Chagrin Valley IT service agreement passed by Maple Heights Council

At its meeting last week, Maple Heights Council passed a resolution authorizing Mayor Annette Blackwell to enter into an agreement with the Chagrin Valley Dispatch Council (CVD), which provides safety forces dispatching services to Maple Heights, to provide managed Information Technologies (IT) services to the city at a cost of \$3,000 monthly. The city pays a \$3,453 monthly service charge to its current IT provider.

Blackwell and other city officials said "that it is critical for the city to change its current IT service provider because of concerns with responsiveness, work quality and experience in handling the IT requirements and needs of a large municipality, especially the IT requirements and needs of the police and fire departments...Chagrin Valley Dispatch Council is experienced, qualified and knowledgeable with the IT requirements and needs of large municipalities."

I-77 between I-480 and I-490 closed this weekend

I-77 north and southbound will close between I-480 and I-490 beginning this Friday, March 29, at 8 p.m. and Monday, April 1, at 5 a.m., according to the Ohio Department of Transportation.

The closing will accommodate the demolition of the Harvard Avenue bridge over I-77 in Newburgh Heights. Motorists will be directed to St. Rt. 176 (Jennings Freeway) as an alternate route.

There will be limited local access within the I-77 closure. Motorists entering I-77 northbound from entrances north of I-480 will exit at Grant Avenue. Motorists entering I-77 southbound from entrances south of I-490 will exit at Fleet Avenue.

- •I-480 east and westbound ramps to I-77 north
- I-490 east and westbound ramps to I-77 south

Indy Council thanks finance director for service, increases informal bid minimum

Following Independence Finance Director John Veres' announcement that he will not seek reelection this fall because he has accepted a position as the finance director of the City of Macedonia, several Independence City Council members and officials thanked him for his 19 years of service at the March 12 Independence City Council meeting.

Veres tearfully began to read a statement regarding his decision but was overcome with emotion and unable to continue. His daughter, Jillian, volunteered to read it for him.

"An alternative opportunity presented itself sooner than expected, and I have accepted the finance director's position for the city of Macedonia starting in March," she read. "This position allows me to continue to use my municipal finance experience in an appointed position, and I look forward to working with a new community." Veres said he will resign once an interim director has been found.

Many council members and city officials expressed their appreciation for Veres both personally and professionally during their respective reports. Mayor Anthony Togliatti called for the room to show their gratitude with a round of applause.

"John cannot be leaving the city in a better financial position, and his commitment to the city of Independence and his knowledge of municipal finance is second to none," Togliatti said. "I sincerely thank you, John, for all the years of hard work that you have dedicated to the city of Independence and wish you the best of luck in all of your future endeavors."

Also at the meeting, council approved an ordinance amending Ordinance 2018-140, which raised the minimum amount required for an informal bid from \$2,500 to \$5,000. Councilman Carl Asseff sponsored the ordinance. In 2018, council passed an ordinance lowering the minimum from \$7,500 to \$2,500. This meant any expense between \$2,500 and \$15,000 needed three written informal bids as voters passed an issue raising the spending limit of the mayor from \$7,500 to \$15,000 before council would need to approve it.

"In the old system, our city directors had no problem buying things because they didn't need to have the vendors write informal bids," Asseff said. "However, vendors don't want to do informal bids for these small amounts of money."

With the \$2,500 minimum, Asseff said it took directors about three hours to get a product secured by an informal bid. This is equivalent to \$172, he said, and takes into account the three hours they spend chasing down a bid plus the three hours taken away from their directors' duties.

"This is wasted time," Asseff said. "The directors were complaining that it was taking too much of their time to do this. And we already have a safety; the purchasing agent still needs to approve the purchase."

Asseff conducted an analysis showing there were about 26 encounters between \$2,500 and \$5,000 and the same amount between \$5,000 and \$7,500. So at the finance committee meeting on Feb. 26, members agreed to raise the ceiling from \$2,500 to \$5,000. However, this only fixes half of the problem, Asseff said, as there are

still 26 encounters taking place between \$5,000 and \$7,500. He said city council voted on the original ordinance without doing any research on the affect it would have and would like to see the city raise the ceiling back to \$7,500 by the end of the year.

Councilman Trakas, however, who sponsored the 2018 ordinance, said the ordinance has already saved thousands of dollars by bidding out instead of buying products without bids.

"The city was strictly interpreting the ordinance, and some proprietary, single-source and emergency repair products were hard to find using three informal quotes,' he said. "Department heads had concerns, and council addressed them. The initial \$2,500 to \$14,999 range of informal bids appeared to be too low of a threshold, so council agreed to up the dollar amount of products not

Trakas said council may need to tweak the ordinance again but that "taxpayers have already benefited by having a more robust competitive bidding process. Council in February approved two new contractual arrangements for parts that saved the city in the range of \$5,000 annually by the informal bidding process, so we are pleased to see competitive bidding both informally and formally working for the good of the community.'



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

Garfield Heights City Council met Monday night and passed legislation to apply for the FM Global Fire Prevention Grant.

FM Global has developed a Fire Prevention Grant Program to provide fire departments with funding to support a wide array of fire prevention, preparedness and control efforts, including pre-incident planning, fire prevention education/training and arson prevention/fire investigation.

Garfield Hts. Council news According to the legislation, the Garneld Heights Fire Department intends to use the grant funding to purchase pre-incident planning software and hardware. The grant does not require a financial match from the city.

> The only other piece of legislation acted on Monday was the passage of an emergency ordinance to enter into a purchasing agreement with the Ohio Department of Transportation to buy rock salt for the 2019-2020

Mayor Vic Collova gave an update on the rubbish ticketing program in the city for those who violate laws regarding the time frame for putting out and taking in for more information.

He said the number of violators has "decreased somewhat," but the city is still issuing about 130 warnings a week, with 329 households receiving tickets. Collova said the fine is \$180 per offense, with court costs added in those cases where fines are not paid by the deadline.

City Engineer David Krock said repaving of Canal Road is scheduled for this summer in Garfield Heights, Cuyahoga Heights and Valley View.



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

Also placed on second reading at Koci's request was a resolution for the city to enter into a contract with Oak After two readings at previous meetings, council passed Group, Inc., to provide additional master plans examiner and building official services for Bedford's building department.

> Placed on first reading were the following ordinances: to levy assessments for delinquent water bills on properties owned in the city (about \$28,000 owed for 58 parcels); to amend existing legislation entitled "Use of Public Ways for Small Cell Wireless Facilities and Wireless Support Structures" of the city; and to amend an existing ordinance authorizing the city to enter into an agreement with the village of Orange so it can use the Bedford Jail facilities.


