week.

Mallis was addressing plans by Dominion to replace gas lines in the city, including in the Broadway area, earmarked for 2019, and stated the importance of staying on schedule with those plans. "The reason why it's important that Broadway does not get pushed back is we're actually working on a large scale grant application for street resurfacing, all new water lines, electrical repairs, all downtown Broadway as well as Union Street.

Mallis said that a portion of grant funding was still available through the Bedford Community Development Corporation that could be used by small businesses in the Broadway corridor for physical improvements.

He said that any local business looking to do signage, painting, windows, doors and more should get in touch

### **CPD** still investigating teen homicides; seeks information from public

Cleveland police are still searching for suspects in the shooting death of Andrew Hart and the hit-andrun death of David Bourne, Jr.

Hart, 18, was shot in the head in the East 65th Street and Kenyon Avenue area in Slavic Village on New Year's Eve, according to information provided by Cleveland police. He was taken to Metro Health Medical Center where he was pronounced dead.

"Andrew was a very special person to the community that he lived in," said a friend of Hart's. "He tried to help everyone around him. He was a very happy and cheerful person to be around."

Bourne, 15, was struck by a car and killed while walking in the 6800 block of Union Avenue on June 13th and was taken MetroHealth Medical Center where he died from his injuries. Police are still searching for the driver.

Anyone with information about these homicides is asked to contact investigators at 216-623-5464. Reward money could be available.

Mayor Stan Koci swore in two new police officers at the meeting, Jordan Fisher and Matthew Ganska. Both will serve the city in the rank of patrolman.

#### Legislation on agenda

Council passed several pieces of legislation at last week's meeting, including an ordinance to appropriate \$45,000 in funds to the Bedford Community Development Corporation to fund the Broadway Corridor Storefront Pilot Program. The city will be reimbursed the funds from the county later this year.

Also passed were ordinances accepting a proposal with 64 Seconds for a GIS (Geographic Information System) and Asset Management program for the city's water and sewer distribution systems for three years, at a cost of \$11,668.82; a contract with ProudCity for development

Placed on second reading was legislation to amend the city's parking ordinance. If not paid within 72 hours, the fine will be increased to \$50. Additional fines of up to \$150 and costs will be imposed if court action is necessary, according to the legislation, which also states that the fine for handicapped parking violations is \$250.




