Maple Heights Council OKs public rain garden at Lee-Libby Pocket Park

Maple Heights Council passed a resolution at its meeting last week authorizing City Engineer Ed Hren to begin preparing plans and specifications and to advertise for bids for construction of "green infrastructure," featuring a public rain garden and permeable pavement at the Lee-Libby Pocket Park.

This follows the city recently receiving \$85,000 in Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District community funding towards the project.

Construction has been ongoing at the park at the northeast corner of Lee and Libby roads in the city, and passage of the resolution ensures that Maple Heights remains compliant

Also, according to the resolution, the pocket park space "will provide outdoor access to green space within the heart of Maple Heights and in close proximity to municipal and school buildings for use in various platforms, including but not limited to outdoor classroom space to educate the public about effective storm water management practices and their benefit to the environment.'

Woman dead in **Bedford one car crash**

A 33-year-old Cleveland woman died in a one-car crash near Bedford Municipal Court Monday, according to the police report of the incident.

At about 10:05 a.m., the woman was traveling southbound on Center Road at a high rate of speed and went left of center going southbound in the northbound lane, according to a witness statement documented in the report.

She went off the roadway to the left, striking a sign and hitting a tree near Elm Street. The vehicle caught fire, and the Bedford Fire Department arrived and extinguished it, according to the report. The woman was determined to be deceased on scene.

The incident is under further investigation.

Man gets life in prison for February gas station murder in Independence

A Cuyahoga County jury found Cronie Lloyd, 48, guilty of murder and felonious assault in the killing of 83-yearold Gary Power at an Independence gas station on Feb. 3. After the jury returned the verdict, Judge Daniel Gaul immediately sentenced Lloyd to life in prison with first parole eligibility after 15 years.

"This defendant inexplicably attacked an 83-year-old man over a minor fender bender," Prosecutor Michael O'Malley said. "The quick and diligent work by Independence police helped bring this defendant to justice.

On Feb. 3, Lloyd and the victim were at Club Impulse located inside the Holiday Inn at 6001 Rockside Road, according to the prosecutor's office. They did not know each other and did not interact while at the bar.

The two men left at approximately the same time and got into a minor traffic accident, then drove to the nearby Sunoco gas station at 6000 Rockside Road and exited their vehicles.

Surveillance video showed that while engaging in conversation, Lloyd walked up to the victim and punched him in the head, causing him to lose consciousness and fall to the ground. Lloyd walked back to his car and fled the scene.

Independence police were called, and the victim was transported to the hospital, where he died two days later.

An investigation conducted by Independence police, the Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation and the Cuyahoga County Medical Examiner's Office linked Lloyd to the location at the time of the crime, the prosecutor's office said. AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 898 'COMMUNITY REINVESTMENT AREAS" OF THE CODIFIED ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF MAPLE HEIGHTS, AND REPEALING ORDINANCE NO. 2003-029 "ESTABLISHING BOUNDARIES OF COMMUNITY REINVESTMENT AREA IN THE CITY OF MAPLE HEIGHTS AND DESIGNATING A HOUSING OFFICER TO ADMINISTER THE PROGRAM AND CREATING A COMMUNITY REINVESTMENT HOUSING COUNCIL AND A TAX INCENTIVES REVIEW COUNCIL", AND DECLARINGAN EMERGENCY.

On December 4, 2002, Ordinance No. 2002-073 was passed by Council enacting Chapter 898 of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Maple Heights pertaining to Community Reinvestment Area, Housing Officer, Housing Council and Tax Incentive Review Council within the City of Maple Heights. This legislation established the boundaries of the Community Reinvestment Area (CRA) in the City of Maple Heights, designated a Housing Officer to administer the program and created a Community Reinvestment Housing Council and a Tax Incentives Review Council.

Subsequently, on June 12, 2003 Chapter 898 of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Maple Heights was amended by Ordinance No. 2003-029 to establish new CRA boundaries.

By this notice, be advised that Chapter 898 of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Maple Heights was hereby amended by Ordinance No. 2019-76 passed by Council on September 4, 2019 to establish new CRA boundaries. The new Maple Heights Community Reinvestment Area 1 was hereby established as Area Number 03547306-01. Garfield council meets; new patrolman sworn in

Before his report to council Monday night, Garfield Heights Mayor Vic Collova swore in new police officer Mahmoud Sulieman to the GHPD. Patrolman Sulieman was a two-year veteran of the East Cleveland Police Department before coming to Garfield.



The mayor announced the good news that the fire department has been awarded a \$218,000 FEMA grant, and the bad news that Tomlinson Industries is moving out of Garfield Heights. The company has been at 13700 Broadway Avenue since the mid 1960's, Collova said, and its leaving will be "a big blow" to the city.

In legislative action, Garfield Heights Council amended a 2014 ordinance relative to the position of police chief's designee. The position will now be called deputy chief and comes with "more authority to do the job properly," the mayor explained.

One ranking officer, sergeant and above, of the GHPD will serve as the deputy chief, according to the ordinance, and will possess the authority to supervise all members of the department aside from the police chief.

The deputy chief will receive the annual compensation for their rank plus a per annum bonus of \$2000.

The only other piece of legislation Monday night was passed on emergency status to apply for grant funding

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through the Western Reserve Area Agency on Aging for congregate and home delivered meals to seniors for the years 2020 and 2021.

The next regular meeting of council is scheduled for Tuesday, October 15, because of the Columbus Day holiday on Monday, October 14.
