Homicide on I-77S near Harvard Ave.

On Dec. 19, at approximately 1 a.m., Cleveland police officers responded to I-77S at Harvard Ave. for a female shot in a vehicle. On arrival officers were met with Newburgh Hts. police who were already on scene performing lifesaving measures on the 33-year old female who had suffered multiple gunshot wounds. She has been identified as Breyana Presley, cleveland.com reports.

Newburgh Hts. EMS transported Presley to MetroHealth Medical Center, where she was pronounced deceased. Cuyahoga Hts. EMS took two of her daughters, who were also in the vehicle, ages 12 and 8 months, to Metro for evaluation. Both were uninjured.

NHPD had a suspect in custody with a firearm secured. Members of CPD Homicide Unit responded to the scene for investigation. Preliminary information indicates that the victims were traveling in a vehicle with the suspect, who was arrested in the shooting.

Ellis Wilson, 34, has been charged with aggravated murder and is in the Cuyahoga County jail on \$1 million bond, cleveland.com further reported.

"The NHPD has taken up a collection of donations for the surviving children of the mother who was the victim of a domestic violence homicide early Saturday morning," Police Chief John Majoy said.

"There are specific details available on our public Facebook page where you can share the sizes and such," he continued. "While we have asked for donations up until Wednesday at noon, anything received thereafter will also be given to the family."

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Bedford Council passes more CARES Act funding

At its meeting Monday night, Bedford Council passed legislation approving two additional payments of \$140,040 and \$959.22 in federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act funding. This brings the total amount of CARES money allocated to Bedford to a little over \$1.16 million for this year, Finance Director Frank Gambosi said.

In addition to costs incurred through paramedic response, the combined payments approved through Monday's ordinance will be used for additional personal protection equipment, disinfecting and sanitation in municipal buildings, providing food to vulnerable and disabled residents, costs of videos of council meetings to



maintain communication with the public, touch-free replacement of doors in Ellenwood Recreation Center and the municipal complex and other operations, services, materials and equipment.

The city was lucky enough to get some additional funding from the county," Gambosi said, crediting Jennifer Kuzma of the city's Economic Development office for her work in getting the funds.

Also approved was an amended budget ordinance to reflect receipt of the additional CARES funding and other items

Council passed two separate ordinances to approve two contracts with Allied Door Systems, Inc., of Solon, to install the no-touch, automatic doors at Ellenwood and at the municipal complex at a total cost of \$40,967.30.

Also passed was an ordinance to raise the annual salary of Bedford Clerk of Court Tom Day from \$120,045 this year to \$122,145.85 beginning Jan. 1, 2021. The city of Bedford will pay 60% of the cost of the raise and 40% will be paid by Cuyahoga County, the ordinance states.

The state of Ohio mandates a 1.75% raise to clerks of municipal courts to coincide with judges' raises, "and in consideration of the outstanding efforts of the clerks in regards to efficiency and economics of administration of the court," according to the legislation.

Bedford Mayor Stan Koci praised Day, stating, "He does a terrific job... Like the rest of our administration, he has dealt with the coronavirus remarkably well, but he deserves this compensation. The court has been a good

City Manager Mike Mallis stated, "I just wanted to take a minute and thank all of the residents in town for their patience and being flexible with how we have changed. how we deliver services and how we do business. That does not go unnoticed, and I appreciate that cooperation."

He also thanked the businesses and city employees."We can't get through a year like this without everyone working together," he said.



Indy Council updates

The city of Independence Council met in regular session on Tuesday, Dec. 8, and voted to retain the services of Lori's Custom Catering and TJK Catering & Concessions to provide meals for the Community Service Department's 55 + Drive-Thru Contactless Lunch Program which is provided two days per week.

The meals are now offered free of charge, but beginning Jan. 1, residents will be charged \$5 per meal, still a bargain for seniors.

In his mayoral report, Mayor Gregory Kurtz said that because of the dramatic spike in new COVID-19 cases after Thanksgiving, he has decided to close nonessential tract with Geotech Services, Inc.; city operations from Dec. 24-Dec. 31 so that a deepcleaning of all facilities can take place.

Kurtz said the police, fire and service departments will all remain open.


Special meeting Dec. 15

A special meeting of Independence Council was held on Dec. 15, at which time a limited agenda was addressed.


Passed was an ordinance amending a section of the city charter concerning open storage or parking of recreational vehicles. Also okayed was an ordinance establishing the Chestnut Woods Phase VII Incentive District and declaring improvements to certain parcels in the Incentive District to be a public purpose to benefit or serve the Incentive District.

The 2021 Annual Appropriations Ordinance was approved as amended as well as the 2020 Annual Appropriations Ordinance.

A motion to ratify and approve the spending of certain Coronavirus relief funds on budgeted police and fire department personnel and services diverted to a substantially different use which totaled \$439,986.86 and acknowledging the city of Independence spend another \$97,241.04 for non-personnel emergency protective measures between March 13, 2020 and December 14, 2020 was approved unanimously.

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

Cleveland man sentenced to 25 years for rapes of 2 women

Cuyahoga County Prosecutor Michael C. O'Malley announced earlier this month that Derrick Brown, 26, was sentenced to 25 years in prison for raping a 30-year-old woman in Garfield Heights in 2013 and a 76-year-old woman in South Euclid in 2019.

This predator violently beat and raped these victims, whose lives are now forever changed," said Prosecutor O'Malley. "He deserves every day of this decades-long prison sentence for these despicable actions.'

An investigation conducted by South Euclid police connected Brown to the crime. DNA evidence from the 2019 rape in South Euclid matched DNA evidence collected by GHPD from the 2013 rape. The U.S. Marshals Service arrested him on Jan. 21, 2019.

Brown has pleaded guilty to three counts of rape, two counts of felonious assault, one count of aggravated burglary, one count of kidnapping, one count of aggravated robbery and one count of grand theft.

Brown was sentenced to 25 years in prison. He will also be classified as a Tier-III Sex Offender, which requires him to register every 90 days for the rest of his life.

Ohio's Home Energy Assistance Program now accepting applications

Older residents needing help with winter energy bills can get assistance through Cuyahoga County's Division of Senior and Adult Services (DSAS) and the Ohio Development Services Agency's Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP). The program is accepting applications now through May 31, 2021.

DSAS partners with the Western Reserve Area Agency on Aging as one of its Aging and Disability Resource Centers (ADRC). Through this partnership, DSAS can provide residents ages 60 and over (or 18 to 59 with a disability) with assistance on HEAP and a variety of other programs to keep them safe and supported at home.

"Many older adults struggle to pay their energy bills when the temperature drops," said Danette Allums, chief of DSAS' Aging and Disability Resource Center. "The Home Energy Assistance Program helps residents at or below 175 percent of the federal poverty guideline to pay their heating bills. The benefit is applied directly to the

customer's utility or bulk fuel bill after Jan. 1, helping to manage heating costs through the winter.

Residents ages 60 and over can contact DSAS for assistance in applying for HEAP. When applying, individuals need to have copies of their most recent utility bills, a list of all household members (including birth dates and Social Security numbers), proof of income for the past 30 days for all household members, proof of U.S. citizenship or legal residency for all household members and proof of disability (if applicable).

HEAP is not an emergency program. The county is offering emergency utility assistance for eligible residents who are impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic through CARES Act funding grants. Visit https://cuyahogacounty.us/assistance#utility for details. DSAS also offers other types of emergency assistance for older adults.

Landscape Architects award Morgana Bluffs Nature Preserve top design honor

The Ohio Chapter of the American Society of Land- amphitheater for outdoor learning. scape Architects has bestowed its top honor, the Award of Excellence, on Morgana Bluffs Nature Preserve, the 4 acre park in Cleveland's Slavic Village neighborhood.

AECOM, a top infrastructure consulting firm, was honored for the project's design.

The Bluffs project is a collaboration between Boys & Girls Clubs of Northeast Ohio, the Clean Ohio Fund, Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District, West Creek Conservancy, Third Federal Foundation, the city of Cleveland, the Ohio & Erie Canalway, Cleveland Municipal School District and Slavic Village Development.

The landscape architects group has made the award only five times in the past 10 years.

AECOM designed the project, which transformed an abandoned brownfield site next to BGCNEO's Broadway Club into a nature preserve serving the neighborhood. The project routes stormwater runoff away from the combined sewer system to an innovative zero discharge stormwater wetland on the site. A restored meadow and woodlands offer a variety of ecological habitats for nature study and enjoyment.

October 2019 and features trails, boardwalks and an filled in the old tunnels that led to the upper mill site.

Morgana Bluffs is a true community asset and a place where our kids can truly appreciate the wonders of the natural world," said Jeff Scott, president and CEO of Boys & Girls Clubs of Northeast Ohio.

Bordered by the Club, Morgana Run Trail and Mound STEM School, the preserve gives about 1,700 kids in the neighborhood the chance to explore nature in their back yard. It has been used for nature-based learning programs led by BGCNEO, Mound School and Footpath Foundation

The preserve is on land where the powerhouse for the massive Cleveland Worsted Mill Co. complex once stood. Worsted Mill, which operated from 1878 to 1956, was once one of the largest garment manufacturers in the country.

On July 4, 1993, a spectacular fire destroyed the complex. In 2011, the city and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency conducted an environmental assessment and remediation on the lower portion of the site, cleaning up remnants of a junkyard, reviewing fuel tank locations and removing a crumbling smokestack. The The preserve was formally opened to the public in remediation also removed several tons of junk tires and

Newburgh Heights Village Council has adopted an ordinance introduced by Mayor Trevor Elkins mandating a minimum standard of education for all police officers within the department.



In a partnership with Cuyahoga Community College, the village has enrolled nine officers into a specialized Criminal Justice Associate's Degree program beginning in January of 2021.


Mayor Elkins noted, "It is our intent to provide training in traditional coursework as well as additional schooling to address bias, diversity and an individual's rights. Newburgh Heights is an integrated community and our location within the region places us at a juncture where our personnel interact with a diverse population of citizens. It is important that we approach all interactions fairly, objectively and professionally. We believe this level of education will help to ensure that.³

Police Chief John Majoy added, "As both a chief of police and college professor I see the value of a degree, how this will benefit our officers and policing as a whole. Today's society calls for an educated police officer, and I am encouraged by the efforts put forth to make this a reality.'

Newburgh Heights is believed to be the first agency in the region to mandate this level of education and training for its police personnel.

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New housing comes to Jefferson Ave. in Maple Hts.

In a partnership with the Cuyahoga County Land Bank, the city of Maple Heights is seeing the first new homes constructed in the city in 10 years on Jefferson Ave. in the "Presidents' Row" neighborhood, which "lays the foundation for racial justice," Mayor Annette Blackwell stated.

The two new homes, both featuring 3 bedrooms and 2 bathrooms, are 1,200 square feet with attached garages set on approximately 0.2-acre lots on the south side of Jefferson Ave., adjacent to Broadway Ave. near Lee Rd. Both homes are modular construction built by Unibilt of Vandalia, Ohio.

Each home, which is delivered approximately 85% complete, is made up of two sections that are trucked in from Unibilt's facility to Maple Heights, lifted by crane and set on their foundations. The sections were set on their new foundations in late November and the finishing touches, including constructing the interior finishes, attached garages and driveways, will be completed in the next several weeks, Blackwell and Economic Development Director Patrick Grogan-Myers stated, adding that both homes are expected to hit the market shortly.

Choosing to construct the new homes in Presidents' Row was intentional, Blackwell and Grogan-Myers said. "Given its history of redlining and disinvestment, building new homes in Presidents' Row is designed to establish comps [comparable sales] and encourage private investment in homes being demolished the local housing stock and to underscore the city's commitment to addressing systemic racism," they said.

As a section of the first home was lifted into place, Blackwell said, "This feels good. This work is dedicated to righting a wrong and investing in an area that has not seen significant outside investment in a really long time.

At city council's recent meeting, Blackwell added, "This maintained for the next genwas a long time coming, to finally be able to bring two new

houses to Maple Heights. These include granite counters and two full baths in beautiful, modern homes. This is a significant reinvestment in this particular area."

Presidents' Row background

Blackwell and Grogan-Myers provided some background on Presidents' Row, a series of streets named after American presidents, including Washington, Adams, Jefferson, Harrison and Garfield, which was first settled around the turn of the 20th century, on a flat, wooded, 54-acre areawest of Broadway and east of the Pennsylvania Railroad tracks.

As the area was developed and the streets platted, the Presidents' Row moniker was given to the neighborhood. Seeking to boost home ownership and with the backing of the federal government, the Home Owners' Loan Corporation (HOLC) broke the city of Maple Heights into sections in 1940, rating each section by the relative security of an investment in real estate.

Grogan-Myers stated that the HOLC "redlined" Presidents' Row, restricting the ability of black families to access capital and the opportunity to purchase homes elsewhere in Maple Heights

Since the 1930s and 1940s, significant disinvestment in homes in Presidents' Row has led to several and numerous homes being left vacant and in disrepair, Grogan-Myers said. "Today, residents of Presidents' Row tirelessly work to see this historic area of Maple Heights is improved and eration.

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
