Garfield Council moves sewer catches fire rate hike on to second reading

At its regular meeting Monday night, Garfield Heights Council had first reading on an ordinance that would increase the sanitary sewer rate from \$1.70 to \$2.20 per lineal front foot within the city beginning January 1, 2020.

The legislation notes that there is a sizable deficit in the Garfield Heights sanitary sewer account and the sewer rate increase seeks to eliminate that deficit. It also notes that once the deficit is eliminated the rate increase will be used for capital improvement purposes unless an expenditure is approved by the city.

Mayor Vic Collova said if School graduating class, the city does not raise the most of whom were present Mayor Vic Collova said if rate Cuyahoga County officials will, and it would go from a 50-cent increase to a \$1 increase under the county plan.

Collova said the city was running a \$1 million deficit in its sewer fund and there was "no choice whatsoever" but to pass the rate hike

Councilman Eugene Glenn made a motion to submit the sewer rate hike to the voters, but there was no "second" to the motion so it "died on the floor," as stated by Council President Matt Burke.

A first reading was also held on an ordinance for the issuance and sale of notes, not to exceed \$2,100,000, to pay costs of improving streets and roads in the city.

Both ordinances will be put out for a second reading at a subsequent meeting.

Employee shot during armed robbery at Little **Caesar's on Harvard**

Last Friday, April 20, at about 9:50 p.m., officers responded to a report of an armed robbery at the Little Caesar's at 7310 Harvard Ave. in Cleveland, according to the police report.

When police arrived, they observed a trail of blood near the front door and sidewalk, several shell casings, bullet fragments and a black garbage bag. Employees reported that three men came into the store wearing face masks and pointing handguns at them.

Officers viewed video footage of the incident showing that one of the men grabbed a male employee and pulled him to the registers, according to the report. The suspect used his hand and fingers to form the shape of a gun and pointed it into the employee's back.

The employee pulled a gun from his waistband and began to shoot at the suspects, according to the police report. The suspects ran to the back of the store, using the female employees as human shields and returned gunfire. The male employee was shot in the left arm. He then exited through the front of the store, and the suspects exited through the rear. One of the suspects was seen limping with a possible gunshot wound to his left leg.



The male employee drove himself to MetroHealth Hospital. Officers learned another man had arrived at St. Vincent Charity Medical Center with gunshot wounds to his legs. He was later transferred to MetroHealth.

Officers spoke to the male employee at the hospital. He said the suspect whispered to him that he had better open the register. He said he was afraid for his sight.



The employee said he saw the suspects run from the store and heard one of them say, "He shot me!" They ran north on East 74th Street and disappeared from his line of

Police made contact with the 14200 block of the man who had gunshot wounds to his legs, according to the report. He said he was shot during a dice game in the area of East 79th and Woodland Avenue outside of an apartment complex but was vague about the details.

The male employee's firearm was found in his car, which was parked in front of MetroHealth Hospital, and taken for evidence. It had four spent shell castook the clothing worn by the man with gunshot wounds to his legs for evidence. They also have video footage of him being dropped off at St. Vincent's.

Hearing set for Brundage

A hearing is scheduled on May 28 at 10 a.m. for Scott Brundage, a Garfield Heights man seeking to withdraw his guilty plea in a sexual assault case involving seven young girls.

Brundage previously pleaded guilty on April 2 to one count of rape, a felony of the first degree; three counts of gross sexual imposition, felonies of the third degree; and two counts of gross sexual imposition, felonies of the fourth degree, according to Summit County Prosecutor Sherri Bevan Walsh.

However, during sentencing on April 9, Summit County Judge Mary Margaret Rowlands said Brundage sent her a letter saying he was coerced by his attorneys into pleading guilty, according to James Pollack, director of communications for the Summit County Prosecutor's Office.

The court granted his counsel's motion to withdraw, and Brundage now has new counsel.

Local police highlight importance of impaired, distracted driving prevention

Seventeen Driving Awareness Month and Alcohol Awareness people were cited for distracted driving violations from Month, so many communities are focusing on distracted and impaired driving prevention.

It is illegal in Ohio to drive with a blood alcohol concentration of .08 or above. A first-time Operating a Vehicle Under the Influence of Alcohol and/or Drugs (OVI) conviction results in license suspension, a mandatory minimum 72 hours in jail and a fine of about 2018 and 19 so far in 2019, Chief John Majoy said. \$250 to \$1,000. Penalties increase for subsequent convictions. It is illegal to drive with any amount of a controlled substance, such as marijuana, cocaine or heroin, present in the driver's blood.

A new distracted driving law went into effect in Ohio last October broadening "distracted" driving to include activities not necessary for driving, such as eating or adjusting the radio, and increasing fines to \$100 or completion of a distracted driving course. It's a secondary offense, meaning when police pull the driver over for something else, they can include an additional drinking. Those who drink should not drive for any citation for distracted driving.

In Bedford police have arrested 125 people for OVI from January 2018 to present, according to Chief Martin Stemple. There were 13 distracted driving citations in the same time period.

In 2018, Cuyahoga Heights arrested six people for OVI and cited seven people for distracted driving, according to Deborah Reiger, administrative assistant to the chief and police services for the Cuyahoga Heights Police Department. So far in 2019, the village arrested three people for OVI and cited three people for distracted driving.

Brian Sturgill, Cuyahoga Heights police chief, highlighted distracted driving in the March 2019 village newsletter, saying, "Distracted Driving Awareness Month in April is a united effort to recognize the dangers of and eliminate preventable deaths from distracted driving. We all should know by now that cell phones, dashboard touchscreens, voice commands and other in-vehicle technologies pose a threat to our safety. The consequences of those distractions are not worth the convenience they offer.'

The Garfield Heights Police Department made 114 OVI arrests in 2018 and 54 so far in 2019, Chief Robert Byrne said.

Byrne said that while everybody probably agrees that distracted driving is dangerous, most are probably guilty of checking a cell phone while driving.

The Independence Police Department has made 11 2018 until the present.

In Maple Heights, officers have arrested 31 people for OVI so far this year. Last year, the department arrested 118. The city does not have a way to track distracted driving statistics, Sgt. Chris Swope said

The Valley View Police Department made 29 OVI arrests in 2018, according to Chief David Niro. Officers have made seven OVI arrests so far this year.



Blackwell gives update on **Rockside** water main break

Maple Heights Mayor Annette Blackwell gave an update earlier this week on a large water main break on Rockside Road and Pennsylvania Avenue that occurred on Wednesday, April 10. The break resulted in a portion of Rockside Road being closed while repairs to the water main and the roadway are being done, necessitating detours in the city.

The water main break is very near the Maple Heights-Bedford border, and also near the busy intersection of Rockside Road and Broadway Avenue in Bedford. According to Blackwell the goal is to get the repairs done thoroughly but also as quickly as possible to have the roadway reopened to traffic.

"The rupture of the Cleveland Water Department 30inch main on Rockside Road occurred behind the abutment of the west approach to the Rockside Road bridge, over the Norfolk and Southern Railroad tracks," Blackwell said in a statement released Monday. "The bridge is maintained by the Cuyahoga County Department of Pubfor general construction lic Works and county bridge inspection teams spent last week assessing the area at the break to determine the extent of the damage to the bridge approach slab, abutment, backwall and superstructure," she added.

Blackwell said this assessment was completed on Thursday, April 18, and showed no damage to the actual bridge structure or to the backwall and abutment. The inspection did reveal that the water main break caused significant undermining to occur beneath all of the struction contract to C.A. lanes, eastbound and westbound, beneath the bridge Agresta Construction for the approach pavement areas.

Blackwell stated that concurrent with the bridge inspection, Cook Paving & Construction, under contract to the Cleveland Water Department, conducted its own testing to determine the actual extent of the undermining that occurred as a result of the water main break.

'Once the results of the testing report are reviewed, the Cuyahoga County Department of Public Works and the Cleveland Water Department will coordinate with Cook Paving and Construction to determine the best method to repair the pavement areas, with the goal of restoring one lane of traffic in each direction as soon as possible,' Blackwell stated. A target date for this is expected to be available sometime this week, she stated.


