Legislation passed to add **RESIDENTS SHOW UP FOR CLE Mayoral Candidates** more positions in GHPD VACCINE & ICE CREAM

Garfield Heights Council met in regular session Monday night and approved legislation to update the organizational structure of the Garfield Heights Police Department by okaying the addition of an additional police captain and two patrolmen.

Police Chief Mark Kaye urged council to pass the GHPD restructuring bill, which was passed as an emergency ordinance so departmental changes could take place sooner rather than later.

Also passed was an emergency ordinance to participate in the Ohio Public Works Commission State Capital Improvement and/or Local Transportation Improvement Program for the Multi-Street Reconstruction & Waterline Replacement - Phase 7 - Project, which will affect portions of E. 90 St., Wadsworth Ave., Shadyoak Blvd., E. 115 St. and Russell Ave.

Another ordinance approved authorized the mayor to become a member of the West Creek Conservancy, which protects natural resources and creates greenspace.

Improvements for Transportation Blvd. and Vista Way were authorized by council with an ordinance to participate in the Ohio Public Works Commission State Capital Improvement and/or Local Transportation Improvement Program to secure funds for the project.

Aresolution honoring 2021 Garfield Heights High School graduate Joseph Lenart, Jr. was unanimously approved by council in light of his extraordinary academic and athletic accomplishments. Joe and his mother were at the meeting to accept the resolution from Mayor Matt Burke.

Sentenced for 18 armed robberies of area gas stations

Cuyahoga County Prosecutor Michael C. O'Malley announced that Mye Kel Cannady, 21, has been sentenced to 25 to 29 years in prison for committing 18 armed robberies of gas stations within a 30-day period across Cuyahoga County.

Between Aug. 27, 2020, and Sept. 26, 2020, Cannady robbed 17 different gas stations, (one he robbed twice) which included six in Cleveland, three in Parma, two in Lakewood, two in Independence, and one each in Maple Heights, Brooklyn, Brook Park and Beachwood. O'Malley said that in each incident, Cannady waited outside plotting an opportune time to strike. He then entered the stores and demanded money from the victims – both males and females ranging in age from 19 to 62 years old-at gunpoint. In some incidents, Cannady pistol-whipped victims and threatened their lives, the prosecutor said. He stole cash, cigarettes and other merchandise before fleeing the scenes.

On Sept. 26, 2020, the Parma Police Department was notified of two armed robberies that occurred that day and located the suspect's vehicle near W. 130 St. and Brookpark Rd. They attempted to stop the vehicle, but Cannady sped away and a pursuit ensued that spanned multiple jurisdictions before ending near Garfield Blvd. and E.78 Place in Cleveland. Cannady became trapped on a deadend road and hit two police cruisers in an attempt to escape. He was arrested following a brief foot chase.

Investigators from each agency and the Crime Strategies Unit of the Cuyahoga County Prosecutor's Office were able to link Cannady to the string of robberies through video surveillance, photos and DNA evidence.

Cannady pleaded guilty to the following charges: 18 counts of aggravated robbery, one count of failure to comply, one count of vandalism, and one count of having weapons under disability. He was sentenced to 25 to 29 years in prison.

Maple Heights Council passes 'Pay to Stay' legislation to help tenants affected by pandemic

After several months of discussion, Maple Heights Council passed an ordinance known as "Pay to Stay" legislation at its meeting last week to assist tenants affected by the economic impact of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

The ordinance stipulates that if a landlord has filed for an eviction for nonpayment of rent, the tenant may pay the past due rent and the late fees by the time of the hearing so that the eviction judgment can be dismissed.

The new chapter is subject to review by council by Dec. 31, 2021, and every year thereafter, the ordinance states. Council may review the legislation more often throughout any calendar year.

Opioid settlement ordinance approved

Council passed an ordinance authorizing Mayor Annette Blackwell to sign the participation form to be a party in a class action lawsuit against various pharmaceutical companies.

The legislation addresses the harm caused to Maple Heights residents and those in other communities throughout the state and the nation by "misfeasance, nonfeasance and malfeasance committed by certain entities within the Opioid Pharmaceutical Supply Chain... The state of Ohio and local governments are separately engaged in litigation seeking to hold Opioid Pharmaceutical Supply Chain Participants accountable for the damage caused.

Police Chief Todd Hansen explained, "The state is suing basically all of the major drug manufacturers for the opioid epidemic that's going on around the country. Ohio is one of the first two states to actually engage in this lawsuit. We've been going down to the meetings and this is being led by four separate groups within Ohio, four

separate lawsuits that are going on. Basically, they're splitting up a pot of money. The pot of money's about \$800 million right now. It's going to go up to a billion, ossibly, when Johnson & Johnson gets involved, and Johnson & Johnson is a party to this lawsuit. There's a lot of legalities involved."


"Maple Heights, when all is said and done, is looking to get somewhere between \$56,000 and \$80,000. Probably, it will be a number of years before that actually comes to fruition when the lawsuit is completely done," Hansen continued.

Other legislation passed

There was a large amount of legislation on last week's agenda, and among the pieces approved included the following:

• Submitting a charter amendment to the voters in the Tuesday, Nov. 2 election to remove a prohibition on the use of photo monitoring devices (cameras) for enforcement of traffic laws.

•Authorizing Blackwell and Hansen to apply for and accept, with 50% matching funds, a Patrick Leahy Bulletproof Vest Partnership Grant from the U.S. Department of Justice for body armor vests for the police department in the amount of \$18,050. If the grant is awarded, the city will pay \$9,025.

•Authorizing a contract with Gopher Outdoor Sports to buy outdoor fitness equipment for the Stafford Park Outdoor Fitness Network Project, at a cost of \$16,642.

In 2020, the city had received grant funding in an amount up to \$58,000 from the Ohio Development Services Agency originally intended for the Stafford Park Pool Sprayground, but due to the coronavirus pandemic did not open it this summer. The ODSA subsequently approved a modification of the grant agreement to instead use a portion of the funds for the outdoor fitness network, with security cameras in the park.

•Authorizing Blackwell and Human Services Director Linda Vopat to file an application for funding from the Northeast Ohio Areawide Coordinating Agency through the Enhanced Mobility for Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities Program for the purchase of two new vehicles for transportation for the Human Services Transportation Program. The city will provide at least 20% in local matching funds if the application is approved.

•Authorizing Blackwell to apply for \$90,000 in Community Cost Share Program funds from the Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District for leaf collection equipment for the city, as recommended by the service department.

•Authorizing a contract with Klyn Nurseries to purchase 71 trees at a cost of \$15,005 to be planted on Dunham Rd., from Mendota Ave. to the south corporation line, as part of the Cuyahoga County Healthy Tree Canopy Program, Dunham Road Greenway Tree Planting Project. The resolution states that the city has been awarded \$39,937.50 in county funds towards the project, with the city committing to 10%, or \$4,437.50 in local funds, for a total project cost of \$44,375.

•Authorizing City Engineer Ed Hren to begin preparing plans and specs and to go out for bids for the 2021 Pavement Repair Program in the city.
