Garfield recycling center held in contempt of court

Suspects in US Bank robbery in Garfield Hts. caught quickly by police

The US Bank at 5695 Turney Rd., in Garfield Heights, was robbed on Tuesday, Jan. 21, about noon, by two males wearing masks and hoodies, one of which was armed with a gun. Both suspects were captured within a half hour of the robbery by Garfield Heights police.

According to the police report, the two men pushed past a customer who was entering the bank. The taller of the pair was armed. He yelled, "You know what this is. Give me the money." He then pointed the gun at a teller and said, "You have until I get to zero before I start shooting." The shorter, heavier male poured the cash into his book bag and both left the bank

A witness called police and reported the robbery. The caller stated that two people wearing dark clothing had robbed US Bank and got into a silver Pontiac parked on Eastwood and began heading towards Fairlawn. Officers located the car on E. 139 St., as the driver and passenger exited the vehicle and began to flee on foot. The passenger, a juvenile male, was apprehended moments later by police. The driver continued running eastbound through the backyards towards E. 141 St. in Maple Heights.

Officers set up a perimeter and fresh prints in the snow led them to a dumpster on N. Industrial Ave., where they found the other suspect along with a backpack containing a large amount of cash. Police and K-9 Arlo located a gun a short distance from the dumpster.

The adult suspect was placed under arrest and charged with aggravated robbery and obstruction. The juvenile suspect was transported to city jail with charges of aggravated robbery and obstruction pending through the theattorney general's office Youth Bureau.

A Garfield Heights recycling center and its owner were held in contempt of court Friday after ignoring an order to cut down the size of a massive debris pile that caught fire last year.

"This mountain of debris could at any second become the fuel for a raging inferno," Ohio Attorney General Dave Yost said. "We've got to act."

Bill Baumann, owner of Baumann's Recycling Center LLC, must now completely remove the debris pile by March 20th or face a fine of \$5,000 per day. The pile consists of more than 30,000 cubic yards of construction and demolition debris.

Firefighters were called to the recycling center in January 2019 after an excavator caught fire on top of the pile. The conditions at the site were so poor that the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency, City of Garfield Heights and the Cuyahoga County Board of Health referred the case to for enforcement.

Newburgh Heights hires former Indy mayor as economic development director

Newburgh Heights Council, at its January meeting, passed legislation to hire former Independence mayor Anthony Togliatti to serve the village as its economic development director.

The legislation to hire Togliatti notes that the village and its community improvement corporation have accumulated various parcels of real property which it hopes will be redeveloped and has adopted formal plans for the continued development of various areas throughout the village, including the Harvard Avenue Redevelopment Plan and the plan for development and redevelopment of the city's parklands.

It also states the village wishes to continue its efforts to promote construction of infill housing on vacant residential lots, and cites Togliatti's "extensive experience in leading economic development efforts.'

Council authorized Mayor Trevor Elkins to hire Togliatti for the part-time position at the rate of \$32,000 per year plus health and hospitalization insurance benefits, and employer contributions to the Ohio Public Employees Retirement System, in accordance with the customary payroll practices of Newburgh Heights.

Togliatti will be required to work about 16 hours perweek as an exempt employee, and his appointment will be for a two-year period.

As stated in the ordinance, his position will require him to "create and facilitate programs that attract and retain both residents and businesses, and which enable sustainable growth of the city's tax base and the economic stability of the community."

Togliatti served four years as mayor of Independence from 2016-2020. He was defeated in his reelection bid by former mayor Gregory Kurtz in last November's election.



As announced by the Recreation Department, the meeting is a chance for community members, participants, neighbors and friends to share thoughts and ideas on the future of recreational and educational opportunities in Bedford. Current programs will be discussed as well as ideas for the future.

Mallis explained, "Obviously, we've worked together to put together new programs and new ideas for everybody of all ages in town, but we also want to hear from the public. There might be something that you want to see, and we've been working to implement some of those programs and ideas. If you have experience in teaching a class, or if you have a hobby or if there's something you're good at, let us know."

Councilman Vic Fluharty noted that Bedford residents over age 62 were able to take advantage of a \$50 rebate to take part in the recreation program offered by the neighboring city of Bedford Heights. "You go there, and it's \$115 for the year, minus \$50, comes out to \$65, so you can't beat that program," he said.

Legislative action

Also regarding recreation activities in the city, council passed an ordinance at last week's meeting establishing rental rules, regulations and fees at the Archibald Willard Park Pavilion (also known as Ellenwood Pavilion), located behind the Ellenwood Recreation Center.

"The Recreation Department has recommended that park rules be established and/or modified to ensure that the park is used in an efficient and appropriate manner, according to the legislation.

Mallis said the new legislation details more defined

rules for when groups rent the facility. It establishes a small rental fee to reserve the area and spells out the regulations that must be followed for its use.

This allows someone to really secure that area for a family reunion or a picnic, and also lays out various other guidelines to follow," he said.

We did have three actual readings for it (the legislation), and nobody called me about it, so it's good to go," Koci said.

Another ordinance dealing with Bedford recreation was passed at last week's meeting, to amend existing legislation on "fees, deposits and charges" regarding recreation centers.

'First and foremost, this is not an increase of fees in any which way at the recreation center," Mallis emphasized. "This is cleaning up the language on how we collect the security deposit and put it towards a specific rental, in lieu of having to reimburse individuals after their party."

NEORSD cost share agreement approved


Council also approved an ordinance authorizing Mallis to enter into a Community Cost Share Agreement with the Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District (NEORSD) for the Community Cost Share Storm Line Root Cutting and TV Inspection Project, with the city paying \$11,267.25 from its Community Cost-Share Account to participate.

The NEORSD serves a small part of Bedford that is not served by the city's own sewer program and manages the Community Cost-Share Account.

Updates

Police are still investigating an incident where shots were fired into a house on Cresswell Ave. in the early morning hours of Wednesday, Jan. 15, Councilwoman Sandy Spinks said, adding that no one was injured.

Mallis said the former YMCA facility on Northfield Rd., now owned by the city, has been discussed as a potential development site. He said the city was also working with Cuyahoga County on appraising all of the remaining

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Two new firemen sworn in for Village of Valley View

Valley View welcomed two new full time firefighters to the village after swearing in ceremonies were held for them at council's first meeting of the new year on Jan. 7. Mayor Jerry Piasecki announced at the meeting that John Suchy, Jr. and Brian Sala were present to be sworn in and that both men "possess impeccable character and desire to serve the community.

The mayor said Suchy, Jr. has been a part-time member of the fire department since July 2017, and Sala has been a part-time village firefighter since December 2018.

Fire Chief Kenneth Papesh congratulated both firefighters and their families.

The mayor announced the appointment of Nita Justice and reappointment of Tina Paulson to the Recreation Board for two-year terms. Debbie Hartman, the mayor said, elected to step down from her board seat after 20 years of service. Motions to accept the appointments of Justice and Paulson were passed by council.

Piasecki announced the reappointment of Joe White, Alan Sprague, Mike Bertovich and Tony Fini to the Planning Board for one-year terms, which was also okayed by council. Councilman Matthew March was elected council representative to the Planning Board for 2020. A motion to accept the nomination of Councilman Jeff Wyatt as council president pro-temp for 2020 was passed.

Only three pieces of legislation were on the agenda and all were okayed. They included an ordinance to pay certain claims mentioned during the month of December, a resolution authorizing the advance of funds from the Capital Projects Flood Mitigation Assistance 2017 Fund to the General Fund, and an ordinance approving the editing and inclusion of certain ordinances and adoption of new matter in the updated and revised codified ordinances, publishing such new matter and repealing ordinances and resolutions in conflict with new or revised legislation.

In financial matters, council authorized acceptance of a proposal for the removal of asbestos at a home located at 9700 Frances Dr. from Residential Asbestos Removal at a cost of \$4,300 as part of the FMA 2017 FEMA program.

Also authorized was the Grounds Department approval for the 2020 horticulture budget submitted by Stefanie erish at a cost of \$4,000.

During his report to council, Engineer Todd Sciano said Canal Road north of Warner Road is now open. He added that Allega temporarily restored the pavement and that it will be closed again some time this spring, with an expected completion in 30 days.

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GAS LINE WORK ON BOULEVARD



Orange barrels and single lane traffic have become the norm these days along Garfield Boulevard in Garfield Heights, as Dominion East Ohio works to replace gas lines along the thorough fare.

According to Jim Sickels of OHM Advisors, the city's engineering firm, the gas lines are being replaced from Turney Rd. to E. 88 St. along the Boulevard, as well as up to two blocks on side streets to the south.

Wartko is the contractor for the project, which started the week of Jan. 6, with a completion date in early May 2020. Sickles said the majority of the gas line work will be done by the end of February, with just yard and other cleanup continuing to May.

Cleveland Council eases marijuana regs

Cleveland City Council Monday night approved an ordinance that eliminates any fines or jail time for possessing low-level amounts of marijuana. Anyone possessing up to seven ounces of marijuana would not face prosecution.

Also, anyone convicted of a misdemeanor possession of marijuana would not carry the conviction as a criminal record or be required to report it on an employment application.
