Garfield Council goes to dogs Monday night as residents, officials make their cases on new canine legislation

It was all about the dogs at Garfield Heights Council's regular meeting Monday night as the city seeks to rescind its ban of pit bulls in the city and establish new laws governing dangerous dogs of all breeds.

Council held second reading for an amended ordinance which would end the pit bull ban in the city and require every dog owner in Garfield Heights to have at least \$50,000 worth of liability insurance on their dogs.

Those dogs ruled nuisance animals, dangerous or vicious must have not less than \$100,000 worth of liability insurance on them, according to the proposed legislation.

Council voted 6-1 to send it to a third reading with Ward 2 Councilman Joe LaMalfa the lone dissenter.

Mayor Vic Collova explained to several residents who expressed concerns about the legislation at the meeting that state legislators have made it law that municipalities cannot breed specific when banning certain canines. He said the city of Reynoldsburg, Ohio, defied that law and the Ohio Court of Appeals ruled for the state upholding non-breed specific bans.

Collova said the new law would conform to state regulations and is actually a better law than the one it seeks to replace in Garfield Heights.

Ward 4 Councilman Eugene Glenn injected the idea of having residents vote on the dog issue. Law Director Tim Riley said, "It doesn't matter if it goes on the ballot or the city does it,

the constitutionality issue stands alone," meaning the city would be liable either way.

The amended dangerous animal ordinance will be up for third and final reading at the next council meeting, set for Monday, Jan. 28. If approved it will become effective 30 days after passage.

Maple Heights police investigating teen's murder on Reddington

Maple Heights police are investigating the death of 17-year-old Javon Anderson-Crump, who was shot and killed at a home on Reddington Avenue last week, according to a press release from the Maple Heights Police Department.

Last Tuesday, Jan. 8, officers were dispatched to the 14500 block of Reddington Avenue around 5:40 p.m. after receiving a call from a woman who said a male had been shot. Police found the teen in the residence with multiple gunshot wounds, according to the release. Police said they learned he had been at the house visiting relatives.

Police and EMS personnel began lifesaving measures and took Anderson-Crump to MetroHealth Medical Center. Despite the initial stabilizing treatment, the teen's internal injuries were more severe than they appeared and he succumbed to his injuries at the hospital, according to the release.

Police said investigation revealed the victim merely answered a knock at the door. Upon answering the front door, and without any known provocation, he was shot by unknown assailants, according to police. Initial investigation revealed there were multiple suspects involved. Maple Heights detectives are conducting the investigation.

"This juvenile victim was innocently gunned down in a family residence. The city administration, police department and family of the victim are requesting anyone with information about this senseless crime to share their tip," said police in the release.

Mayor Blackwell vetoes law director legislation passed by Maple Hts. Council

Stating her disapproval of the legislation on the grounds that the terms imposed by council "illegally usurp the appointing powers of the mayor," Maple Heights Mayor Annette Blackwell has vetoed a resolution passed by council to reappoint current Law Director Frank Consolo for a specific period of service.

Council has placed the piece back on the agenda for tonight's meeting, to be held at 7 p.m. at the Maple Heights Senior Center, 15901 Libby Road., seeking to override the mayor's veto.

The resolution, passed at the January 2 meeting, stated that Consolo, who has served as the city's law director since his appointment by Blackwell in September 2016, would have continued in his post through December 31, 2019.

Consolo's reappointment and contract renewal thereafter would have been for terms of two years, according to the legislation, which also states that Consolo entered into his current contract with the city "providing that the term was 'at the pleasure of the mayor.'"

The resolution states, "Council now desires to confirm that the mayor's appointment of Law Director Consolo, and his current contract shall continue and remain in effect through December 31, 2019, and thereafter Law Director Consolo shall be reappointed, subject to approval by council as required by the charter, for terms of two years."

Two other emergency ordinances were also okayed, one authorizing a contract with the Cuyahoga Soil and Water Conservation District to participate in the Storm Water Pollution Prevention Program, and the other authorizing a contract with the Cuyahoga Soil and

Water Conservation District and Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District for public involvement and public education regarding soil and water conservation.

Directors' reports

Service Director Tim McLaughlin said that leaf collections are over in the city and residents should bag their leaves and put them out with their regular trash.

Mayor Collova said those with property tax concerns are invited to a special meeting on Wednesday, Jan. 23, from 5:30-7:30 p.m. at the Civic Center.

Social Services Director Kathy Rush-Parssons said free produce will be given out to Garfield Heights seniors aged 55 and older on the third Tuesday of the month from 1-2 p.m. Registration is required by calling the Senior Center.

Cuyahoga Hts. Council notes

The Village of Cuyahoga Heights Council met last Wednesday, Jan. 9, and voted unanimously to approve the nomination of Cheryl Harris as council

president for another year.

Legislation passed included:

- Creating the 2019 village scholarship for

graduating high school seniors living in the village.

- Authorizing the mayor to execute a Memorandum of Understanding with the Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District and the Cuyahoga Soil and Water Conservation District for the "Public Involvement and Public Education Program."

- Purchasing of three 2019 Ford Utility Interceptor vehicles from Statewide Ford Lincoln for the village police department.

- Authorizing the issuance of notes not to exceed \$2,800,000 in anticipation of the issuance of bonds for constructing and reconstructing road improvements to Canal Road.

- Authorizing the issuance

of notes not to exceed \$3,400,000 in anticipation of the issuance of bonds to construct and install sewer lines for the Nicky Boulevard Storm Sewer Extension and Slope Stabilization Improvements Project.

Also approved was a motion to allow Geo Sci to perform slope stability analysis to investigate the water main break on East 71st Street.

In December 2018 the Finance Committee approved purchases in the amount of \$5,250 to Industrial Appraisal Co. for an appraisal for the village for insurance valuation purposes, and to Planet Technologies for the annual Email Exchange Server Contract in the amount of \$6,949.92.

Independence Council news

Independence Council met last Tuesday, Jan. 8. The following council action was taken:

- An ordinance on first reading authorizing the purchase of labor, materials and office furniture for improvements to the Building Department offices was passed unanimously after a motion carried to suspend the rules.

- An ordinance was also passed to authorize payment to the Division of Water for the annual fee for use of water from city fire hydrants based on the total number of hydrants.

- An ordinance accepting the base bid of Fabrizi Trucking & Paving Co. for the Rockside Woods Boulevard North Road Extension Improvements (Part A) and the Brecksville Road Improvements (Part B) Construction Contract was placed on first reading with no objections.

- Change order to the city's General Construction Engineering and Inspection Services Contract with QCI-CE, Inc. was okayed.

- Change order to the contract with CT Consultants for construction inspection services for the development of the Chestnut Woods Subdivision, Section 3 - Phase 5 was also passed.

- Placed on first reading was an ordinance approving a preliminary plan for Quarry Lee Estates.

In his report to council Police Chief Michael Kilbane said that during the calendar year 2018 the Independence Police Department responded to 16,426 calls for service. Officers made 521 misdemeanor arrests and 60 felony arrests, as well as arresting 39 drivers under the influence of alcohol or drugs. A total of 3,261 traffic citations were issued and police responded to 457 motor vehicle accidents.

The average response time for emergency calls was just under two minutes, which is one of the best emergency response time averages in Ohio, Kilbane said.

"Every major violent crime that occurred in Independence resulted in a suspect being identified and charged during 2018, largely in part due to the outstanding investigative work of our detective bureau led by Lieutenant Charles Wilson," the chief went on.

He said that the only bank robbery in Independence last year resulted in the suspect being apprehended shortly after the robbery, along with recovery of all the cash stolen and the gun used in the robbery.

Community police reports

CLEVELAND

Felonious Assault

He then felt a sharp pain in his lower right leg and realized he had been shot. The man did not know who shot him and believes he was not the intended target. Police gave the man first aid and he was later taken to MetroHealth Medical Center for treatment.

A resident in the 3600 block of Independence Rd. said he heard 2-3 gun shots, then a loud "boom," and when he went outside to see what happened, he noticed his fence had been heavily damaged. While standing in his backyard, he said he heard several more gunshots that sounded close by, so he went back inside, then saw a small silver or gold sedan flee the area heading east-bound on Independence Rd. Fourth District detectives were called to follow up with the investigation.

Robbery

On January 10th, around 7 p.m., police were dispatched to Giant Eagle in City View where they spoke to a man who said he was assaulted after witnessing people steal items from the store. The victim said he watched a man and woman push a cart full of loose groceries out of the store without paying and followed them. He watched them put the items into a newer model blue

sedan and believed they stole the items, so he began taking pictures of them and the vehicle on his cell phone. He then saw a third male exit the store and join the man and woman at the blue vehicle.

The victim said the three people then noticed he was taking photos of them and confronted him. A fight broke out and the man dropped his cell phone as he was defending himself from punches thrown by one of the males. He said he saw the woman grab his cell phone and run towards the blue vehicle, so he chased after her in an attempt to get it back. He said the woman then threw his phone across the parking lot, but he was stopped by one of the males when he tried to retrieve it. The other male suspect then grabbed the phone and all three individuals got into the blue vehicle and fled the area.

During the assault, one of the males' hats fell off and was collected by police as evidence. The victim sustained bruises and scratches to his left eye, cheek and bottom lip. Police were able to obtain video footage of the incident.

Mayor Blackwell vetoes

In correspondence to Council Clerk Leonette Cicirella last week announcing her veto, Blackwell stated, "Pursuant to my authority under the charter, I disapprove of [the resolution] and hereby veto it pursuant to the following written objections: The resolution would violate the current contract entered into between Law Director Consolo and the city effective September 1, 2016, which contract was unanimously approved and authorized by council per Resolution 2016-80, passed September 7, 2016. The current contract states that Law Director Consolo serves at the pleasure of the mayor."

In her second objection to the legislation, Blackwell stated that it "illegally usurps the appointing powers of the mayor as set forth in the charter to appoint the directors of Law, Finance and Service."

Blackwell's third objection to the resolution was that it "treats Law Director Consolo differently than other directors appointed by the mayor per the charter, by adding a term of service, instead of serving at the pleasure of the mayor like the finance and service directors. Accordingly, I hereby disapprove, and veto [the resolution], effective January 8, 2019. Please give notice of my disapproval and objections to council as required by the charter."

"It is the belief of several council members that the law director works more for them than the mayor, and that he is greatly influenced by me when interpreting legislation and acting as the city's lawyer," Blackwell stated. "I strongly object to limiting this law director's term and council not honoring what they had originally approved and respected, my power to appoint three appointees (Finance, Law and Service), to all serve at the will of the mayor."

"Finally, this is a targeted action, as they have not acted to term-limit the finance or service director, only the law director," Blackwell stated.

Council responds

Councilman Stafford L. Shenett, Sr. confirmed that the resolution that was passed by council at the January 2 meeting will appear on tonight's agenda "in its original form," adding that the resolution was introduced by himself and Councilwoman Edwina Agee.

"Contrary to the mayor's claim, the resolution does not 'illegally usurp the appointing powers of the mayor,'" Shenett said. "The charter clearly allows for the mayor to appoint directors with the approval of council."

"As far as serving at the 'pleasure/will' of the mayor," Shenett continued, "this language speaks on the mayor's executive power to remove the directors with or without cause. Again, contrary to the mayor's claim, the charter does not restrict council from approving or not approving contracts based on language acceptable by the executive branch only."

In addition to council's response, Shenett stated that directors' contracts are not required in the city charter to be similar, explaining, "As with any other job and/or position, duties of a specific person are defined by the needs of the organization... The law director works for both the mayor and council, and his/her service is essential to both the executive and legislative branch."

Shenett said that the resolution on the table "requires that Consolo and his law firm have a two-year renewal period. Prior law directors and their law firms who contracted with the city of Maple Heights served under the same requirement."

Two police officers promoted, resident honored in Bedford

Two Bedford police officers were promoted and a resident honored as the 2018 Bedford Citizen of the Year at the city's first council meeting of the year last week.

Sgt. Paul Kellermann was sworn in to his new position as lieutenant, and Officer Ryan Futo was sworn in as a sergeant by Councilwoman Paula Mizesak, who was serving as mayor in place of Mayor Stan Koci, absent from last week's meeting due to illness.

Police Chief Marty Stemple welcomed both officers and said that with the city's support he was able to restructure his department slightly and create a lieutenant's position, alleviating some of the administrative duties of the sergeants.

"This gets the sergeants back on the road where they belong and gets me closer to my goal of having more officers on the street and back into our neighborhoods," Chief Stemple said.

McDaniel honored

Mizesak presented a Certificate of Recognition to longtime resident Barbara McDaniel at last week's meeting, who was chosen by the Bedford Community Council as the 2018 Citizen of the Year in Bedford.

She was recognized for giving "endless hours volunteering at the Bedford Historical Society Strawberry Festival for 25-plus years, named the 2015 Historical Society's Volunteer of the Year, and is a Bedford Garden Club member... Barb is truly an involved citizen who regularly attends city council meetings, cares about her community and the people who live in it," according to the certificate read by Mizesak at the meeting.

Montello appointed

There was no legislation on the agenda at last week's meeting, but there were other items addressed, including council's approval of a motion to appoint Law Director John Montello as the city's designee for the Ohio Auditor of State's Office Public Records Training.

She noted that on the first Fridays of the month, beginning on March 1st, there will be events held in the downtown area, with March's event featuring artwork by the Bedford School District students.
