> Officers responded to a home in the 13700 block of Oakview Blvd. at 9:38 p.m., on a report of an assault and stolen car. They found the victim sitting on the front steps of the home appearing to be in a state of shock at what had happened.

> She was taken by ambulance to Marymount Hospital where police were able to speak with her. She told them she was called to a home in the 5500 block of Cumberland Dr. to pick up four males via Uber. The men were described as being four young black males and wore medical masks. They directed her to Oakview Blvd., and while traveling eastbound on Oakview in her 2020 Kia Forte, the men began to attack her. They started punching her in the face and head while trying to choke her.

> One of the men hopped in the front seat and started to hit her and tried to stop the car. At some point the rear doors opened and three of the men jumped out. The woman then floored the accelerator down the street and the male in the front seat with her was successful in stopping the car in the 13700 block of Oakview Blvd.

> The men who had jumped out of the car caught up to the Kia, opened the driver's door and threw the driver to the ground. The men all got in the Kia and drove away eastbound towards E. 139 St.

> On Monday, Jan. 18, GHPD was notified that the stolen Kia was recovered by Cleveland police at E. 152 St. and Waterloo Rd. The car was not occupied and the keys were in the ignition. It was noted that the Kia had rear left end damage that appeared new. The GHPD Detective Bureau is following up.

What happened in 2020

Here are some of the highlights of the year 2020, as seen through the eyes of The Neighborhood News.

JANUARY

- The first day of the new year was a good one for North Broadway resident Betts Skrha, who celebrated her 90th family gathered at Bonefish Grill in Independence to celebrate her big day.

Sara Amato of University Settlement told attendees about the new four-story multi-family and commercial development to be located on the site of the former St. Alexis/St. Michael Hospital. Michael Jones of the U.S. Census Bureau explained the benefits of all residents birthday that day. 


