Nicholson sentenced to death in murder of G.H. brother, sister

Cuyahoga County Prosecutor Michael C. O'Malley announced last week that Matthew Nicholson, 30, has been sentenced to death for the murders of 17-year-old Manuel Lopez and 19-year-old Giselle Lopez.

There can be no greater form of abuse than killing someone's children in front of them," said Prosecutor O'Malley. "Matthew Nicholson is a monster for his barbaric actions and received the sentence he rightly deserved. He was unremorseful to the very end.

On Oct. 11, 2019, a jury found Nicholson guilty of the aggravated murder of the two teenagers and attempted felonious assault on their mother. The jury's guilty verdict of aggravated murder included Course of Conduct specifications, indicating that the crime was part of a course of conduct involving the purposeful killing of two or more persons. This specification is one of the qualifying aggravating factors for the death penalty. On Oct. 18, the jury found that the aggravating factors outweighed the mitigating factors and recommended that the death penalty be imposed.

On Sept. 5, 2018, Nicholson got off work and drove to a house owned by his girlfriend, Americo Polanco, 44, near E. 86th St. and Garfield Blvd. in Garfield Heights. Nicholson argued with her about a previous relationship and attacked her in a bedroom, strangling her and striking her in the face multiple times. The victim's 17-year-old son intervened to stop the attack and a struggle ensued between him and Nicholson. After his mother separated them, the son called police while Nicholson got a handgun.

The mother's 19-year-old daughter had returned home from work and entered the house. When the victim instructed her children to run outside, Nicholson fired 13 shots at them. Both suffered multiple gunshot wounds in the back. The mother ran to a neighbor's house and Garfield Heights Police arrived on scene. The 17-year-old boy died at the scene and his 19-year-old sister was transported to the hospital, where she underwent emergency surgery and was pronounced deceased shortly thereafter. Nicholson was arrested after a four-hour standoff with the Southeast Area Law Enforcement Swat Team. The investigation was conducted by Garfield Heights Police, the Cuyahoga County Medical Examiner's Office and the Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation.

Residents attend meeting on Wargo Farm property

Garfield Heights Ward 6 Councilman Matt Burke held his monthly Community Awareness meeting last Wednesday evening at the Civic Center. The meeting was devoted to discussion of the old Wargo Farm property at the southern tip of Garfield Heights behind Garfield Commons on the other side of Hathaway Road.

The city purchased the 46-acre parcel from the Wargos in 1988 and the house next door that was razed, for an investment that totaled \$425,000, Ward 7 Councilman Tom Vaughn told the 40-some people attending the meeting. The Wargo property is located in Vaughn's

He said the original plans for the property included building of a recreation center, baseball diamond and tennis courts but the city never was in a financial position to move forward with it. Then, he said, the 2008 crash happened and the city was forced into state receivership.

According to Vaughn, Mayor Vic Collova said there have been businessmen recently coming to the city inquiring about the property, and the city is still trying to figure out what the property is actually worth in today's market.

Vaughn said the county has appraised the property for tax purposes at \$600,000. He explained that the property as owned by the city is zoned U8, which allows a park, hospital or city use. If the property is sold, he said, it would revert back to U1, which is residential use.

Only 23 acres of the 46-acre parcel is buildable, Vaughn said, noting that a developer would probably turn over the unusable acreage for a city park or to the Cleveland

Metroparks.

He said any sale of the property would be up to Garfield Heights City Council, which could open it up to a citywide voté.

Kate Abarbanell, a resident whose property abuts the Wargo property, was at last week's meeting and said she talked with the head of acquisitions at the Metroparks, who told her they were very interested in acquiring the

Vaughn said if developers or the Metroparks wants to buy the property, it would go to the highest bidder, but city council would have a say in what the acreage would be

There would be public meetings and everything would be out in the open," he said.



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
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Cuyahoga Arts & Culture announces over \$11.8 million in grants for 2020

Cuyahoga Arts & Culture (CAC) will invest \$11,800,898 in 277 Cuyahoga County nonprofit organizations in 2020 through its General Operating Support and Project Support grant programs. CAC is one of the largest local public funders of arts and culture in the nation, granting more than \$193 million to more than 420 organizations since 2007.

Local nonprofits receiving CAC grants for 2020 include: Broadway School of Music & the Arts, \$19,553; Jennings Center for Older Adults, \$9119; Jones Road Family Development Corporation, \$13,225; Slavic Village Development, \$11,497; Union Miles Development Corporation, \$5,000.

All grants were approved by CAC's Board of Trustees during a public meeting on Wednesday, November 13, at the Children's Museum of Cleveland.

"Cuyahoga Arts & Culture could not be more excited to support these arts and culture organizations which demonstrate such a strong commitment to strengthening our county through their work," said Charna E. Sherman, president of CAC's Board of Trustees. "These organizations touch our residents in every corner of Cuyahoga County. We are grateful to our taxpayers for their belief the arts matter and their support of hundreds of local arts and culture organizations. We continue to be a shining example to the rest of the nation."

In 2020, CAC will also support a number of arts and culture projects led by residents in Cleveland and East Cleveland through a partnership with Neighborhood Connections, the small-grants and community-building program affiliated with the Cleveland Foundation.

Neighborhood Connections grants

Neighborhood Connections has approved \$180,979 in grants to support 65 projects in Cleveland and East Cleveland neighborhoods. Cuyahoga Arts & Culture, the local public funder for arts and culture, will co-fund eight of the resident-led arts and culture projects through a partnership with Neighborhood Connections. Cleveland Climate Action Fund will fund five of the projects through a partnership with Neighborhood Connections.

Highlights of the grants to Slavic Village initiatives include:

• 3,200 - Speak Into The Light will launch Don't Be Rude, an etiquette development program for children.

- •\$4,728 Creativity in Stella Walsh Rec Center is hosting an Introduction to Graphic Design course to help connect youth to art, computers and graphic design. They will help youth create flyers, create logos and do Photoshop.
- •\$1,500 Celebrate the Arts Performance Academy was funded for the A.B. Hart Community Garden and Learning Sanctuary. They will purchase a fence for the garden along with marketing supplies for the garden.
- •\$1,500 Diamond in the Rough is a mentoring program for young girls and women in the Broadway-Slavic Village neighborhood.
- •\$1,500 The East 63rd Street Block Club will host their annual spring cleanup.
- •\$1,000 Ingenuity is offering Puppets for Peace, a transportable puppet show and workshop designed to bring awareness and encourage communication around social and community issues for children ages 5 to 12.
- $\$1,500\mbox{-} The Neighborhood Summit Planning Committee received funding to host its 2020 Neighborhood Summit, a celebration of the Broadway-Slavic Village neighborhood.$
- •\$2,000 SV Arts Collective is organizing Art in the Garden. It will provide art for the Gertrude Gardens/community garden space in Slavic Village.

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Meet Shayla Davis, new Ward 4 G.H. council member

Garfield Heights Councilwoman Shayla L. Davis, one of three new faces on Garfield Heights Council, ran unopposed for the council seat of incumbent Eugene Glenn in Ward 4, who chose not to run in the recent November 5 election. With Charles Donahue and Jason Blake, she joins incumbents

Michael Dudley, Sr., Mike Nenadovich, Matt Burke and Tom Vaughn to make up the seven-member council.

Davis was born in Garfield's Ward 1, attended St. Timothy Catholic School and John F. Kennedy High, graduated from Cleveland State University, College of Urban Affairs, with degrees in nonprofit administration and public management, as well as being a law student at Cleveland-Marshall School of Law. She is the mother of Shayla, 27, and Anthony, 21, both graduates of Garfield Heights High, and grandmother of three-year-old RJ.

She has lived in Ward 4 since 2004, and has been employed with the Cuyahoga Metropolitan Housing Authority, US Postal Service, Cleveland State University, City of Cleveland Public Health Department, Cleveland Municipal Court, Cuyahoga County Defender's Office and Cuyahoga County Board of Health. Davis currently owns and operates a mobile notary business throughout Greater Cleveland specializing in wills, powers of attorney, mortgage closings and other legal documents.

She said that as a councilwoman, her primary role is to advocate for the people of the city and act within the best

interests of the city.

"I believe the foundation of any thriving community should include the community voice, recreation, economic development, rising property values and safe neighborhoods," Davis said." If we want to attract strong families back into our community, we must work to enhance and expand these categories.

She said she plans to host Ward 4 Meet-ups beginning next spring where residents can discuss concerns with her and find ways to impact the community. Davis said she currently offers one-on-one "Conversations with Councilwoman Davis" for residents and businesses.

'I look forward to working with all city departments and being a positive representative for Ward 4," Davis said.
