Alternatives to temporary lack of recycling in Cleve.

The city of Cleveland currently does not have a vendor for recycling material and has contracted with a consultant to review our entire waste and recycling programs. The city will continue to pick up all waste containers while this review process is taking place, but they are not recycling at this time.

I recommend residents and businesses take their paper and cardboard to drop off locations such as those at St. Stan's, Holy Name, St. John Nepomucene and the Neighborhood Leadership institution. More locations can be found on the Cuyahoga County Solid Waste District's website: cuyahogarecycles.org. All metals can be taken to local scrap yards such as Broadway Scrap Metals and others.

Please be sure to place all your waste in one container and use your recycling container for additional waste if needed. Do not leave anything other than bagged yard waste outside your containers. Until Bulk Pickup is reinstated, you can take your bulk directly to the Ridge Road Transfer station at 3727 Ridge Rd. The city also has free document shredding as well as annual computer and tire roundups. Bedford

Bedford's traditional Memorial Day Parade and other observances have been canceled this year due to the pandemic, but the city is still going ahead with a virtual observance honoring veterans to be held online with the assistance of the Bedford Downtown Alliance.

A virtual Memorial Day Parade will be held, and anyone interested in participating can sign up for a time slot where a videographer will tape a message from you and send it to the virtual parade. Videos will be recorded outside, and social distancing guidelines should be observed. Residents could also send their messages to the BDA.

Garfield Heights

The Garfield Heights Veterans Memorial located at the Civic Center, 5407 Turney Rd., remains open to the public. There will be no formal Garfield Heights Memorial Day service or parade on Monday, May 25, due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Visitors to the Veterans Memorial are asked to respect social distance guidelines. Residents can show respect for deceased military veterans by flying U.S. flags at their homes or organizing a neighborhood sidewalk parade, said Garfield Heights officials.

Independence

On Memorial Day, the city of Independence will have an abridged service on the Public Square starting at 9:30 a.m. There will be limited seating and social distancing. This year there will not be a procession to Maple Shade Cemetery, but as is tradition, flags will mark the graves of all who served.

Mayor Gregory Kurtzwill pay tribute to 10 Independence residents who died in service to this nation. One of the soldiers served during the Civil War, three in Vietnam and six in WWII. Their names are inscribed on the Soldiers Memorial, and their Hometown Hero banners will be displayed every year on the Square.

Maple Heights

Due to the coronavirus and the health and safety of everyone, the Maple Heights Memorial Day Association has decided to cancel this year's parade and memorial services. Members ask that on Monday, May 25, you pause to remember the service men and women who gave their lives defending and protecting our country.



Help for small businesses

Cuyahoga County is continuing to work with partners from across the region to deploy over \$6 million through a Small Business Stabilization Fund, comprised of loans and grants to support small, neighborhood-based businesses that have been impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. To date, the National Development Council (NDC), one of the county's key small business assistance partners, has approved and funded over \$2 million in Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loans to 21 businesses in the Cuyahoga County.

to cook. If it is rusty, do not use any water, including for small businesses to keep their workers on the payroll. Each PPP loan is made by Small Business Administration (SBA) lenders, including NDC's Grow America Fund. The SBA will forgive loans if all employees are kept on the payroll for eight weeks and the money is used for payroll, rent, mortgage interest or utilities.



Question – What are the city's rules regarding lawn service operators.

Answer – Professional lawn service operators shall be responsible for cleaning up all cuttings, trimmings, soil and • Changing the scope of the Canal Road Pavement similar debris that accumulates on the sidewalks, driveways and streets of the area in which the work was performed.

> When parking on the street, professional lawn service operators shall park any and all vehicles in the proper direction without blocking any driveways or sidewalks other than the customer's.

> Each professional lawn service operator shall apply for a license to contract for business in the city. The application shall contain the name, adddress and principal place of business or office of the applicant, together with a statement as to length of time in business, general experience or knowledge of the applicant, and proof of current liability insurance.

> The license shall in force for a period of one year and the fee shall be \$15.00. (Ord. 77-1988)

Courts starting to reopen in Bedford, officials state at council meeting

The Bedford Municipal Court system and some businesses are now open in the city, Bedford City Manager Mike Mallis, Mayor Stan Koci and other city officials stated at the Bedford council meeting Monday night, held via video teleconference.

Ohio Governor Mike DeWine has announced some openings of restaurants and other businesses in the state after two months of social distancing guidelines implemented in March in the wake of the coronavirus crisis. Bedford is implementing some of its own reopenings, but with an abundance of caution, officials reported.

"The courts are now starting to reopen; they're not at full capacity, but we are back to pretty much normal and they are taking precautions to keep everyone safe," Law Director John Montello stated.

Mallis stated that municipal buildings were still closed but City Hall is tentatively scheduled to reopen on June 1. Check the city's website and social media outlets for more information.

The Sunoco station on Turney Road has reopened, and the relocated Mazda dealership has opened in a brand new facility in the Northfield-Rockside area of the city,

The city's staff has remained busy in the midst of the coronavirus situation, Mallis stated, as the Recreation Department has applied for a grant through AARP for improvements to the Ellenwood Recreation Center and programming, and Jennifer Kuzma of the city's Economic Development Department had applied for a large grant through the Office of Criminal Justice Services for future cleaning supplies and other items to keep the city's facilities safe.

Ohio to get a share of the nearly \$1.2 billion of federal for the city's Building Department at a cost of \$26,800. financial aid to Ohio's local governments having populations with fewer than 500,000 residents, as provided by the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act.

Funding to be distributed will be based on the proportion of the Local Government Fund revenue allocated to the city in 2019, and is estimated to be approximately \$385,000, according to the ordinance.

"There's nothing finalized yet, and it does not mean that we're getting any dollars," Mallis said. "But based on the mechanism, we would receive our monthly allocation for what appears to be March, April and May, and that could quate to about \$50,000 to \$60,000 that would have to be spent on COVID-related items, such as cleaning supplies and things of that nature.

After readings at previous meetings, council passed three pieces of legislation to proceed with the lighting improvements in the city and to levy special assessments to pay for it. The levy millage was stated at 1.5 mills, down from the previous amount of 1.6 mills, Finance Director Frank Gambosi stated.

Also passed was an ordinance to levy assessments for expenses of garbage and refuse collection, recycling and disposal in the city during tax year 2020, to be collected in 2021, and this will remain at \$14 per month per household, Gambosi said.

Council passed a resolution approving the proposed 2020 tax budget for January 1 through Dec. 31, 2021, after a public hearing was held prior to Monday's council meeting. Also passed was a resolution requesting that the Cuyahoga County Fiscal Officer advance taxes from the proceeds of the tax levies for 2020, to be collected in 2021.

The city will sell its 2000 FL50 Horton Ambulance to Life Care ambulance for \$25,000, according to legislation passed by council, after determining it was "surplus property" when the city bought a new one recently. The city will get more out of the direct sale versus a trade-in, which would have yielded \$12,000 to \$15,000, Mallis

Council passed a resolution for a formal mutual aid agreement between Bedford's police department and the Metroparks police, although this agreement has existed for years, Mallis stated.

And council also passed legislation for Mallis to enter into a Master Cooperation Agreement with the Cuyahoga County Department of Public Works, which states: "...the municipality will be reimbursed by the county for performing the following preventive maintenance activities on county roadways... pavement resurfacing, base repairs, curb replacement/repairs, curb ramp repairs, rebuilding of catch basins/manholes, striping, crack sealing, joint repair and other similar maintenance activities.

Anniversary Cookbook" for your backyard barbecuing this Memorial Day Weekend.

Barbecued Beef Brisket

BRISKET: 11/2 T. seasoning salt 1½ T. pepper 1½ tsp. paprika 16-lb. beef brisket 2 cups vegetable oil 2 cups cider vinegar ½ cup Worcestershire sauce 2 T. brown sugar 2 bay leaves, crumbled

SAUCE: 4 cups catsup 1 cup cider vinegar 1 cup Worcestershire sauce

1 medium onion, grated ½ cup butter or margarine 2 T. seasoning salt

1 T. chili powder

1 T. pepper, 1 bay leaf

Combine salt, pepper and paprika; rub into brisket. Place brisket in shallow container. Combine oil, vinegar, Worcestershire sauce, and bay leaves; pour over brisket. Cover, refrigerate $8\,\mathrm{hours},$ turning occasionally. Place $2\,$ pieces of oak, each the length of the grill, at front and back of grill. Place charcoal in middle. Start fire; let burn until coals are white. Remove brisket from marinade, reserving marinade. Rake coals to one end of grill; place brisket at opposite end. Cover with lid; cook over indirect heat 31/2 to 4 hours or until tender, basting with marinade every 30 minutes. To make sauce, combine catsup,

vinegar, Worcestershire sauce, onion, butter, salt, sugar, chili powder, pepper and bay leaf in saucepan; bring to boil, stirring occasionally. Remove bay leaf. Coat both sides of brisket with sauce at beginning of last hour of cooking. Continue to cook until tender, basting only top of brisket with sauce. Serve brisket with sauce.

Discharging Firearm into Habitation

Police were dispatched to a home in the 8500 block of Grand Division Âve. on May 8, and talked to a man who reported that he had left his home between May 6, at 2 p.m., and May 7, at 11 p.m., when he had come home and gone to bed. Assault

On May 8, at 4:30 a.m., a woman in the 8000 block of Force Ave. said she was "jumped" by her neighbor and her neighbor's mother and punched in the head and chest. She received minor injuries.

Police advised victim to the prosecutor's office.

Garfield Heights

Robbery

Officer met victim, a 25-year-old man, at the station who reported that on Sunday, May 10, at 10 a.m., he left the Family Dollar on Turney Road, and two men followed him as he was walking to his Rockside Rd. home. He became nervous while in the parking lot of Walgreens at Turney and Rockside rds., so he began to run because the two men were getting closer. The victim was then grabbed from behind by one of the men, who told him to "give up

phone. The robbery took place in the driveway between **Criminal Damage – Residence** Arby's and Walgreens. The suspects then fled in an unknown direction. Security footage at the Family Dollar shows the victim exiting the store and the two men several seconds behind him. Both suspects were black males wearing hoodies and appearing to be between 18- and 20years of age. Victim advised to contact the Youth Bureau.

Felonious Assault

Shortly before 5 p.m. on May 11, police responded to the area of E. 135 St. and Rockside for a report of shots fired. Dispatch said an older model red Buick was shooting at a grey Chevy Cobalt. Officers located .45 caliber shell casings in the area of E. 135 St. and Littleton. One of the bullets had struck a house on Littleton. An anonymous caller let dispatchers know a grey vehicle had pulled into the backyard at a residence on Thraves. An officer checked the area and found a vehicle matching the description parked in a backyard at a home in the 13400block of Thraves. There was no one inside the car, which had two broken windows and a bullet hole in the roof and three spent casings inside. The homeowner arrived back and told police the car had been her mother's but she thought her grandson had sold it. The residence checked negative for anyone involved. Vehicle towed to sallyport.

Menacing

On May 11, about 9:15 p.m., officers responded to a home in the 8200 block of Crudele Dr. for a report of shots fired. Prior to their arrival, dispatch also noted a man had been stabbed, so GHFD was dispatched to the area as well.
