COVID-19 UPDATE By Garfield Heights Mayor Vic Collova



As we continue to keep safety our number one priority in Garfield Heights, I want to thank everyone for taking precautions and working to prevent the spread of the COVID-19 coronavirus. I assure you I focus daily on the best interests of residents and employees as we work together to provide city services during the pandemic.

Garfield Heights is slowly resuming public access to the Civic Center. The city's Building Department is open from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday- Friday. Only two people are permitted at the counter and visitors are asked to wear masks and maintain the recommended social distance.

Other municipal departments remain closed to the public; however, services continue. Administrative office ĥours are 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday-Friday. Call 216-475-1100, 216-475-1199 or 216-475-6607 to reach someone for assistance. Staffing has been reduced and some administrative employees also are working remotely, so please leave a message and your call promptly will be returned. I am encouraging telephone rather than inperson appointments.

The Senior Center remains closed to all visitors and non-essential staff. Senior Center transportation staff is delivering meals to lunch program participants and home-bound seniors. Staff also reaches out with phone calls to our seniors to check on their welfare.

We continue to have our monthly food pantry distribution dates on the third Wednesday from 1-2 p.m., and the third Thursday from 6-7 p.m. for Garfield Heights residents only at the Civic Center. Bags are pre-packaged for pick up and registration is required.

The Dan Kostel Recreation Center and swimming pool will remain closed and all summer activities have been from a B3 Positive to a B2 Stable. We are steadily making canceled. We hope to reopen for winter activities includ- real, tangible economic progress. ing ice skating lessons and hockey.

We have cancelled all public meetings; however, City Council meetings will continue via teleconferencing and are open to the public. City-sponsored public events have been cancelled indefinitely.

I continue to stay closely in touch with officials in our federal, state and county governments, the Cleveland Clinic, and especially Marymount Hospital discussing the latest statistics, projections and safe practices. Although we will do everything possible to keep our community safe, we can not do it without community support!

PLEASE practice the disinfectant procedures and stayat-home instructions as much as you possibly can to prevent the spread of this potentially deadly disease.

Again, keeping safe is our highest priority. Our whole world has been turned upside down during this pandemic, and while I am reassuring everyone that our goal is to provide needed services for our residents, I also plead for your patience. These are very challenging times. hope.

Maple Heights Council passed a resolution to place the renewal of a 1.3-mill, five-year tax levy for expenses and operations of the Maple Heights Senior Center on the ballot in November, at its video conference meeting last week. Law Director Frank Consolo explained that it is backup legislation if the renewal on the August ballot does not pass.

Earlier this month, the county fiscal officer certified that the total current tax valuation of the city is \$278,554,630, and that the revenue that would be generated by renewing the levy would be \$336,761 annually during the life of the levy, according to last week's legislation.

However, should the renewal fail in August and have to go on the November ballot, the dollar amount of the venue generated, if voters pass it, would be \$115 less each year for the Senior Center.

Water main replacement okayed

Last year, City Engineer Ed Hren applied to the Cleveland Division of Water to fund the replacement of the water main on Hollywood from Maple Heights Blvd. to Waterbury Ave., under the Suburban Water Main Renewal Program (SWMR), and the city was awarded \$752,032.

Council also passed a resolution authorizing Mayor

Hren said the earliest start date for the project would be June 29, 2020, and the time of completion for the project was indicated to be 90 days.

Hazardous duty pay

Addressing the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and the risks it poses to auxiliary police officers in the city, council passed legislation amending the codified ordinances to raise hourly hazardous duty pay for auxiliary officers from 50 cents to \$5 an hour. This was recommended to council by Police Chief Todd Hansen, who noted at last week's meeting the length of time (36 years) since the last hazardous pay raise.

Auxiliary officers currently make \$8.50 to \$12.50 an hour, contingent on rank, and have not received a raise in hazardous duty pay since 1984.

It was recommended that the ordinance permit Hansen, "at his discretion, to provide additional hourly pay at an hourly rate not to exceed \$5 for hazardous duty.

Stella Walsh Rec closed for the summer

The city of Cleveland has announced that based on an analysis of the risk assessment data for each of the 22 recreation center facilities the city operates, it was determined that Stella Walsh Rec in Slavic Village and four other centers will remain closed during summer 2020.

The city says the physical layout and/or occupant capacity of each of these buildings does not allow for the successful enactment of key mitigation measures.

The other closed rec centers are Kovacic, Hamilton (indoor pool will be open to the public), Halloran and Camp George Forbes.

Playgrounds, parks

Due to the limited ability to enact, monitor and enforce health and safety measures, playgrounds will remain closed until further notice.

Parks will remain open to the public. Signage will be posted reminding guests about recommended health and safety measures that should be followed in an effort to mitigate the spread of COVID-19.

Large, organized events will not be allowed. Parks use permits will not be issued.

\$58K state grant for park

Council approved a resolution authorizing Blackwell to enter into a grant agreement with the Ohio Development Services Agency (ODSA) to provide funding for setup, operation and management of the Stafford Park Pool Spray Ground, and accept \$58,000 in funding from the was placed on first reading. ODSA.

Blackwell and Human Services Director Linda Vopat have sought funding from various county, state and federal agencies for the spray ground, which will feature water park-style attractions at the pool facility.

Budget amendment

Council approved an ordinance to amend this year's budget, as recommended by Finance Director Tinita Tillman. It had previously approved the 2020 budget for the city's operations in the amount of \$25,849,570.95, per a statement from Tillman in December.

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However, the amended appropriations, stated in Tillman's May 20 exhibit accompanying the legislation, are in the amount of \$26,567,457.37, and "are necessary to account for certain additional expenditures," the legislation states.

The city's estimated receipts for 2020 are \$33,034,561.57, according to Tillman, who is authorized by the ordinance to submit the amended budget to the Cuyahoga County Fiscal Officer.

An ordinance adopting the alternative tax budget information for the fiscal year beginning Jan. 1, 2021, and to submit it to the Budget Commission of Cuyahoga County,

Committee reports

Councilman Stafford Shenett, chair of the Community Life and Education Committee, reported that committee members would like to network with the Ohio Minority Task Force to help assist and educate the community on COVID-19.

The CLEC committee will be looking at the city's "Ready Notify/Robocall" system to come up with a more effective approach to collect residents' phone numbers, and also will be working on a community engagement strategy to address the robocall system, Shenett said.

He reported that in June, the CLEC would follow up regarding the status of 2020 city events that may be impacted by the coronavirus pandemic and social distancing guidelines, including the "Bridge the Gap-Hoop It Up" tournament with the police department in August; "Trunk Or Treat" in October; "Gobble Gobble" turkey giveaway in November; and the Youth Christmas Party in December.

Councilman Richard Trojanski, chair of the Public Works and Safety Committee, reported that committee members had discussed several issues, explaining, "Responding to the continuous recurrences of violence displayed at some of our city's bars and lounges, the committee seeks to act by legislating more stringent regulations on such establishments, in the interest of promoting the safety of our city's residents and visitors.

Trojanski also reported that the committee discussed a garbage can citation enforcement policy, as the city was continuing to experience issues of noncompliance by residents failing to collect trash and recycling containers after trash pickup.

The PWSC also discussed the NOPEC "Do Not Knock" registry program, and possible legislation to protect residents from door-to-door scams and solicitors, Trojanski said.

"The committee agreed to move forward with introducing this legislation, but due to COVID we have temporarily delayed introducing the legislation," Trojanski said.



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Garfield Heights Council update

For the first time in recent memory, Garfield Heights Council, at a special meeting last Wednesday, decided to keep meeting on the second and fourth Mondays of each month for the summer 2020.

During June, July and August, it normally votes to hold only one regular meeting a month and adds special council meetings as needed.

The initial vote taken Wednesday saw Councilmembers Matt Burke, Shayla Davis and Mike Nenadovich voting for the revised summer meeting schedule, and Councilmembers Jason Blake, Charles Donahue and Tom Vaughn voting to keep the twice-monthly meeting schedule, which ended in a tie vote.

Council President Burke had reasoned it was procedurally easier to meet once a month and call special meetings when legislation warranted it, but changed his vote to "no" to avert a deadlock.

Also approved were the following ordinances:

•To raise the salaries of the police and fire department officers in accordance with charter regulations. The raises would be from 1.5% to 2%, depending on rank.

•To amend appropriations for current city expenditures for 2020 by adding another \$5 million to the previous \$50 million budget.

Finance Director Barb Biro said the increase would be predominately for roadwork, salaries and COVID-19 expenses.

•To replace an agreement with Perk Company, Inc. to repair a storm sewer on Canal Road causing flooding to local businesses.

The original agreement was for \$50,000 for the project, which legislation passed last Wednesday will raise to \$200,000.

•To enter into an agreement with Fabrizi Trucking & Paving Co. to take immediate action to remove blockage to the storm sewer near 10406 Broadway Ave.


