Rolland Scales, Jr., 24, of Lorain, was arrested Monday after allegedly robbing a Chase Bank in Independence, according to FBI Special Agent Vicki Anderson.

On September 10th, around 11 a.m., Anderson said a man entered the Chase Bank at 6200 Brecksville Rd. in Independence, armed with a snub nosed black revolver and demanded \$250,000 from the teller. After throwing a black duffel bag to the teller, he demanded she fill it with money. The teller complied and the man fled out of the bank with the bag and ran southbound into the treeline.

A canvass of the neighborhood led to information about a person matching the description of the robber running along Lafayette Blvd. At about 1:30 p.m., a Broadview Heights K9 unit alerted on an area near 6600 Lafayette Blvd. The subject, later identified as Scales, emerged from the landscaping, complied with demands and was arrested, according to Anderson. A gun, believed to be stolen, and currency were recovered from the scene, she said.

Slain teenagers remembered at Monday's G.H. Council meeting

Arrested in Indy Chase Bank robbery Court sets bond at \$2 million for accused killer of Garfield Hts. brother, sister on E. 86th

Bond has been set at \$2 million for Matthew Nicholson, 29, of Garfield Heights, accused of killing Garfield Heights brother and sister, Giselle and Manuel Lopez, Jr., according to Garfield Heights Police Chief Robert Byrne. He is being charged with two counts of aggravated murder and three counts of domestic violence



Last Wednesday, Sept. 5, around 9:30 p.m., Nicholson is alleged to have shot and killed the teens, ages 19 and 17, after getting into a domestic dispute with his girlfriend, the teens' mother. The teens

were found in the driveway with gunshot wounds. Manuel was taken to Marymount Hospital where he was pronounced dead, and Giselle was taken to MetroHealth Medical Center where she underwent surgery but died from her injuries.

SWAT was called when Nicholson refused to come out of the house and after about four hours he peacefully surrendered, according to police. Nicholson's bond was originally set at \$500,000

Manuel Lopez, Jr. but was raised by the court to \$2 million, according to Byrne.

Byrne said everyone lived in the home together and believes the incident began as a domestic dispute between Nicholson and the victims' mother, America Polanco. Byrne said Polanco was also taken to Marymount Hospital to be treated for minor injuries sustained during the domestic dispute.

Nicholson worked for a security company contracted through Homeland Security, Byrne said, and that he has no criminal record. The chief also noted that his department had previous noise and neighbor complaints at the address but no record of prior domestic visits at the home.

Giselle was a graduate of Garfield Heights High School and was planning to be a nurse, according to The Plain Dealer. She was taking classes at Cuyahoga Community College and working at a Wal-Mart in Parma, according to the publication. Manuel was at senior at GHHS this year and planned to be an electrician, according

'Although the incident took place away from school grounds, it has powerfully impacted our school family to its core," said GHHS Principal Tammy Hager in a Facebook post.

Garfield Heights City Schools superintendent Terry Olszewski said, "On behalf of the Board of Education and entire Garfield Heights City Schools, we express our collective condolences and our deepest sympathies to the family of those who were abruptly taken from us all."

Giselle and Manuel are survived by their mother and father, Manuel Lopez, Sr., and an older brother, Roberto. Services were held last weekend at Slone & Co. Funeral Directors in Cleveland. They are interred at Riverside Cemetery.

Tracy Smith fired as Maple Heights finance director

Smith, 50, of Canfield, Ohio, who was hired as Maple Heights finance director in April 2017, was fired on Friday, Aug. 3, 2018, four months after she was arrested • Declaring the opioid on charges of insurance fraud, tampering with evidence

and false alarm, and about six weeks after she was indicted on the charges in June 2018, Blackwell stated.

Initially, Smith was placed on administrative leave the felony criminal charges pending against her, Blackwell stated.

2018-CR 00636, show that Smith was indicted on one charge each of tampering with evidence (third degree felony), and insurance fraud (fourth degree felony). Smith was also indicted on one count of false alarm, a first degree misdemeanor, according to the court

Blackwell confirmed that she and other city officials were first made aware of the felony charges against Smith on July 19 by Detective Joshua Wells of the Canfield Police Department.

Smith resided in Canfield, a community about 10 miles southwest of Youngstown, for the duration of her employment with Maple Heights.

At the time Smith was hired in 2017, the charges of insurance fraud and tampering with evidence were not pending against her and did not appear on her background check, Blackwell stated.

The grand jury indicted Smith on the felony charges on Thursday, June 21, 2018, and Smith retained an attorney and pled not guilty to the charges, Blackwell

Smith's attorney is listed in Mahoning County Court records as James E. Lanzo of Youngstown. A request to Lanzo offering either himself or Smith the chance to respond and/or comment on the indictment and her firing was not answered.

Following Smith's administrative leave, Blackwell and other city officials gathered information on the charges against her from the Canfield Police Department and reviewed the police reports and court records. During the course of Maple Heights' investigation, Blackwell said, it was discovered that in February 2017, two months prior to her being hired by the city, Smith

reported to Canfield police that her residence had been burglarized.

"After a lengthy investigation by Canfield police into the alleged burglary, detectives found several inconsistencies which led them to suspect that Smith had not and Cleveland, and the portion between McCracken been truthful in February 2017 when she reported the burglary," Blackwell stated.

"The incident reports show that on April 16, 2018, after being confronted by the Canfield detectives, Smith provided a written statement to Canfield police detectives confessing that she had lied about her Canfield residence being burglarized on February 2, 2017, and was arrested," Blackwell said. "Smith had submitted a city. fraudulent claim to her insurance carrier for damage to her home and for property stolen from her home," Blackwell explained.

The mayor went on to say that "at no time" before Blackwell herself was contacted by Canfield police on July 19, did Smith disclose to Blackwell, to Law Director Frank Consolo or to the city's law department, that in April 2018, she had been arrested and was facing felony

Blackwell said that on July 19, Consolo advised Smith to have her attorney contact him "as soon as possible, to discuss this matter further.

The mayor emphasized that Smith's attorney has never contacted the law department or herself to explain Smith's indictment, her confession or arrest. Whether or not Lanzo was representing Smith at this point in the investigation could not be confirmed. Accordingly, Blackwell terminated Smith's employment on August 3.

Blackwell said that she has been assured by representatives of Ohio State Auditor Dave Yost's office, who have been overseeing Maple Heights' Finance Department since February 2015, when the city was placed on Fiscal Emergency status, "that they are unaware of any fraudulent or improper conduct engaged in by Smith."

Carl Macey, CPA was recently named the city's assistant finance director by Blackwell, and has now been confirmed as the city's interim finance director.

Smith's case has been assigned to Mahoning County Common Pleas Judge Lou A. D'Apolito, according to court records. The case is continued to a pretrial on Tuesday, Oct. 2, the docket states.

Because two businesses located in Garfield Heights have been awarded medical marijuana operations by the state of Ohio, one a dispensary and one a processing facility, the city adopted Chapter 771 "to establish reasonable and uniform regulations to ensure all medical marijuana operations within the city are performed in a manner that promotes the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Garfield Heights," the legislation

- Declaring the month of September to be Prostate Cancer Awareness Month throughout the city.
- •Purchasing three Ford police utility vehicles from Lebanon Ford in the 2019 fiscal year.

The city has been advised that beginning in 2020, Ford Motor Company will no longer produce the current vehicles being sold as police sedans and police utility vehicles. The police sedans will no longer be manufactured and the utility vehicles will be manufactured solely as hybrid utility vehicles.

Lebanon Ford and other dealers are currently accepting letters of intent to purchase 2019 police vehicles to guarantee local municipalities the option to purchase new vehicles before the Ford factories begin producing the 2020 vehicles in early 2019.

In the event the city does decide to purchase the vehicles in 2019, an ordinance will be brought before council for approval.

The next regular council meeting is scheduled for Monday, Sept. 24.

Bedford to apply for \$1 million grant for Broadway project

At its meeting last week, Bedford Council approved a resolution to apply for a \$1 million grant from Cuyahoga County, with the goal of dramatically improving streets, curbs, utilities and other components of the Broadway Avenue corridor in the city.

The city is applying for Issue 2 funds hoping that if the county okays the application it will go towards a nearly \$2 million road resurfacing, waterline replacement, curbing and electrical upgrade project proposed for next year, City Manager Mike Mallis stated.

"The early numbers are that this project is going to be around \$1.9 million, with the city looking to contribute no more than a million dollars in matching funds for the grant," Mallis said.

He explained, "What we're looking to do is replace a water line which will start at Powers all the way down Broadway, continue down Union, up to Northfield Road. That water line was put in some areas in the 1920s, the others from the 1930s. It desperately needs to get repaired."

"resurfacing all of Broadway, and we're looking to partner with Cuyahoga County, which would resurface Union in 2019 as well," he said.

Mallis said that Dominion had a plan to replace the gas line in the area, which would also take place in 2019, and the final improvement included in the grant would be curb restoration and replacement in the Historic Dis-

Parking fines ordinance changed

Council passed an ordinance to amend the city's existing parking ordinances, which means that tickets issued for parking in prohibited areas and on lawns may be waived within 72 hours by paying a \$25 fine. If the fine is not paid within 72 hours, the fine will be increased to

Additional fines of up to \$150 and costs "will be imposed if court action is necessary," according to the

"Typically, we used to give 10 days to pay the fine for individuals who got a parking ticket," Mallis said. "This

violations recorded in the city. "I think this is a way to put a little bit more teeth in it, as far as requiring them to pay in a more timely manner, and if they don't, it'll significantly increase," Mallis explained.

Water, sewer rates

Placed on first reading were two ordinances that would slightly increase water and sewer rates in the city, beginning in 2019. If passed at a future meeting, the minimum monthly water charge would increase from \$28.44 to \$28.47. The minimum monthly sewer charge would increase from \$22.44 to \$24.46.

An ordinance to amend previous legislation, entitled "rate reduction for senior citizens and the permanently disabled," establishing the minimum monthly sewer rate at \$17.12, effective January 1, 2019, was also placed on first reading.

Another ordinance to provide a 30 percent discount in water and sewer base rates to the city's senior citizens and the permanently disabled with a maximum com-Additionally, if the grant is approved, it would include bined household income of less than \$33,224 as of 2017, was passed. This legislation needed to be passed to accommodate the homeowner application process for 2019, which had to be completed by the end of this month, Finance Director Frank Gambosi stated.



Maple Hts. to hire 3 more firefighters/paramedics thanks to SAFER grant

By Judith Goldsworth

Maple Heights has been awarded a grant of nearly \$1 million over three years from the Staffing For Adequate Fire And Emergency Response (SAFER) organization, which will allow the city to hire three additional firefighter/paramedics, according to legislation passed by council at its meeting last week.

Mayor Annette Blackwell and Fire Chief Vito Kavaliunas will accept the fiscalyear 2017 SAFER grant in the amount of \$969.165 over 36 months. As a condition of receiving the award, the city will contribute \$371,511 over that same time period, the resolution states.

The grant will be used to hire three fire department members for the period from February 2, 2019, through February 1, 2022.

Council approved another piece of legislation towards funding the fire department at last week's meeting, authorizing Blackwell and Kavaliunas to accept a 2017 Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) in the amount of \$160,165 from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to be used for operations and safety equipment. Of this grant, \$145,605 will come from federal funds, and 10 percent of that, or \$14,560, will come from Maple Heights.

Council also passed three resolutions approving contracts for construction projects throughout the city, including \$30,704 to Pro Construction for improvements at the Lee-Libby "pocket park;" \$398,744.66 to Fabrizi Trucking for waterline replacement on Brunswick Avenue; and \$314,157 to Terrace Construction for sanitary sewer replacement on and Milan and Hardin drives.

Regarding the "pocket park," the resolution noted that the city had been awarded a Cuyahoga County Competitive Municipal Supplemental Grant in the amount of \$50,000 through the county's department of development, which must be used by December 31, 2018, towards repairs to the curb, sidewalk and structures at the northeast corner of the Lee-Libby intersection.


