Davis resigns council position in Garfield Hts.; hunt on for successor

The city of Garfield Heights has begun its search for the next Ward 4 council member brought about by the resignation last Thursday of Councilwoman Shayla Davis.

The former Ward 4 councilwoman admitted she presently works for the city of Cleveland and did so while and commissions in the city the Recreation Board still holding her council position with Garfield Heights and is, therefore, in violation of the Garfield Heights Charter.

Garfield Heights City Charter requires that the six remaining members of council appoint a replacement within 30 days of the vacancy. Accordingly, the term of the appointed Ward 4 council member will begin no later than May 21, 2021 and conclude on November 7, 2021.

At this time, Garfield Heights City Council is requesting teer and sometimes paid that interested residents of Ward 4 submit a letter of intent to Council Clerk Barbara Molin at bmolin@garfield hts.org no later than May 5. (See ad on Page 7 of this newspaper for more details.)

Davis, who has announced a run for the office of mayor this year in Garfield Heights, was elected to council in November, 2019. Under Section 9 of the Garfield Heights City Charter, "Members of Council shall not hold any other public office or public employment except as otherwise provided in this Charter.

A special meeting of city council was called to address the issue last Thursday evening but was made unnecessary because of Davis' resignation earlier in the day. She still plans to continue her candidacy for mayor.

"I have always served and serve is what I will continue doing on the campaign trail for mayor of Garfield Heights," she said in her letter of resignation.

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
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



On Monday, April 26, at 2:41 p.m., the University Hospital Bedford Medical Center contacted the Chagrin Valley Regional Dispatch Center to report a male gunshot victim had arrived at the Emergency Room, according to Deputy Chief Rick Suts of the Bedford Police Department. Officers learned that an 18-year-old male was brought in with a gunshot wound to the head. Officers were able to locate the vehicle he was transported in and spoke to the other occupants. The victim was a front seat passenger. The other parties report that he exchanged words with a male walking on McKinley Ave. That male produced a firearm from his waist band and fired three shots into the vehicle. One round struck the victim in the head. None of the other passengers were struck.

Through investigation a suspect was developed, Suts said in an email to media. A 16-year-old male known to the victim was arrested a few hours later with a handgun still in his pants. The suspect has been charged with felonious assault and the victim is being treated at MetroHealth Medical Center.

 $Both\,males\,attend\,Bedford\,High\,School, Suts\,said, and$ were familiar with each other. This incident did not happen on school grounds. At this point, it does not appear to be related in any way to anything at the high school. Bedford Police are continuing to gather information and evidence



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On April 24, at approximately 6:40 p.m., officers responded to the 3500 block of E. 76 St. in Slavic Village for a female shot, according to a media alert by Sgt. Jennifer Ciaccia, senior public information officer for Cleveland's Department of Public Safety. On arrival, the victim was found slumped in her vehicle with a gunshot wound to her head and chest. EMS responded to the scene and the victim was pronounced deceased.

Members of the Homicide Unit were dispatched to the scene for investigation. Preliminary information indicates that the victim, age 48, had returned home in her vehicle with her son, age 13, when two males approached her vehicle and began firing shots. The boy was not injured and was being cared for by neighbors on police arrival. The suspects fled the scene in a vehicle but have not been identified. This matter remains under investiga-
