M. H. continues focus on repairs at Stafford Park

Maple Heights Council and the administration continue to focus on ongoing improvements at Stafford Park, as a resolution authorizing Mayor Annette Blackwell and City Engineer Ed Hren to apply for a as council approved an ordinance authorizing the city Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) grant Land Reutilization Program to accept the titles of three for the park's parking lot was approved by council at its meeting last week.

Council's approval is the latest action in efforts to give the city-owned Mayville Avenue park a facelift. Legislation to accept a \$50,000 Cuyahoga County Department of Development Supplemental Grant towards "the repair, renovation and reopening" of Stafford Park pool and authorizing Hren to begin preparing plans and specifications and start seeking contractors was accepted by council last month.

The pool has been closed to swimmers for the past several years due to financial issues, and the funds will go towards rehabilitating the facility with the goal of reopening it to residents in the future. The work would not be completed in time for this year's pool season, however, city officials have stated.

Land transfer

A resolution passed by council last week authorizes Blackwell to transfer a residential property at 20012 Hansen Rd., off Warrensville Center Road just south of I-480, owned by the Maple Heights Land Reutilization

Program, to Slavic Village Development Corporation (SVDC), for the Maple Heights Home Ownership Pro-

Other property transactions were also on the agenda, parcels of land obtained through the Cuyahoga County and Reutilization Corporation (CCLRC).

The CCLRC has agreed to acquire the three tax delinquent parcels of vacant land on Williams Street, Raymond Street and Gardenview Drive.

The CCLRC will then transfer the parcels to the city's Land Bank for their redevelopment, according to the agreement between Maple Heights and the county. As listed in the county records, the properties will be tax exempt, according to the legislation.

A second similar ordinance passed at last week's meeting authorizes the city's Land Reutilization Program to accept the title to a parcel of land on the corner of Maple and Beech Avenues in the Granger-Libby area, also owned by the CCLRC.

Slavic Village shooting

Four people were injured in a shooting that occurred in the 9500 block of Cardwell Avenue, in the Broadway-Slavic Village neighborhood on the border of Garfield Heights on Thursday, May 16, at about 10:35 p.m. Officers arrived on scene to multiple victims lying in the street. They administered medical care until medics arrived, who transported two victims to MetroHealth Hospital

Police interviewed a third victim with a gunshot wound to the leg. He said he was walking home on Cardwell Avenue when he heard gunshots and was struck in his lower left leg.

Witnesses reported they saw a silver truck drive by with someone shooting out of the rear driver's side window.

Police went to the hospital and were unable to speak to one of the victims because she was being treated for a gunshot wound to her side/back. The other victim, who suffered gunshot wounds to his elbow and side torso, was unable to provide additional details.

While police were there, a juvenile arrived at the hospital with gunshot wounds to the inner thigh stating he was also shot on Cardwell Avenue. He heard gunshots and ran, then was taken to the hospital by his mother. The incident is under investigation.

-alty was placed on first reading and sent to the Housing/ Economic Development Committee, Council Clerk Leonette Cicirella stated.

The ordinance proposes a \$250 fee for notice of a foreclosed, forfeited or vacant property, and the notice would have to be filed annually on a form to the city.

Filing of the notice and payment of the \$250 fee "shall be done on or before March 31 each year," and any person failing to file the notice of vacant property within 10 days would be charged a late filing fee of \$750, the proposed ordinance states, adding that failure to file the notice would result in a violation and a fourth degree misdemeanor.

Garfield district presents 'State of the Schools'

Superintendent Terry Olszewski and Treasurer Allen Sluka presented the annual Garfield Heights State of the Schools presentation on Thursday, May 16, in the lobby of the Center for the Performing Arts.

Finances

Sluka spoke first on the district's finances, saying that 61% of the district's funding comes from the state, while the other 39% comes from local revenues.

Of the local revenues, 71.6% comes from residential property tax (Class I). Only 24.1% comes from commercial property tax (Class II) and 4.3% from public utility personal property tax. This means the district relies heavily on homeowner taxpayers, Sluka said.

With 61% of the district's total revenues coming in from the state, the upcoming biennial budget plays an important factor in the district's financial stability, he said. Currently the governor has proposed a budget, and the Ohio House has passed a budget bill (House Bill 166). The Ohio Senate will now pass its own bill and a committee comprised of both House and Senate members will reconcile the differences. The bill then goes back to the governor for his signature. It must be signed by June 30 to go into effect on July 1.

In terms of expenditures, the Garfield Heights City School District spends 63.4% on instruction, 13.6% percent on administrative costs, 12% on building operations and transportation, 8.1% on pupil support and extracurriculars and 2.9% on staff support, such as continuing education.

Sluka also pointed out that the district is fourth last in the county in terms of expenditures per pupil. This means the district is a good steward of taxpayer dollars, Sluka said, because it is living within its means and not overspending.

However, in his five-year forecast, Sluka predicts expenditures will increase as revenue remains flat.

This school year the district received higher-thanexpected revenues from CityView taxes and delinquent tax collections. This will not happen every year, he said.

Business services

Sluka, who is also in charge of business services for the Garfield Heights City School District, said the district has made many updates in the past year. It replaced all lights at the high school (including the performing arts center) and middle school with LED lights. It also installed a new backup generator at the middle school and built a four-bay maintenance garage at the board office in conjunction with the Cuyahoga Valley Career Center construction class.

The district soon plans to begin construction on a transportation center off Garfield Boulevard, Sluka said. The drawings have been completed and approved by the city's planning commission and zoning board. The district is working on finalizing the overall budget costs.

Garfield Heights City Schools also provides free breakfast and lunch for all kindergarten to eighth grade students, a "breakfast after the bell" program at the high school for students who arrive late and an after-school snack program at both the high and middle schools. This year it received the Champion of Breakfast Award from The Ohio School Breakfast Challenge Partners.

LISTEN FOR US ON RADIO 98.5 & 92.3 and lunch programs, Olszewski said the district served 304,898 breakfasts this year. This includes 282,093 free lunches. It also served 352,665 lunches, of which 319,351 were free.

The district provides 2,600 Chromebooks to students, as well as 600 iPads, 600 desktops and 53 laptops, Olszewski said.

He highlighted the range of academic opportunities in the district, including AP and Honors courses at the high school level and the LETRS program at the middle school level. There are also many extracurricular programs throughout the schools, including several bands and choirs, 18 high school varsity sports, 15 middle school sports, a community service organization and the theatre department.

Olszewski said the district places an emphasis on positive behavior reinforcement with a program called Positive Behavior Intervention Supports, or PBIS. Each school takes a different approach to the program, but all reward good behavior in some way.

right turn signal, made an improper right turn from the center lane and traveled west on Broadway. The vehicle also had a defective muffler emitting excess noise.


