Bedford officials address changes caused by COVID-19

Voicing their concerns in the wake of the COVID-19 crisis that has mandated the shutdown of many businesses and services and has forced citizens to stay in their homes throughout the country. Bedford officials addressed the many effects of the global pandemic at a unique audiencefree meeting last week.

"It's kind of eerie not having people in the audience here," Mayor Stan Koci said at the start of the meeting, which was available for residents to watch online. "But we all knowwhat's going on, and it's for the betterment of the community that we keep people away from each other at

In lieu of the Hearing From Citizens portion of the agenda, City Manager Mike Mallis and other officials also took the unusual step of answering, in real time, questions that were e-mailed to the city at bedfordoh.gov. Koci brought up the possibility of continuing this practice in the future, even after the crisis has passed, to benefit all residents who might not be able to attend in person but wanted to communicate directly with city officials at

Regardless of what they are, I can state here that the safety and wellness and the general well-being of our residents, our businesses and our staff remain our number one priority. We will continue to deliver our essential services. That will not change. Police, fire, public utilities, services, those services are going to continue.

Mallis said that the city's website would feature constant updates on Bedford's response to the coronavirus situaon. This would include the following information: District's students, programs that the state and federal a current threat, citizens should call 9-1-1

On the afternoon of Tuesday, March 17, the day after this meeting, Mallis did announce that Bedford City Hall and all other city buildings would be closed to the public.

Mallis stated, "I'm not going to pretend to have all the answers, but if you contact me in my office I will be able to provide you with as much up to date information as possible on the situation. But as far as how we're delivering services, and should there be any other changes in the immediate future, we'll be open and honest from the get-go."

Legislation passed

In order to continue the city's business in the midst of the pandemic, council passed an ordinance granting Mallis "extraordinary authority to expend funds of the city for certain purchases of goods and services in order to reduce the need for council meetings, and the duration

of such meetings, during the present crisis."

The legislation also authorizes council to more readily make decisions of an emergency nature if significant numbers of council members cannot be present during the current COVID-19 crisis.

The ordinance, which is only effective for 90 days from the date of passage, enacts temporary voting rule changes during the declared health emergency as follows: If six or seven council members are present at a council meeting, four votes will be needed to adopt an emergency ordinance. If four or five members are present, three votes will be needed; and if one to three members are present, there will be no quorum and no voting will take place.

The legislation also authorizes Mallis to expend funds without bidding up to \$100,000 for the following actions: acquisition of real estate, discharge of noncontractual claims against the city, personal services, joint use of facilities or exercise of powers with other political subdivisions, product or services of public utilities, or in the case of an urgent emergency for the immediate protection of public property or public safety.

Koci stated, "This is an authorization for council so we can do business should members of council become ill or quarantined and we can't have a full quorum here."

Council passed several other pieces of legislation on the agenda, including purchase of a Kubota diesel concrete saw for \$29,211.83 from Colony Hardware Corporation for use by the service department; a contract with AC Lawncare and Landscaping of Streetsboro for treelawn and lot maintenance on an as needed basis; an amendment of a previous ordinance for additional appropriations for current expenditures of the city; a contract with Jay Auto Group to purchase a 2020 GMC Terrain for the Bedford Municipal Court through the State Cooperative Purchasing Contract for \$24,976.50; an agreement with the village of Moreland Hills for their use of the Bedford City Jail; and an amendment of the city's Administrative Code to clarify previous legislation regarding military leave for city employees called to active duty.

Also passed was a resolution to authorize Mallis to accept the One Ohio Memorandum of Understanding regarding the pursuit and use of potential opioid litigation settlement funds "to permit collaboration between the state of Ohio and local governments to explore and potentially effectuating earlier resolution of the litigation against Opioid Pharmaceutical Supply Chain Partici-

Placed on first reading was an ordinance approving a Community Reinvestment Area agreement between the city and APEC Holdings, Inc., allowing for a 10-year real property tax exemption of 75%. Council passed legislation at a meeting earlier this month for APEC, an engineering firm based in Bedford, to buy the former YMCA facility at 460 Northfield Rd. from the city, which had acquired it in a Cuyahoga County Common Pleas Court foreclosure case last year.

Announcements

Koci encouraged residents to fill out their 2020 U.S. Census forms, as an accurate count of Bedford's population is essential to the city receiving federal funding.

Mallis said that the city had a new Code Red reverse 911 system, and even if residents were previously registered to receive calls in the event of an emergency they would have to register again to receive the service. Residents can reregister at www.readynotify.us or on the city's website, or by calling 440-232-1600.

Councilwoman Sandy Spinks confirmed that the Meals on Wheels program would continue to make deliveries to seniors and other homebound residents.

Councilman Vic Fluharty said he was always willing to give his assistance to residents, including helping them obtain needed items, and said he could be contacted at 440-241-5769 or at councilmanfluharty@gmail.com.

Motions to protect city staffers, residents in response to coronavirus approved by Maple Heights Council

Two motions to protect the health of city officials and employees, as well as residents, during the current COVIDof Maple Heights City Council last week.

The motions were placed on the agenda by Law Director Frank Consolo, who also explained in an extensive letter to Council President Ron Jackson and council members that the format of the meeting itself was implemented to help avoid spreading the potentially deadly coronavirus. He said that the teleconferenced meeting was allowable in light of the circumstances as long as a quorum is present and the public is able to access the meeting.

At the meeting, which was accessible to residents by calling a published phone number provided by the city, council passed a motion "to allow council to avail itself of the full privileges of self-government available in the City Charter and Ohio Constitution, and determine its own rules for the conduct of council meetings.

The second motion passed by council was to allow city directors and department heads to temporarily change the workweek days and hours of their city employees to promote social distancing through alternating schedules.

Council also conducted regular business at the meeting, including passing a resolution to protect the federal Community Reinvestment Act (CRA), "by ensuring that current efforts to modernize regulations do not undermine the intent of the law and its mission to protect lowand moderate-income communities across the country.

"The CRAwas a landmark civil rights law passed in 1977 to discourage the practice of 'redlining' by financial institutions, where access to home loans, business loans and other banking services has either been denied out- use the pavilions at Stafford Park, and refunding \$25 of right or made less available to communities with racial that deposit upon cleanup, was placed on first reading for and ethnic minority populations," the legislation, intro-

duced by Councilwoman Toni Jones, stated.

Maple Heights Council and Mayor Annette Blackwell "believe that, in order for CRA to continue to fulfill its 19 pandemic were approved at a teleconference meeting intended mission, regulations should be modernized to reflect changes in mortgage lending, technology and markets. However, while CRA can be modernized, it must not be weakened," the resolution stated, adding that Council Clerk Leonette Cicirella is instructed to submit a copy of the legislation to the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency in Washington, D.C.

> Also passed by council last week was an ordinance authorizing Blackwell and Police Chief Todd Hansen to apply for a grant from the Community Oriented Policing Services for the 2020 COPS hiring program for hiring new police officers.

> About \$400 million is available for communities throughout the nation for funding to hire and rehire entry level law enforcement officers. The grant funds as many positions as possible for successful applicants, and provides 75% of the approved entry-level salaries and fringe benefits of each newly hired and/or rehired full-time officer, up to \$125,000 per officer position, over the three-year period.

> Are solution to buy two 2020 Chevrolet Tahoe PPV 4WD vehicles for the police department from Tim Lally Chevrolet through the State Cooperative Purchasing Program, at a cost of \$35,824.80 each, was also approved by council.

> The resolution also authorizes Tim Lally to upfit both vehicles at a cost of \$12,437.85 apiece, for a total overall cost of \$96,525.30 for both vehicles and equipment.

> An ordinance requiring a \$150 deposit from residents to further discussion by council.


