Two M.H. men charged in drug trafficking conspiracy Suspect shot, killed by CPD near Garfield border

Acting U.S. Attorney Bridget M. Brennan has announced that a federal grand jury sitting in Cleveland returned a six-count indictment charging Anthony L. Anderson, 45, and Eben D. Anderson, 38, both of Maple Heights, with conspiracy to distribute cocaine, crack, fentanyl and methamphetamines in the Cleveland area.

Both Anthony and Eben Anderson are charged with conspiracy to possess with intent to distribute cocaine, crack, fentanyl and methamphetamine; possession with intent to distribute cocaine; possession with intent to distribute cocaine base; possession with intent to distribute fentanyl and possession with intent to distribute methamphetamine. In addition, defendant Eben Anderson was charged as a felon in possession of a firearm.

“Stopping the flow of drugs and drug manufacturing equipment at our borders is an important part of curbing the flow of illegal drugs to and within our communities,” said Brennan. “We are grateful for our law enforcement partners’ sustained efforts to combat illegal narcotics trafficking.”

Court records state that in January of 2021, a parcel was intercepted and searched by Customs and Border Protec-

tion (CBP) officers that was allegedly found to contain two pill press die sets. The affidavit in support of the criminal complaint states that the importation of pill press die sets is prohibited as they are considered drug paraphernalia. Homeland Security Investigations Cleveland was subsequently contacted by the CBP, and a controlled delivery of the parcel was arranged and executed.

Following the delivery, law enforcement officers carried out a search warrant at the address and located both defendants inside the residence. A search of the home was conducted, and officers recovered approximately 1.34 kilograms of cocaine, 136 grams of fentanyl, 324 grams of crystal methamphetamine, a high-speed pill press, pill press dies, bulk currency and five firearms.

An indictment is only a charge and is not evidence of guilt. A defendant is entitled to a fair trial in which it will be the government’s burden to prove guilt beyond a reasonable doubt.

This investigation was conducted by Homeland Security Investigations and is being prosecuted by Assistant U.S. Attorney Patrick P. Burke.

Cleveland police shot and killed a suspect last Thursday morning when he allegedly pointed a firearm at an officer while attempting to escape on foot from a home in the 13600 block of Beachwood Ave., Cleveland, near the Garfield Heights border.

On April 15, at approximately 8 a.m., Cleveland police officers responded to a call for a male threatening a family on Beachwood Ave. Officers responded and encountered the male, who was known to have multiple felony warrants for offenses including murder, aggravated robbery and aggravated menacing.

When officers approached, the suspect fled through yards on foot and attempted to climb a fence. When he turned and pointed a firearm at an officer, shots were fired and the suspect was shot and was pronounced deceased at the scene, according to information provided by Sergeant Jennifer Ciaccia, Senior Public Information Officer, Cleveland Department of Public Safety.

The incident will be investigated by the Cuyahoga County Sheriff’s Office. The Cleveland Division of Police will cooperate fully with the investigation, Ciaccia said.

She noted that during the course of an on scene investigation, the Cuyahoga County Sheriff’s Office executed a search warrant on the abandoned home of the back yard in which the shooting occurred. During the execution of this warrant, two individuals were found hiding in the garage and were taken into custody. Narcotics and an assault rifle were also confiscated.

The deceased suspect was wanted on a murder warrant for the Sept. 1, 2020 gas station shooting death of a 48-year-old female. A 26-year-old female was injured by gunfire in the same incident.

Asbury appointed to serve in Bedford

Bedford resident Jeff Asbury, who was appointed to serve the remainder of former Ward 5 Councilwoman Heather Rhoades’ term at council’s Monday, April 5 meeting, gave the following information about himself to The Neighborhood News last week for the benefit of his constituents and city residents.

Asbury, who grew up in Bedford, graduated from Bedford High School in 1983, and his wife, Kelley, graduated from Bedford High in 1985. The couple, who married in 1986, moved to Garfield Heights in 1989, raised three children and moved back to Bedford in 2016. “I’m also the grandfather to one phenomenal grandson,” he stated.

Asbury is currently a purchasing agent with Marsam MetalFab in Twinsburg, where he has been since 2012.

He said he ran for the Ward 5 council seat in Bedford in 2017, and was the runner up to Rhoades, who stepped down from the position earlier this year due to illness.

Asbury said he stayed involved in the community as a volunteer with various organizations and for various events and became an auxiliary police officer for Bedford in May of 2018. He worked in that position until being sworn in to council.

Asbury is also currently on the board of the Bedford Downtown Alliance, an organization which, according to its mission statement, works to preserve and revitalize downtown businesses and to bring the community together in Bedford.

Asbury is serving out the remainder of Rhoades’ unexpired term, which ends in December 2021, but confirmed that he has turned in his petitions to the Cuyahoga County Board of Elections to be on the ballot for election this November.

Indy Council OKs video cameras for all police cars

On Tuesday, April 13, Independence Council met in regular session and passed legislation to purchase video cameras for all police vehicles.

“When police departments across the nation are under scrutiny, we must provide our safety forces with this powerful tool,” Mayor Gregory Kurtz said in his report.

According to the legislation, the cost of the equipment is not to exceed \$141,929.80.

Other legislation passed by council at its meeting last week included:

- Amending a chapter of the Building Code to reduce residential construction-related nuisances and restrict noise.
- Authorizing an agreement with Cuyahoga County for the resurfacing of Rockside Rd.

C.H. Council passes fund for American Rescue Plan monies Pre-Mother's Day Dinner

The Village of Cuyahoga Heights Council met last Wednesday, April 14, and passed an ordinance to establish the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 Fund in anticipation of monies to be received for local governments to assist and address the continued impact of COVID-19.

The \$1.9 trillion American Rescue Plan Act, signed into law March 11, 2021, is a federal economic COVID-19 stimulus package. Money the village receives from the ARP will be put into this newly established fund to ensure that it is accounted for and spent in accordance with all appropriate standards.

Other legislation approved by council at last week's meeting included:

- Participating in the ODOT road salt contracts awarded

in 2021;

- Contracting with Security Hut, Inc. for security services;

- Amending the village's codified ordinances to clarify the residential side and rear yard height limitations for fences;

- Authorizing an agreement with OHM Advisors for post construction flow monitoring related to the Nicky Boulevard Storm Sewer Extension and Slope Stabilization Improvements Project – Phase 2;

A moral claim in the amount of \$248.40 was approved for the replacement of two tires, as well as a change order for repairs to traffic signals with Signal Services, not to exceed \$15,000.

Also okayed was an agreement with Brilliant Electric Sign Co., Ltd. for a header cabinet and two electronic message centers not to exceed \$32,698.

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Bedford getting ready to open city pool

After being closed last year due to the COVID-19 pandemic restrictions, Bedford's municipal pool on Ellenwood Ave. is on track to reopen for residents this summer, City Manager Mike Mallis said at the city council meeting Monday night.

Mallis also said the Ellenwood Waterline Project "is slated to begin this week," adding that residents of the area affected should have received a letter outlining the scope of the project and the contractor for the work.

"We believe the project will be completed in 60 days, which is the goal, and have that all wrapped up by the time the municipal pool gets ready to open," Mallis said.

"The staff are working already to get the pool facility ready for a summer 2021 opening," he said. Mallis asked residents to "stay tuned" regarding possible events in the Public Square area for the summer, which he will share with the public in the coming weeks.

Regarding other upcoming projects, Mallis credited Jennifer Kuzma of the city's Economic Development office for the city receiving a \$15,000 grant from the Ohio EPA to install electric vehicle charging stations in the Historic District.

Legislation approved

As part of ongoing upgrades at city facilities to provide access for senior citizens and the disabled and to combat the ongoing coronavirus pandemic, council approved an ordinance for a contract with Welker-McKee of Cleveland to purchase "touch-free" faucets and other restroom facility upgrades for City Hall and Ellenwood Center, at a cost of \$24,994.83.

These upgrades will be funded through money the city received under the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act funding, so it will be at no cost to the city, Mallis said.

Also passed was an ordinance to enter into a contract with GPD Group to conduct a No Feasible Alternatives (NFA) analysis of the city's Wastewater Treatment Plant at a cost of \$198,990.

The city is mandated by the Environmental Protection Agency to conduct an NFA analysis to address persistent overflows impacting the Wastewater Treatment Plant, so as to reduce flow and suggest potential upgrades at the plant, the ordinance states.

Mallis explained that this legislation is the first part of the renewal process for the city's EPA permit for the treatment plant to outline major upgrades and improvements that will be required at the plant.

Also approved was an ordinance amending previous legislation to provide for continuing membership in the Ohio Municipal League (OML) Joint Self-Insurance Pool, with payments of \$186,092 for 2020; \$199,685 for 2021; and \$186,092 for 2022.

Due to current market conditions and the city's claim trends, the renewal premium for year 2021 has increased by \$13,593 from 2020, the ordinance notes. Finance Director Frank Gambosi explained that "we've been a little bit excessive on the amount of claims we've had the last couple of years."

Council also approved legislation to participate in the Ohio Department of Transportation Winter Contract, to purchase a total of 2800 tons of road salt for use in the 2021-2022 winter season.

Motions on agenda

Council voted to approve a decision of the Zoning Board of Appeals to accept a variance of ordinances regarding "Lot Area, Frontage and Yard Requirements" and "Principal Use Orientation," requested by Sam Vittrizzino of 933 Archer Rd.

Council upheld the Zoning Board's decision to deny a variance regarding "Signs Permitted in a B-2A District, Billboards Prohibited," which was requested by Aleksandr M. Rybak of Bedford Heights. Montello said the denial was based on the concerns of property owners regarding aesthetics in the area.

And approved by council was a motion to appoint Angela Porinchak to the Record Retention Committee for a three-year term. Gambosi explained that the committee was in charge of keeping track of all records of the city, and determining the future status of those records.

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Laws of the Land in Garfield Hts.

Do you live in Garfield Heights and have a question about its ordinances - what may or may not be legal in any given circumstance? This column will answer your questions with the help of Garfield Heights city officials.

Question: What are the regulations regarding landscaping and lawn service providers in the city? Answer:

Chapter 1337: Landscaping and Lawn Services

DEFINITIONS

(a) "Landscaping" includes the planning and the planting of trees, shrubs, flowers, bulbs and other plants for the purpose of beautifying the premises, not involving grading or drainage of lot.

(b) "Lawn services" includes application of fertilizers and topsoil, installation of lawn sod, and the seeding of lawns, not involving grading or drainage of a lot, and the cutting, trimming and edging of lawns.

LICENSE REQUIRED

No person shall contract, either orally or in writing, for the planning, planting, sale and/or installation of trees, shrubs, flowers, bulbs, lawns, grasses, groundcovers and the like in the City which involves the grading or drainage of the lot without first obtaining a license, providing a cash bond of \$100.00 and paying the fees provided herein. The cash bond shall be refunded no later than thirty days following inspection by the Building Commissioner of the satisfactory installation of the landscaping facilities.

APPLICATION AND LICENSE REQUIREMENTS

(a) Application shall contain the name, address and principal place of business or office of the applicant, together with a statement as to length of time in business and general experience or knowledge of the applicant.

(b) The license shall be in force for a period of one year and the fees shall be \$15.00.

(c) Each applicant shall provide an approved fidelity bond in the principal sum of \$1,000 in favor of the city, for the benefit of any person or persons damaged by the dishonest, incompetent or fraudulent acts of the applicant. Such bond shall be maintained in full force in the principal amount at all times, and shall provide that it shall not be canceled or revoked until 10 days after written notice of intention so to cancel or revoke has been given to the Finance Director.

INSPECTION AND ENFORCEMENT

(a) The Building Commissioner shall handle all matters regarding landscaping and lawn services and installations and shall be responsible for the maintenance and adherence by such landscaper to the grading or topographical plan for such lot to be improved by landscaping. Such landscaper shall be required hereunder to maintain the grade for any lot so improved by landscaping and be required to install such landscaping so as not to interfere, obstruct or permit the diversion of any surface waters with respect to such lot to the detriment of any abutting or adjoining property owners' lands. In the event such landscaping does divert or obstruct surface waters or interfere with the grading or topographical plan for such lot, such landscaper, upon receipt of written notice by the Commissioner, shall immediately commence to make the necessary repairs or corrections in accordance with instruction from the Commissioner and, upon failure to so repair or correct such conditions, his bond shall be forfeited.

(b) Upon a finding by the Commissioner that any landscaping or lawn services have not been installed according to contract and accepted nursery practices in this region and the provisions set forth in subsection (a) hereof, the Commissioner may revoke the license heretofore issued hereunder until the installation has been corrected in accordance with the orders of the Commissioner.

(c) Any license holder whose license has been so revoked may appeal such decision to a Board of Appeals composed of the Mayor, Law Director, and President of Council, by written notice of such intention to appeal filed within ten days of the revocation of the license. The decision of the Board shall be final.

(d) The fee for inspection required by this section shall be \$10.00 and shall be paid to the Division of Building, Engineering and Inspection by the landscaper.

CLEAN-UP; PARKING; LICENSE

(a) Professional lawn service operators shall be responsible for cleaning up all cuttings, trimmings, soil and similar debris that accumulates on the sidewalks, driveways and streets of the area in which the work was performed.

(b) When parking on the street, professional lawn service operators shall park any and all vehicles in the proper direction without blocking any driveways or sidewalks other than the customer's.

(c) Each professional lawn services operator shall apply for a license to contract for business in the City. The application shall contain the name, address and principal place of business or office of the applicant, together with a statement as to length of time in business, general experience or knowledge of the applicant, and proof of current liability insurance.

(d) The license shall be in force for a period of one year and the fee shall be \$15.00.

MVA Hit-Skip

On April 4, shortly before 6 p.m., an officer was dispatched to the station for a crash report. A woman told police she was stopped at the intersection of Broadway Ave. and McCracken Rd. when her car was rear-ended. The driver left the scene and was followed by the woman to a home on Krebs Ave. in Maple Heights. She contacted MHPD and was told to file a report with GHPD. Her vehicle had minor but visible damage.

Shots Fired

On April 13, about 10:50 p.m., officers were dispatched to the 4800 block of E. 84 St. for a report of shots fired. The complainant told dispatch the father of her child was at her house with a gun. She said he began by yelling outside her home, then broke out one of her windows and the front and rear windows of a neighbor's car that was parked in the driveway. The complainant and neighbor both heard the suspect fire a single shot in the air before kicking in the front door. They then called police. Officers set up a perimeter around the house and waited for SWAT to arrive. SWAT checked the house and found no one inside. Dispatch was able to ping the suspect's cellular phone to an address on Park Heights Ave. and asked Maple Heights police to check that address for the suspect's vehicle. MHPD advised it was

not at that location. The suspect was not in custody at the time the report was made. Charges include criminal damaging and aggravated burglary.

The driver was arrested and taken to the city jail and booked and charged with improper handling of a firearm in a motor vehicle and possession of marijuana. He was held on no bond.
