Collova decides not to seek another term as G.H. mayor

Collaborating with staff and the many community partners committed to serving the city of Garfield Heights has been my pleasure since 2005, first as president of council and currently as mayor. Together, we faced and met numerous challenges.

Garfield Heights was in fiscal emergency when I first became mayor and with the help of city council, my administration, the police and fire department unions and AFSCME members, who all focused on the good of the community, we recovered. The City View Center project that had been in distress for years is now being rejuvenated to an office park.

The Bridgeview project still leaves a lot to be desired. Negotiating contracts with healthcare providers and our rubbish collector helped immensely with the city's finances. Due to the improved financial situation we were able to secure many grants and loans, resurface streets, make much needed improvements to our buildings and replace cars and equipment that had seen better days.

The ongoing COVID-19 virus outbreak has given me many concerns regarding the safety of our employees as well as the residents of our city. We have followed the scientists' and health organizations' guidelines and recommendations, and I feel we have put into action all of the protective suggestions provided to us.

My family has fully supported me during the entire time I have spent serving our community. Their sacrifices have included my missing family birthday parties, anniversary parties, grandchildren's soccer games, basketball games, award ceremonies, cheerleading events and concerts due to the obligations that I swore to uphold as a public

After this term in office, I want time to sit back, relax, enjoy the events that I have been unable to attend with family and take care of my own health and well-being. Therefore, I am announcing that I will not seek reelection in 2021. Several current council members and some residents of the community have stated that if I didn't seek another term, they would run for mayor in 2021. I wish them all the best.

The remaining months that I have in office will be used to continue to uphold the oath that I took on the day that I was sworn in as mayor.

Frank Wagner withdraws suit against city of Garfield Heights

Most Garfield Heights residents who've lived in the city a while probably know of Frank Wagner. He was a former city council president and ran unsuccessfully for mayor against Vic Collova in 2009. He's also the resident who famously filed a lawsuitagainst the city in 2013 claiming his First Amendment rights were violated regarding a huge political sign he had in his yard. The city asked him to take down the sign because it was bigger than city ordinances allow. He took it down but eventually won his case.

Wagner filed another lawsuit in the Cuyahoga Court of Common Pleas earlier this month against the city of Garfield Heights, Mayor Vic Collova and Finance Director Barbara Biro regarding the legality of the mayor also serving as the city's safety director.

Wagner's lawsuit filed with the court points out Section 32 of the Garfield Heights charter which states in part:

The Mayor... shall not hold any other public office or public employment except that of Notary Public or a member of the State Militia, or the Reserve Corps of the United States or a member of various Boards and Commissions with the approval of Council, and shall not be interested in the profits or emoluments of any contract, job, work or service with or for the Municipality... If the Mayor shall cease to possess any of these qualifications..., his office shall immediately become vacant.

Wagner's lawsuit claimed that at the point at which Collova became safety director, he could no longer serve as mayor.

After the suit was filed, Garfield Heights Council, at its Monday, Aug. 12, 2020 meeting, passed a bill that repealed the 2017 ordinance that reinstated the position of safety director and appointed Streetsboro, where he is curthe mayor to the position rently convalescing. with an added salary.

The city's law department advised that appointing the mayor as safety director was inappropriate to the Garfield Heights Charter, and, therefore, the legislation was void from its inception.

Boys & Girls Clubs will open doors to pupils who are learning virtually

in-person help for kids in digital-only education out." environments by creating at least 11 school-day learning centers in Clubs across the region, including the 6114 Broadway Ave. location.

Jeff Scott, BGCNEO's president and CEO, said the organization will open ClubSmart Learning Centers in Cleveland, Lorain County, Akron and Sandusky to help students once the school year begins in September. Each site will have laptop computers for the children and Internet access.



Learning will still be done virtually according to each school district's curriculum. At the centers, Club staff members serving as adult proctors will help children complete their schoolwork and provide additional stress-relieving programs such as art, writing and athletics.

Scott said BGCNEO feels the centers can curb academic loss and bridge the digital divide.

"Our kids need our help," he said. "The digital divide in Northeast Ohio puts so many of our kids and our families at a disadvantage. We understand there is risk in what we're doing. We also know there is long-

Scott added, "We feel it is our duty to create a safe place for kids to connect digitally and to ease the burden on working parents.'

He noted that Northeast Ohio is the fourth-worst connected region in the U.S.; in some neighborhoods, 70% of the households do not have broadband Internet access. More than a quarter of all households in the region are without Internet access.

Allen Smith, BGCNEO's chief operating officer, said ClubSmart Learning Centers initially will be located at the Broadway, Saint Luke's, King Kennedy and East Tech locations in Cleveland; at the Desich Family Campus, Elyria Middle, Southside Gardens and Westview Terrace Clubs in Lorain County; at Teen Center and Osborne Elementary in Sandusky; and at the Steve Wise Club in Akron.

Other sites could be added if funding can be found and operational requirements met.

Each site will have a socially distant setup with proctors, he said. Sites will have two Club proctors for every nine kids, along with two "roamers" and three people assigned to ensure social distancing. There will be also be a medical professional on hand at each ClubSmart location.

Smith said the ClubSmart Learning Centers will operate during the normal school day but the exact hours have not yet been determined.

BGCNEO closed all its Clubs when the pandemic hit in March. The organization reopened nine Clubs in June after establishing social distancing and cleaning protocols, lowering the maximum capacities at all

Boys & Girls Clubs of Northeast Ohio will provide term risk from academic loss and even kids dropping sites and reducing staff-to-member ratios. Scott said having kids and staff in buildings during the summer gave BGCNEO valuable insights into safety mea-
