## Garfield Hts. to purchase several new city vehicles; mourns loss of Bob Dobies

Garfield Heights Council passed legislation at its regular meeting Monday night to purchase a new salt truck for the service department, a new fire truck for the fire department, two Chevy Tahoes for the police department and a four-year lease of a new bus for seniors.

And the city is paying cash for everything but the fire truck! Mayor Vic Collova said this is only the second time during his tenure as mayor the city was in a position to pay for these big ticket items up front.

"We may not be in the best of shape," Collova said at the meeting, "but we're doing a lot better!

## **Bedford officials announce big** projects at State of City address

"The current state of Bedford is one of extreme optimism," said Bedford City Manager Mike Mallis would continue to happen. at the Feb. 13 Bedford State of the City Address at Light of Hearts Villa on Union St. 'The needle is going in the right direction.

And he and Mayor Stan Koci gave the crowd in attendance lots of reasons for that optimism during the annual luncheon address, keeping it local and delicious with catering by Sirna's Cafe.

Some of the positive things going on in the city over the past year and into this year included Simon's Supermarket opening sometime before summer, the new Mazda dealership, new businesses at the former Wal-Mart taurant in the old Applebee's and the growth and 62 new hires last year at Xellia Pharmaceuticals as they approach a total of 300 employees.

Mallis also pointed with pride to the fact that 93% of Bedford's firemen are certi-


staffed with 34 officers.

He said the city got a grant last year to plant 100 trees throughout the city and that Ellenwood Recreation Center was renovated and over \$25 million in residential and commercial building permits were issued.

Mallis also pointed to the growth taking place in the once vacant Meadowbrook Shopping Center, the expansion of Light of Hearts Villa Memory Unit this year and the investment of over \$100,000 in street lighting and municipal buildings. He stated that Bedford is getting a signage update this year with 65 new signs going up all over town, and that new development at Tinker's Creek Commerce Park will soon be seen.

Two of the major highlights the city hopes to make happen are the connection of the Metroparks' Bedford Reservation to the downtown district and enhancement of the Bedford Downtown Historic District.


area and the parks "will happen," and that Economic Development Director Jennifer Kuzma has already submitted a \$1 million request for grant funding for the project.

"We won't be sticking in a shovel tomorrow, but it's a first step. I think we will find a way to do it," Mallis said.

As for the enhancement of the Historic District, Mallis said an artist's rendering was presented to council earlier this month and council gave its okay to explore the possibilities of a complete redevelopment of the parking lot space behind Bedford Commons and the train station, complete with a shelter, greenspace, skating rink/spray pad, children's interactive art area and more.

"Jen (Kuzma) has identified three different funding sources that would cover half of it," Mallis said. He went on to say there will be public meetings over the next few months to get input on the proposed project from residents and business people

Question - Where can I park my car?

Answer - You cannot park cars anywhere on your lawn (frontyard or backyard). You may not park cars in your driveway if they interfere with pedestrian traffic on the sidewalk. Cars should be parked in your garage at night. If you have more cars than garage space, you may park them in the driveway, close to the garage. If your residential area allows street parking, you may not park a car within 3 feet of a driveway. Codified Ordinance Section 351.03

There will be a special meeting of Maple Heights Council tonight, Wednesday, Feb. 26, as the city continues its efforts to update Spafford Park pool for use this summer, also passing legislation towards that goal at last authorizing work at the pool. At last week's meeting, week's meeting

Mayor Annette Blackwell has stated her intention to reopen the pool to residents after it was closed several years ago due to financial constraints.

At tonight's meeting, to be held at 7 p.m. in Room 7 of Maple Heights City Hall, 5353 Lee Rd., council will consider two pieces of legislation, one authorizing Blackwell to enter into a contract with Hastings Water Works to open the Stafford Park pool's "sprayground."

Also considered will be legislation authorizing the

purchase of equipment for the sprayground. This meeting is open to the public and residents are welcome to attend.

## Broadway Ave. resurfacing schedule in Bedford moved up, city mgr. announces

After a recent meeting with Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) officials, the much needed resurfacing of Broadway Avenue, originally scheduled for 2026, has been moved up to 2023, and other preparations, including water line replacements, will start immediately, City Manager Mike Mallis said at last week's Bedford Council meeting.

Mallis commended the city's service and engineering departments for their efforts in helping to get the resurfacing started early.

Regarding the Northfield Road bridge, Mallis said that had also been a topic of discussion with ODOT, 'specifically the fencing and the walks as well as Northfield Road itself in that condition, because that is deteriorating as well. They did say they would look into that. They did not have any timeline for us, but theywere going to follow up with us within 30 days."

sprayground improvements at Stafford Park.

authorizing Blackwell to enter into a contract with D.E. Williams Electric, Inc., to provide services for the Maple Heights Senior Center Site Lighting Renovations Project, at a cost of \$19,000.

The Northeast Ohio Public Energy Council has a community grant program for participating NOPEC communities called the NOPEC Energized Community Grant (NEC) Program. Maple Heights received a \$61,782 grant in 2019, and a \$58,732 grant in 2020, to be used for municipal energy efficiency and energy infrastructure projects, according to the resolution.

#### More 'pocket park' improvements

Council has passed many pieces of legislation in the past few years to establish and build a "pocket park" in the Lee-Libby intersection of the city, funded through Community Cost Share Program funds paid out by the Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District. A rain garden and permeable pavement as part of a storm water management plan

Another resolution passed at last week's meeting provides for an amendment to the Community Cost Share Agreement for additional funding not to exceed \$82,000, 'to provide for additional eligible construction and Also passed at last week's meeting was a resolution engineering costs... to complete the required scope of work." This additional funding will bring the total NEORSD allocation to \$167,000.

Also regarding the sewer district, council passed a resolution at last week's meeting authorizing Blackwell to execute an agreement with the NEORSD for Community Cost Share Program Funds for 2020 Stormwater Manage ment "and to complete work to ensure the city... remains compliant" with Ohio Environmental Protection Agency and stormwater permit requirements.

The city has been informed by the NEORSD that extension of the street sweeping pad "to prevent nonauthorized stormwater discharges" and enable "proper disposal of street sweeping materials" at the service department's facility at 5501 Dunham Rd., qualifies as a storm water management program eligible for \$115,000 in Community Cost Share Program funds, according to the resolution.

And also related to storm water discharge in the city,

council passed a resolution authorizing Blackwell to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding with the Cuyahoga Soil and Water Conservation District and the NEORSD to provide U.S. EPA Phase II Stormwater Services for the 2020 calendar year.

#### Also on agenda

Council passed a resolution authorizing Blackwell to enter into an agreement with James G. Zupka, C.P.A., Inc., to prepare and file the annual Generally Accepted Accounting Principles financial statements for the city for the years ended Dec. 31, 2019 and Dec. 31, 2020.

Project totals are anticipated as being \$11,988 apiece for 2019 and 2020, respectively.

Council passed a resolution authorizing the Community Life and Education Committee to expend public funds and accept private donations to host the following 2020 community events in Maple Heights: Hoop It Up, Trunk Or Treat, Gobble Gobble Turkey Giveaway, and Youth Holiday Party in December.

Also passed was a resolution recognizing the Cuyahoga County Public Library System for earning the top rating among the nation's largest library systems for the 10th consecutive year in the Library Journal publication.
