## **G.H. Council approves** members to Community Relations Committee

#### By Ellen Psenicka

Garfield Heights City Council met via Zoom Monday night and approved an emergency resolution appointing six members to the Community Relations Committee of the city. Their three-year term of office starts immediately.

Named to the committee by Mayor Matt Burke are: Pastor Ian Cox, Pastor Ralph Faulkner, Sara Lyons, Vanessa O'Malley, Bob Stemnock and Minister Kevyn McHenry. The mayor chose Marina Bach as his personal designee to the committee, who did not need council approval.

According to the legislation, the purpose of the committee "shall be to foster, encourage and stimulate the improvement of community and intergroup relations among and between citizens of all races, colors, religions, sexes, gender identity, ages, ancestries, familial statuses, physical disabilities, mental disabilities and national origins, and all economic and educational levels, so as to provide all individuals with an opportunity to grow, participate and share to the best of their ability in the economic, educational, political, social and judicial system.

Also passed by council at Monday's meeting included legislation to:

•Sell and dispose of municipally owned property which has been determined to be no longer needed by the city;

•Approve a change order on behalf of the city with David Krock, city engineer, per OHM Advisors, regarding the Broadway Watermain Replacement Project;

•Apply for a grant available through the Roger

Sharrer "Grow Hockey" program to purchase hockey equipment for the Dan Kostel Recreation Center;

• Enter into a contract with Pro-Vision, Inc. to purchase body worn camera systems including all requisite software and maintenance for the safety forces of the city;

• Ratify the appointment by the mayor of realtor Norma Banks as a member of the Garfield Heights Planning Commission to start immediately and end Dec. 31, 2026.

After dealing with the legislation on the agenda, a contentious "Comments by Citizens" portion of the meeting followed, with one resident questioning what she called the "double standard" of council members regarding Ward 4 Councilwoman Shayla Davis and her job with the city of Cleveland in apparent violation of the Garfield Heights City Charter. Also called into question by a resident was an alleged violation of the Sunshine Laws

According to a report sent out by Sgt. Jennifer Ciaccia, senior public information officer for Cleveland's Department of Public Safety, officers were in the area when they heard shots fired and responded.

Preliminary information indicates shots were fired from outside toward the house. A suspect in the shooting arrived at an area hospital with gunshot wounds via private auto and is in critical condition. The report did not give details of how the suspect came to be shot.

Also in the home at the time of the shootings were the boy's mother, 34, and three other boys, ages 5, 7 and 15. The mother, according to Ciaccia's briefing, was uncooperative with officers.

## Maple Heights seeking more police officers

"Our need to add more officers is dire," Mayor Annette Blackwell said of Maple Heights' seeking more officers for the city's police force to continue to protect and serve the community, at council's teleconference meeting last week.

Blackwell said that the Maple Heights Police Department, consisting of less than 35 officers, responds to an average of 85 calls per day, and those figures had reached into the triple figures on recent dates. "That's a huge number of calls," she said.

"They are super, super, super busy," Blackwell said, "and response time is less than five minutes."

Blackwell said that she and Police Chief Todd Hansen had recently worked on a video that was put out on social media to explain the duties of the safety director and police chief.

The video, posted March 26, is available on the Maple Heights Police Department's Facebook page.

She said she and council and other city officials were also actively addressing quality of life issues in the city, including trash, loud music and other neighborhood concerns, and cited the need for new businesses in Maple Heights to go through the proper procedures, including obtaining occupancy permits, during her report.

She encouraged residents to contact their respective council representatives first about these issues, and if they were unable to get a resolution they could still contact her.

Blackwell said that Councilwoman Toni Jones had been working on a brochure to address quality of life issues in the city and is hoping it will come out soon.

She said that a record number of homes, more than 700, have been sold since the first of the year in the city, which means more new residents and the increased need to get information out to them.

Another issue Blackwell spoke on was that of new businesses "popping up all over the city" without any required interaction with city departments before opening.

"There are four businesses on Broadway, and we don't know who they are," she said. "They don't have an occupancy permit. They've never gone before Planning and Zoning."

Blackwell said that one business that opened without a permit was the scene of a recent shooting. "We want businesses to be safe," she said, "and for people to be safe."

Economic Development Director Patrick Grogan-Myers, along with other city officials, was instrumental in helping to identify and cite business violations, she said.

#### Legislation passed

•Council passed an ordinance at last week's meeting requesting the cooperation of Cuyahoga County in the rehabilitation of Dunham Rd. from Turney to Libby rds. in the city

In correspondence to council, City Engineer Ed Hren explained that the estimated cost of the project is currently \$1.8 million, of which the county would pay \$1.44 million and Maple Heights \$360,000.

since the Safe Routes to Schools funded replacement of ADA accessible curb ramps on Dunham, between Turney and Rockside, will take place in the summer 2022," Hren said. "This will provide an opportunity to seek additional funding from the Ohio Public Works Commission in the fall of 2021, which, if granted, would be split between the county and city for the project.

• Council passed a resolution designating April 2021 as "Fair Housing Month" in the city. April 11, 2021 marked the 53rd anniversary of the passage of the Fair Housing Act of the Civil Rights Act of 1968, setting forth national fair housing policies.

•Council passed two resolutions to sell vacant cityowned lots that are no longer needed for municipal purposes to adjacent property owners.

One piece of legislation authorizes the sale of two lots on Marion St. to a neighbor for gardening and a childrens' play area secured by a fence. The other authorizes the sale of a lot on Jefferson Ave. for use as a fenced garden area.

Taken out of the Housing and Economic Development Committee and placed on second reading at the meeting was a resolution to approve the 2021 "Paint the City Program," to provide owners who occupy their homes with financial assistance to repaint the exterior of their houses.

### **Updates**

In his report to council, Grogan-Myers stated that Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Director Rochelle Walensky recently announced the CDC's eviction moratorium has been extended through June 30, 2021. More information is available at www.cdc.gov.

Grogan-Myers said that now with the good weather and construction season upon us also comes grass season, and the Building Department would begin citing properties with grass taller than six inches on Monday, April 19.

Human Services Director Linda Vopat announced that the MetroHealth COVID-19 vaccination site at 5398.5 Northfield Rd. was now taking appointments from all interested individuals for vaccinations, not just MetroHealth patients. ## Village Hall in Newburgh to house satellite library

The Village of Newburgh Heights Council met on Tuesday, April 6, and passed legislation to enter into a Library License Agreement with the Cleveland Public Corporation to purchase 3881 E. 42 St. Library to create a satellite public library location at the Village Hall.

The agreement calls for the installation of library lockers at the Village Hall, which will allow public library users to pick up and drop off library materials there.

The use of portable lockers and the establishment of a portable branch of the Cleveland Public Library at the Village Hall will be the first of its kind "partnership" between the library and a local municipality in Northeast Ohio.

## Hydrant flushing in G.H.

> The work will be performed Monday through Friday between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m., depending on the weather and take about eight weeks to complete. The work will begin in Ward 1 and end in Ward  $\hat{7}$ .

> Some residents may experience rusty water, which is normal, and all are encouraged to check to see if their water is rusty before drinking, doing laundry or using it to cook. If it is rusty, do not use any water, including flushing toilets, for one hour.

> After an hour, start at the lowest level of the home (laundry tub) and turn on cold water until it runs clear. Turn water off and proceed to the next level of the home and follow the same steps until each level flows clear.

> In the event that clothes were laundered and are discolored, do not dry them. Rewash them immediately after your water is clear using a heavy duty detergent. Do not use chlorine bleach. If the rust has not been removed, a commercial rust remover should do the trick.

Hello Garfield Heights Residents. My name is Lanene Jones. Recently, I was disqualified for an appointment on City Council's Ward 6 seat because of my current employment as a Loan Technician with a government agency. I think it is important to note that PEOPLE serve on City Council, not occupations. Please reach out to your Councilman and request him/her to submit legislation for a change to Section 9 of the Charter to remove the restrictive verbiage preventing hard working residents from serving on City Council. We need them to do this in enough time to be placed on the November ballot. They need to allow the residents of the City to determine if Section 9 of the Charter is fair and equitable to the residents with public or government occupations. Here is a short list of public occupations that will ban a candidate from serving on City Council:
