She met her future husband, Joseph Skrha, at St. Alexis Hospital, where she was a nurse and he a physician. The two married in 1954 and Betts continued working at St. Alexis as a nurse, teaching Obstetrics. Eventually she would work with Dr. Joe at his family medicine practice on Broadway, across from St. Alexis Hospital, until he retired in 1996, along the way raising a daughter and three sons

When Joe pursued becoming a deacon in the Catholic church in 1977, Betts was at his side and became very active in the Deaconate program.

She volunteered in many organizations in the community over the years and initiated and chaired the St. Michael Hospital Community Board until the hospital was razed.

In 2005 she was invited to join the Cleveland Central Catholic High School Advisory Board and is still active in that capacity. Betts is also a board member of Lourexis/ Alexia Manor. She is active with the Bohemian National Hall and Our Lady of Lourdes Church at East 55th and Broadway. And lastly, and most importantly to her, Betts is a loving mother and grandmother of five.

It is through her unbounded energy, curiosity and spirit that she has been recognized by many organizations and the state of Ohio as Senior Citizen of the Year. And through all the ups and downs of life, her deep Catholic beliefs have sustained and nurtured her.

## 2020 budget figure released

After council passed an ordinance last month for the city's budget for fiscal year ending Dec. 31, 2020, Tillman released the total figure for this year's budget.

"The total figure for the 2020 budget that was passed at last week's council meeting is \$25,849,570.95," Tillman stated on Tuesday, Dec. 24.

The budget legislation had to be passed by the end of 2019 and presented to the Cuyahoga County fiscal officer by Dec. 31, 2019.

Council also held a special meeting on Monday, Dec. 30, to enter into Executive Session to interview applicants and select candidates for two positions on the Planning and Zoning Commission, Cicirella stated. The results of that meeting were not available as of press time.

#### **Felonious Assault**

A woman in the 6500 block of Sebert Ave. called police and told them her nephew, who lives in the same apartment building as she does, had been shot. She said he had banged on her apartment door on Friday, Dec. 27, shortly after midnight and told her he had been shot; she let him in and called police. The victim walked out of her living room and told police he had been shot in the back. Police observed a suspected bullet hole in the back of the flexible back brace he was wearing. EMS was called to respond and conveyed the victim to Metro.

Police went to Metro to get more information from the victim. He said he had gone to a convenience store on Fleet Ave. with a younger male friend and that his friend began speaking with another male (the suspect who later shot him). The suspect got angry when the victim told his friend it was time to leave. The two drove off, with the suspect firing a shot into the victim's vehicle while he was driving away. After realizing his vehicle had been shot, the victim parked in his driveway and walked down Sebert from his residence toward E. 65 St., where he encountered the same man who had shot his car. The suspect then shot the victim three or four times, striking him at least once when he was on the sidewalk, somewhere near his apartment building. The victim then went to his aunt's for help.

When police confronted the victim with evidence that he, too, had been firing a weapon, he was evasive but denied doing so several times. Metro hospital staff told police the victim had two suspected gunshot injuries to his abdomen, with no foreign objects inside him - likely a through and through wound from a single gunshot. He was admitted to Metro for treatment. 4th District detectives to follow up.

#### Burglary

Cleveland police received a report of a burglary on Saturday, Dec. 28, at 2 p.m., from a home in the 4100 block of E. 79 St. The reporting person told police she went to her brother's house on E. 79 St. When she pulled up she saw that the front door was wide open. She walked around the back of the house and noticed that the back door had been kicked in. She entered and saw that her brother's microwave, blinds, fan, two flat screen televisions, leather couch and pressure washer were gone.

She then went outside and saw some of the missing items (fan, microwave, and blinds) were in the bed of the neighbor's pickup truck. Police questioned the neighbor, who said she was pulling into her driveway when she saw the items were blocking her from getting all the way in so she picked them up and put them in the bed of her vehicle. 4th District detectives to follow up.

#### Assault

Police received an assault complaint on Saturday, Dec. 28, at 11 a.m., from an apartment in the 8100 block of Harvard Ave. A man living in an adjacent apartment told police his neighbor had punched him in the face after he asked the victim if "he's been messing with his mail." The suspect left the location in an unknown direction. The victim was given a report number and advised to the prosecutor. Police noted the victim had no visible injuries.

# FBI upping attack on violent crime in Cleveland

The Federal Bureau of Investigation is partnering with local, state and federal law enforcement under a new initiative that will tackle crime in seven of the country's most violent cities, according to its website, with the city of Cleveland included in the list.

Operation Relentless Pursuit will increase the number of federal law enforcement officers and bulk up federal task forces in Cleveland, Detroit, Memphis, Baltimore, Kansas City, Milwaukee and Albuquerque.

Up to \$71 million in federal grant funding will be available for new hires, mission-critical equipment and technology, and other needs.

The FBI already has dedicated resources in the cities chosen for Operation Relentless Pursuit but will now contribute even more.

FBI Director Christopher Wray says the Bureau will provide its unique investigative tools and techniques to the collective effort.

"We'll do that by reassigning a number of special agents and other personnel to each of these cities to help investigate and take the worst offenders off the streets and cripple their organizations," Wray said.

The FBI combats violent crime across the country through hundreds of task forces, including the Violent Gang Safe Streets Task Forces and Violent Crimes Task Forces.


